- over 20,000 residents
- 80% African American
- 33% at or below poverty levels
- bordering the east of downtown Columbus

Near Eastside Community has:

- many non-profit, governmental and university partners; and
- like many inner-city communities, suffered from a history of disparities, especially healthcare disparities.

- A grass-roots, community led consortium
- It is a monthly meeting forum, for the many partners to come together to create and implement programming solutions that address historical and novel healthcare disparities.
