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## Men in the Movement – A weeklong discussion about sexual violence

I am a strong advocate for women's rights and proud to be involved in the anti-rape movement. (The fact that there even needs to be a movement against rape is pretty shocking when you think about it.) For this blog carnival she asked several men who were active combating sexual assault to answer a series of questions. She recorded the answers anonymously, but I've never been one to be shy, so I'm going to link to each week's post here and out myself as to which answer is mine.

I hope you take time to read this and think about what you can do to help those who have survived – and to try to change the culture that allows such actions to exist.

Q1 "Do you think men belong in the anti-sexual violence movement and why? Is there a part of this movement you don't feel men should be involved with?"

Q2 "Did you become invested in this for personal reasons or political/social reasons (or some of both)? And, did you have a turning point moment when this issue became part of your world?"
