### FIS Fringe Meeting at Labour Party Conference



FIS organised a successful fringe event at the Labour Party conference in Manchester. The event 2008 The Irish in Britain: progress made and lessons for other communities was chaired by Conor McGinn, and addressed by Cllr Sally Mulready, Chair of the Labour Party Irish Society, and Dr Mary Tilki, Chair of the Federation of Irish Societies, as well as Murad Qureshi, Member of the Greater London Assembly.

Mr Qureshi opened by noting that the commonality of experiences which existed between minority communities was an issue which was not emphasised enough. He commented that the Irish experience in Britain was a very pertinent one for other communities, particularly the Muslim community, in today's climate. He stated that the Irish understood the prejudices which surrounded a community over the issue of terrorism and said that important lessons could be learned from this.

Addressing the issue of remittances, Mr Qureshi stated it was a concern of all migrant communities and called for greater exposure of the impact these monies had on migrants' home countries.

Mr Qureshi also offered his support and assistance to Irish community organisations in continuing the relationship established with the Labour party in London, most notably through the work of former Mayor, Ken Livingstone. 2008 The Irish in Britain: progress made and lessons for other minority communities

Dr Mary Tilki outlined both the positive and negative experiences of the Irish Community in Britain in the eleven years since the publication of the CRE report *Discrimination and the Irish Community in Britain* in 1997. She noted that, while there had been some improvements, significant problems remained.

Firstly, she said, there were still problems with census data because census statistics remained problematic as the figures for the Irish community are aggregated into the overall white population group and, therefore, not properly analysed.

Secondly, she stated, there were still a considerable number of Irish people in the lowest socio-economic groups and that homelessness was still a major factor for the Irish community.

She also highlighted that the health of the Irish population in Britain remained poor, particularly in the area of mental health.

In conclusion Dr Tilki commented that the main lessons other minority groups should learn from the experiences of the Irish community in Britain were that issues of inequity and inequalities must be addressed.

In her contribution Sally Mulready addressed some of the positive achievements of the Irish community in the UK.

She also paid tribute to the Irish government, most particularly their work in the past decade, and their recognition of the significant impact on the Irish economy of remittances sent home by emigrants.







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### Garforth Community College Ceili Band Project



Garforth is a town situated beside the new A1/M1 link road ten miles to the east of Leeds at the northern most point of the former Yorkshire coalfield – the chances are you may not have heard about it... however, every year Garforth hosts an incredible community arts festival in July, for the size of the town and its population, it has to be one of the most impressive festivals in the country.

This year the Irish Arts Foundation (IAF) have teamed up with Garforth Community College to create a Ceili band involving the young people of the area. Under the musical guidance of IAF outreach workers Roddy Johnson and Kate Badcock, and Garforth Arts Festival Director Dave Evans, fifteen students from Garforth Community College took part in an extensive introductory workshop programme on Irish music between March and July.

Despite having no previous experience of playing traditional Irish music prior to the project the students gave an outstanding debut performance as part of 2008 Garforth Arts Festival. The newly formed Garforth Community College Ceili Band played their first concert at the local Miners Welfare Hall to a capacity crowd, many of whom had never heard live Irish music before. At the request of the students, their families and the local community the project is to continue throughout the current academic year!

The IAF are always delighted to engage in new partnerships like the one above. The tutors were surprised to note how many of the audience members came up to the band at the end of the performance to mention that their father/mother or even grandparents were from Ireland. Of course, many Irish people emigrated to this area in the last two hundred years to work in the mines. Projects like this ensure that their memory is not entirely forgotten.



### Ronnie I hardly knew ya!

The 'Bard of Armagh' Tommy Makem died last year; 'there's no show like a Joe Show' Joe Dolan died just after Christmas; and now 'The voice of Dublin' Ronnie Drew has gone to join them. They each came to the fore in the 1960s when Ireland and the UK were embarking on a traditional folk music revival and, of course, the dancehall days.

I would not claim to have known Ronnie Drew but I was in the same room, bar actually, with him twice in my life. I was the barman on each occasion.

The first time was in the early seventies. I served Ronnie (he had a black beard then!) and the legendary Luke Kelly large brandies in the resident's lounge of the Anner Hotel in Thurles, Co. Tipperary. They were in town for a concert; they were not famous then, but quickly getting there.

The next, and last, time I served Ronnie was in the VIP lounge of the 'infamous' Galtymore in London in 1998. It was water! on that occasion. Ronnie was over to receive an award. That night I came from behind the bar as Ronnie went on stage and sang 'McAlpines' Fusiliers' to a hushed audience - the lyrics and story resonated with the London Irish audience. What was particularly poignant was the reference in the song to the 'Crown in Cricklewood' just '4 doors down' the Broadway.

