Max Abrahms is a fellow at the Dickey Center for International Understanding at Dartmouth College.

His research focuses on the consequences of terrorism, its motives, and the implications for counterterrorism strategy. Abrahms has published on these topics in lin *Comparative Political Studies* (forthcoming), *International Security, Security Studies, Studies in Conflict and Terrorism*, and *Terrorism and Political Violence*, as well as several edited volumes. He is in the process of turning this research into a book.

Abrahms also worked with Col. Joseph Felter on the related issue of counterinsurgency, as a postdoctoral fellow on the Empirical Studies of Conflict project at the Hoover Institution. Prior to coming to Stanford, Abrahms was a lecturer in the national security studies program at Johns Hopkins University; a research associate at Harvard University's Belfer Center for Science and International Affairs; a fellow at Tel Aviv University; a fellow at the Washington Institute for Near East Policy; and a commissioned op-ed writer on terrorism for the *Los Angeles Times*.

He has appeared as a terrorism analyst on ABC News, Al-Arabiyya, Al-Hurra, Al-Jazeera, BBC, CBS, CNN, CNN Financial, Fox News, National

Abrahms received his PhD in political science from the University of California-Los Angeles (2009). He got his MPhil in international relations at Oxford University, St. Antony's College in 2002, and his BA in political science and history from the University of Pennsylvania in 2000.
