



# What Do We Strive For in Our Live Virtual Class Sessions?

- Foreground instructor immediacy
- High level of student-faculty and student-student interaction
- High level of class interactivity using different interface features
- Rule of thumb: ask students to do something every 3-5 minutes
- Offload technical concerns to support person

### Managing the Online Environment

- Set expectations about appropriate behavior at the beginning of the semester
  - This includes appropriate use of chat and breakout room time
- Consider having students sign a "technology contract"
  - This helps to underline the importance of students' being prepared
- Establish standards about frequency of webcam and microphone use
- Determine the division of labor between the instructor, TA, and support person ahead of semester start


