## Dr. Terry Petrenchik Joins Faculty

Welcome to **Dr. Theresa Petrenchik**, **OTR/L**, who joined the UNM Occupational Therapy Graduate Program in September 2009. Before joining UNM, Dr. Petrenchik was an Assistant Professor at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario, Canada. She is a Co-Investigator with the CanChild Centre for Childhood Disability Research, an internationally acclaimed child health research center at McMaster University.

Dr. Petrenchik has worked as an occupational therapist in Canada and the United States. Terry received her occupational therapy training from Florida International University, and her Ph.D. in Occupational Therapy from Nova Southeastern University, with a concentration in community-engaged scholarship in the areas of homelessness, childhood poverty, and at risk children and youth. In 2003 she completed a six-month research residency at McMaster University. In 2004, she relocated to Canada to accept a postdoctoral research fellowship at McMaster, concentrating on advanced research training in child health and participation and the study of homelessness and cognitive impairment. Prior to this she maintained a small private practice in the U.S. working as an occupational therapy consultant in a variety of settings including homeless shelters, youth development centers, and community agencies serving low-income children and families.

While in Canada, Dr. Petrenchik was an active community-engaged scholar. She served on the local Board of Directors for Big Brothers Big Sisters of Hamilton & Burlington, and as a program evaluation consultant for several local agencies and programs.

Dr. Petrenchik has numerous publications and is involved in a wide range of funded research activities. She is currently co-investigator on a \$900,000 CIHR-funded three-year study to develop tools for measuring

the social inclusion of youth with disabilities. She is also the Program Evaluation Director for a \$620,000 one-year pilot program to develop, implement, and evaluate a multi-sector, trauma informed service delivery model designed to decrease chronic homelessness among men who cycle between the correctional system, social assistance, and the homeless shelter system.

Dr. Petrenchik is looking forward to continuing her involvement in community engaged scholarship as a member of the UNM Occupational Therapy Graduate Program. She enjoys teaching and mentoring graduate students and is looking forward to working together with students and faculty in continuing the tradition of community-engaged scholarship at UNM. Her current areas of interest include homelessness, child and youth participation in out of school time activities and settings, community capacity building, and knowledge transfer and exchange.





# Director's Message: **Making Connections**

Life in the UNM Occupational Therapy Graduate Program has been full of connections this year. As you will see throughout this issue of OTras Perspectivas, our students are actively connecting with occupational therapists across the U.S. via participation in NMOTA and AOTA conferences (see page 5). We are very proud that this year, one of our students was elected to a 2-year appointment as the Student Representative to the AOTA Commission on Practice (see page 14).

Part of the Centennial Vision of AOTA is that occupational therapy should be "globally connected." We certainly have been growing strong global connections. Dr. Terry Crowe's summer Oaxaca course in traditional medicine continues to be very popular, and was featured in an article in the Chronicle of Higher Education, as well as in a video link for OT Advance. Other faculty also had the privilege of teaching in distant places this year, including Russia, Cuba, Wales, and South Africa.

An exciting new global connection for us is the NAPA-OT Guatemala Field School (see page 14), an outstanding learning and service opportunity that we were able to offer to two UNM occupational therapy students as a Level II Fieldwork experience. Our students collaborated with anthropologist Gelya Frank, occupational therapist Nancie Furgang, and 12 students

from other universities to provide services for people in an indigenous Mayan community, in conjunction with local NGOs. We hope to continue to build upon our strong foundation of global connections to enrich the lives of our students, our faculty, and our communities here at home in New Mexico.

# Visiting Scholars Dr. Patricia Crist and Frank Kronenberg Visit OTGP

In March of 2009, the Occupational Therapy faculty, Graduate Program students, community had the opportunity to meet and be inspired by Dr. Patricia Crist, Ph.D., OTR/L, FAOTA. She began her visit by consulting with the faculty on the innovative faculty-practitioner partnerships she developed with her colleagues at Duquesne University and community therapists in Pittsburgh. Dr. Crist presented a brief overview of her Practice-Scholar Program and initiated an interactive dialogue with the OTGP students. The evening concluded with dinner and a social gathering of faculty and community occupational therapists in the warm venue of Gail's home.

On Friday, March 6th, Dr. Crist was the keynote speaker at the 2009 Fieldwork Education Workshop titled *Modeling the Way: How Fieldwork Educators Inspire Fieldwork Students*. The purpose of the workshop was to explore and discuss best practices in fieldwork education using a variety of methods. Her presentation included guides for professional development, effective supervision styles to meet student needs, and strategies for adapting to the changing practice culture as a fieldwork educator. In attendance were fieldwork educators, community occupational therapists, current OT graduate students, and faculty and staff from the University of New Mexico.

On March 23, Frank Kronenberg, OT and Director and Co-Founder of Shades of Black Production in Cape Town, South Africa, delivered an exciting workshop to faculty, graduate students and community members. The all-day workshop entitled Occupational Therapy Without Borders: Creating New Practice Opportunities in Latin America and Beyond. Frank gave the audience many new ideas to expand OT practice. He is the co-editor 2 books: Occupational Therapy Without Borders (soon to come out with a 2nd edition) and A Political Practice of Occupational Therapy. This workshop was sponsored by a grant through UNM Latin American and Iberian Institute (LAII).

## Dr. VanLeit Appointed Director of Interprofessional Education for the Health Sciences Center

Betsy VanLeit, PhD, OTR/L has been appointed to serve as Director of Interprofessional Education for the UNM Health Sciences Center (HSC), and to facilitate development and implementation of interprofessional educational activities across HSC Programs, Schools and Colleges. Interprofessional education is crucial to the development of a health professions workforce that is prepared to meet the complex health needs of the citizens of New Mexico, to engage in productive health research, and to develop health services and systems that are teamoriented, effective and creative.

