


The Local Community Archaeological Training and Equipment Project is a partnership between archaeologists at BU and the New Forest National Park Authority (NFNPA). Working with archaeological societies and community groups from across Dorset and Hampshire, the project provides access, training, and support for the use of advanced survey equipment that would otherwise be hard to get access to. LoCATE aims to support the research that local groups already do by extending the range of techniques and skills they can use. Our goal is to enable an even greater contribution to the understanding of the rich archaeological heritage of our region.


## Barrow Group

Avon Valley Archaeological Society (AVAS) is a typical local archaeology group operating in the vicinity of the Hampshire Avon. The Society was eager to investigate and validate a number of sites discovered through aerial photography, but lacked the budget and technical skills to undertake geophysical survey. The LoCATE project was able to transform this situation.

The society has been able to survey a remarkable concentration of monuments in the Fordingbridge area, confirming the presence of two previously unrecorded Neolithic long barrows as well as an oval barrow and double ring ditch. This has been complemented by the discovery of another long barrow on Cranborne Chase which is a staggering 112m in length - longer than the pitch at Wembley!
















## Reports
