#### Vegetable Cultivar Trials 2003

#### Introduction

The vegetable cultivar trials at the Georgeson Botanical Garden (64° 51′N, 147° 52′W) provide information on new and standard cultivars useful in home and market gardens. Plots are small, and trials are replicated over three years. No attempt is made to emulate large-scale commercial production systems but rather to test a broad selection of vegetables that may be worth testing more extensively on farms and gardens throughout the Tanana Valley.

Evaluations were conducted on 162 cultivars of annual vegetables. Seventy-two cultivars were direct seeded in the garden and 90 cultivars were started in the greenhouse and transplanted into the garden according to the schedule and spacings listed in Table 4. Fairbanks silt loam soil was fertilized with 10-20-20S (4 lbs per 100 sq ft, 195 g per sq meter) prior to rototilling and seeding or transplanting.

Some of the warm season crops were grown through three-foot-wide rows of IRT (infrared transmitting) plastic mulch in order to warm the soil and control weeds. All beds were equipped with surface or subsurface trickle irrigation. No pesticides were applied throughout the season, and grass clipping mulch was applied to the aisles beginning in mid June. Weather data were compiled from a U.S. Weather Service station, elevation 475ft (145m), located approximately 450ft (137m) west of the garden. The last spring frost was 24 May (31°F, -0.6°C) (Table 1). Thaw degree-day accumulation was below the previous ten-year average of 3318.9 degree-days. The frost-free season was two days longer than the previous ten-year average. More than half of the summer precipitation occurred in July (Table 2), but there were no adverse effects on vegetable growth.

The weather statistics describe a fairly typical growing season for Fairbanks. Most cultivars grew well, and harvest dates were typical for the Fairbanks area. Fall frost occurred on 13 September and did not influence the major harvest season for most vegetables. Temperatures dropped to  $23.1^{\circ}F$  (-5°C). Soils froze 1–2 inches and remained frozen for several days. Many local growers lost potatoes to freeze damage following vine removal because of the severity of the frost.





### Georgeson Botanical Garden Map, 2004







## About the Agricultural and Forestry Experiment Station

The federal Hatch Act of 1887 authorized establishment of agricultural experiment stations in the U.S. and its territories to provide sicence-based research information to farmers. There are agricultural experiment stations in each of the 50 states, Puerto Rico, and Guam. All are part of the land-grant college system. The Morrill Act established the land-grant colleges in 1862. While the experiment stations perform agricultural research, the land-grant colleges provide education in the science and economics of agriculture.

The first experiment station in Alaska was established in Sitka in 1898. Subsequent stations were opened at Kodiak, Kenai, Rampart, Copper Center, Fairbanks, and Matanuska. The latter two remain. None were originally part of the Alaska land-grant college system. The Alaska Agricultural College and School of Mines was established by the Morrill Act in 1922. It became the University of Alaska in 1935. The Fairbanks and Matanuska stations now form the Agricultural and Forestry Experiment Station of the University of Alaska Fairbanks, which also includes the Palmer Research Center.

Early experiment station researchers developed adapted cultivars of grains, grasses, potatoes, and berries, and introduced many vegetable cultivars appropriate to Alaska. Animal and poultry management was also important. This work continues, as does research in soils and revegetation, forest ecology and management, and rural and economic development. Change has been constant as the Agricultural and Forestry Experiment Station continues to bring state-of-the-art research information to its clientele.