Dr. VanLeit brings extensive knowledge and involvement with interprofessional education to the position. She directed the Rural Health Interdisciplinary Program (RHIP) for many years, and is the current director of the UNM Area Health Education Center (AHEC) which is responsible for interdisciplinary health professions workforce development around the state. She is Co-Chair of the Interprofessional Education Taskforce for an international organization ("The Network: Toward Unity for Health") affiliated with the World Health Organization, and served as an appointed member of the National Advisory Committee on Interdisciplinary and Community-based Linkages of the Department of Health and Human Services.



**Frank Kronenberg** visited the OTGP in March 2009. He is an internationally renowned speaker and author of *Occupational Therapy Without Borders* as well as *A Political Practice of Occupational Therapy*.

# Dr. Gelya Frank Appointed Visiting Scholar



**Dr. Gelya Frank**, an eminent anthropologist, is spending a sabbatical with the OT Graduate Program in 2009-10

The UNM Occupational Therapy Graduate Program is honored to host the award-winning anthropologist. Dr. Gelya Frank, during her 2009-10 sabbatical. Dr. Frank is Professor of Occupational Science and Occupational Therapy at the University of Southern California, where she has been on the faculty for over 25 years. For her book, Venus on Wheels, Dr. Frank received 2000 Eileen Basker Memorial Prize from the American Anthropological Association, awarded for "the work judged to be the most significant, courageous, and potentially influential contribution to scholarship in the area of gender and health." She currently is co-author with legal scholar Carole Goldberg of a book in production with Yale University Press, entitled Defying the Odds: One California Tribe's Struggle for Sovereignty in Three Centuries.

Dr. Frank founded the NAPA-OT Field School in Antigua, Guatemala, which was launched with UNM OT student participation in summer 2009 (see story on page 14). UNM OT Lecturer **Nancie Furgang** is a Director of Pediatrics for the Field School, and made it possible for this outstanding experience to serve as Level II Fieldwork for our students.


## Class of 2010 Welcomes Class of 2011 with Mentorship and Fellowship


### OT Class of 2011

### **OT Faculty International Experiences**

Dr. Terry K. Crowe took 13 students to Oaxaca, Mexico to participate in a course focusing on Traditional Mexican Medicine. They interacted with 8 traditional healers and learned about different views of health, illness and healing. This year, 5 current occupational therapy students, 2 practicing OTs, 1 physical therapy graduate student, 1 PT, 1 physician, 1 psychologist, 1 pre-med undergraduate student and 1 speech and language science undergraduate student participated in the 11 –day course. **Dr. Diane Parham** was a guest participant at an international Occupational Justice Symposium and Think Tank in Cape Town, South Africa in July. In addition to commenting on academic papers presented at the symposium, she visited Khayelitsha, a township of approximately ½ million people, primarily of African Xhosa ancestry, who were displaced during the Apartheid era. She also participated in think tank discussions of what occupational justice is and what it might look like. Dr. Parham also was a guest lecturer for a sensory integration conference and theory course in Cardiff, Wales, sponsored by the Sensory Integration Network – UK and Ireland.

**Dr. Betsy VanLeit** presented at a conference about health professions education in Havana, Cuba. The focus of the conference was on health equity and meeting the health needs of an entire population as opposed to just those who can pay. It was fascinating to visit health clinics in Cuba and to learn about their inexpensive but effective healthcare system which focuses on prevention and health promotion.

Heidi Sanders MA, OTR/L began volunteering with Firefly Children's International in 2000 and has made four trips to Russia. These include a week-long education and training visit to a boarding facility in Buturlinovka as a coordinator and speaker at the International Conference on the Care of Children in Moscow, and as an educator for the early intervention pilot programs in both Kazan and Vladivostok. Heidi's latest visit, in December 2008, also included presentations and consultations in St. Petersburg regarding the use of communication strategies and visual schedules for children with autism.

**Dr. Pat Burtner** served as international consultant to the second of four intensive week-long trainings held in Vladivostok, Russia as part of Firefly's "Keeping Baby Home" project. US Consul General Armbruster welcomed 30 specialists from policlinics and universities who attended these sessions funded through the USAID program. She also conducted a seminar for on early intervention and interdisciplinary teamwork for doctors and administrators of Vladivostok hospitals and ministries.

## The EARLY Program: Occupational Therapy in the Prevention of Mental Illness

The EARLY Program is a collaborative effort of the UNM Department of Psychiatry and the MIND Research Network to prevent the onset of mental illness among adolescents and young adults, within the structure of an effectiveness study. The program is a replication of a clinical trial that began in Portland, Maine, in which occupational therapy was a key aspect of assessment and intervention. We are proud that the Occupational Therapy Graduate Program helped to launch the EARLY Program here in Albuquerque in 2008.

EARLY stands for Early Assessment and Resource Linkage for Youth. In the project, youth aged 11 to 25 who are identified as at high risk for psychosis are eligible for enrollment in the program, which includes OT services that focus on sensory, cognitive, and occupational strategies for success in school and at work.

Beginning in her first year in the OT program, student **Kellie Primm** devoted much time volunteering to develop OT services under the guidance of **Heidi Sanders** and **Diane Parham**. We were able to offer a successful Level II Fieldwork experience to Kellie and to **Devon Edwards**, thanks to the strong support of Medical Director Steven Adelsheim, MD, and Margaret Migliorati, MA, LPCC.
