Hospital Palliative Care Team Consultations for Patients with Advanced Cancer:

Too few too late?

- Palliative care teams in Dutch hospitals are mainly consulted for patients with cancer with a life expectancy of less than three months, with an unplanned hospital admission due to a high symptom burden. (this thesis)
- 2. There are substantial differences in the disciplines represented in hospital palliative care teams, their working procedures and the annual number of consultations. (this thesis)
- 3. Palliative care teams in Dutch hospitals are consulted late and too little. (this thesis)
- 4. Involvement of a palliative care team increases the quality of life and quality of dying of patients with cancer (this thesis)
- 5. Complex advance care planning interventions are more effective in meeting patients' preferences than written documents alone. (*this thesis*)
- Early palliative care is about doing more for the person, not less. (Scott Murray, BMJ. 2017)
- Palliative care cannot exist without compassion and attention for meaning and purpose as experienced by the patient and his loved ones.
- 8. As dying is a unique and personal experience, patients' and families' satisfaction with care is an important outcome in end-of-life care.
- 9. In the long history of human and animal kind, those who learned to collaborate and improvise most effectively have prevailed. (a statement attributed to Charles Darwin)
- 10. What we need is more people who specialize in the impossible (*Theodore Roethke*).
- 11. Finding your *ikigai* is considered the key to finding meaning in life and to happiness.

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
