

Carol Anderson, Associate Professor of History at the University of Missouri, spoke on "Bourgeois Radicals: The NAACP and the Struggle for Colonial Liberation, 1941-1960" on November 7, 2008, at the Mershon Center for International Security Studies. Anderson will join the faculty in African American Studies at Emory University in January 2009.



In her talk, Carol Anderson outlined the ways in which the NAACP had helped colonial nations trying to gain independence in the 1940s and 1950s. Conventional thought is that the NAACP stayed out of such struggles in exchange for concessions such as Truman's desegregation of the military; however, Anderson found much evidence that the group worked behind the scenes.