## A tribute to Ronnie Drew by Gerry Molumby

There have been many wonderful tributes to Ronnie, and his funeral on the RTE website drew the best of Irish musicians and storytellers to celebrate his life. He is buried in Greystones Co.

> Wicklow next to his beloved wife Deirdre who was his life long friend and died last year.

So, some biographical details on Ronnie: RIP Ronnie Drew: A legendary Irish folk singer and musician, he founded the Ronnie Drew Group, later to be known as The Dubliners, with Luke Kelly, Barney McKenna and Ciaran Bourke, in 1962. He was a member of The Dubliners from 1962 to 1974 and from 1979 to 1995. From 1995 on, he pursued a solo career.

Ronnie Drew recorded with many great artists, including Christy Moore, The Pogues, and Eleanor Shanley amongst others. His distinctive voice has been compared to a cement mixer and the sound of coke bottles being crushed under a door. His most successful recordings include Seven Drunken Nights, (The Dubliners), and, of course, The Irish Rover (with the Pogues).

In 2006 he underwent treatment for throat cancer. Ronnie was an iconic figure in Irish music. 'Ronnie I hardly knew ya' was Ronnie's last one man show which he toured the USA and Ireland with. There were few appearances in the UK, a pity now. The picture above of Ronnie sporting his cigar was taken outside an Irish bar after a performance of his show - I think it is Ronnie at his best, even down to the detail of the shamrock on the stem of the cigar.

Ronnie, you have had many plaudits, some before you died, especially the RTE Late Late Show tribute. For me, I just want to say Thank You. Maybe I'll serve you a drink another day! In another residents lounge!

## FIS Forums FIS Forums

Since we reported in December, the Midlands' Advice Workers Forum has continued to meet on a regular basis, usually every couple of months. Forum members have been taking it in turns to host the meeting. This has given an opportunity to experience different situations and locations and given workers the chance to develop a more effective network. So far, we have visited affiliates premises in Leicester, Sandwell, Coventry, and several in Birmingham. This has been very interesting as several affiliates have moved into new premises over the last year e.g. The Birmingham Irish Forum, CARA and IWIC have all moved recently. Leicester have a brand new building and Sandwell Irish Community Association (a new affiliate) have taken on premises for the first time.

We usually have a main topic for each meeting followed by an information sharing session. Topics over the last year have been varied:

- Gypsy and Traveller Housing Support: Mick Quiggley talked about the new service being provided by CARA Gypsy and Traveller Housing Support Team based in Birmingham.
- Choice Based Lettings: Tim Brown from De Montford University gave an overview of the scheme and how it has been implemented differently by different housing agencies in different locations.
- Benefits: Colin Smith, from the Disability and Carers Service informed us about the Disability Living Allowances, Attendance Allowances, and Carers Allowances.
- Mental Health Research: Michelle Bhallroo, Midland Heart /Focus Futures gave an overview of the findings from the research into the mental health of the Irish community in Birmingham.
- Health Screening for the Irish Community: Juanita Williams talked about the model being used by Sandwell Irish Community Association

## Health Screening: A Presentation by Sandwell Irish Community Association

#### Speaker: Juanita Williams, Irish Health Development Worker

The FIS Midlands Advice Worker's Forum was pleased to welcome SICA representatives, Juanita Williams and Chris Flood, to give a presentation about SICA's health screening model. Juanita said the model consists of a package of tests, together with lifestyle and other health related information. The tests included blood pressure, cholesterol, raised blood sugar (diabetes), height and weight, Body Mass Index (BMI), liver function and arterial stiffness and also Haemochromatosis.

Juanita said screening/assessment targetting the Irish community had taken place on 6 September 2008 in Bearwood.


Juanita spoke about the different aspects of the screening that needed to be considered when planning an event:

- promotion
- who would do the tests
- venue
- results
- research
- follow-up
- budget
- information displays and advice

Juanita said that SICA would like to work on health screening with Irish Traveller groups, but recognised there would be issues that would need to be addressed first.

SICA would like to share their health screening model with other areas such as Birmingham, Leicester and Coventry. There was a general discussion about rolling this out across wider areas, perhaps with different groups coming together.

There was a general discussion on how best to reach Irish beneficiaries in other areas and suggestions included using community locations which already have a lot of Irish users and perhaps going to Irish housing schemes as a focal point. It was mentioned that another ethnic group had been able to get lists of people from GPs to invite for screening, as the GP collected ethnicity data - it may be possible to obtain the same for Irish people.


