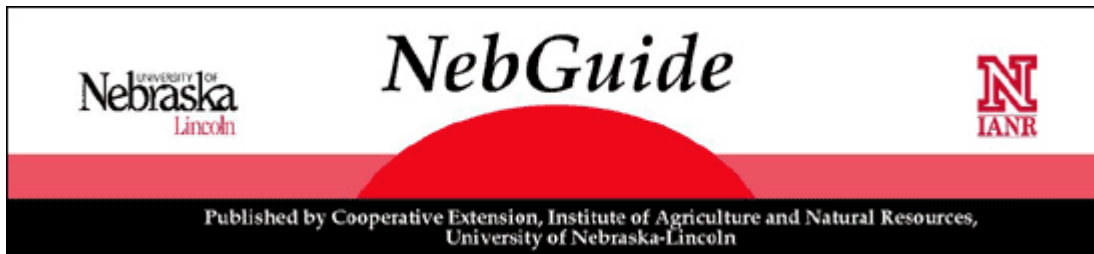

This NebGuide lists widely used and readily available market information sources that contain information which may be useful to agricultural producers, lenders and agribusiness firms when making grain marketing decisions. Most of the available market information and statistical data comes from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

Generally, there are two basic types of market information available to data users. The first type, Market News Service, is provided by the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) and concerns daily prices used to make short-run marketing decisions. The mass media provide coverage of these daily prices. However, because of time and space limitations, detailed background information and analysis are usually lacking.

The second type of information, provided by the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) and the Economic Research Service (ERS), considers current supply and demand information and forecasts made from analysis of supply and demand interaction. Such information is vital to understanding price movements and trends, and is also helpful in making short-run, medium-run and long-run marketing decisions.

## Data Reports, U.S.

- ***Weekly Weather and Crop Bulletin***

A weekly summary of the past week's weather and its impact on crops and forage progress for each state.

- ***Crop Production***

A monthly publication containing state and national estimates for crop production with related information on selected agricultural commodities. It also includes monthly forecasts and estimates on yield and production for corn, oats, barley, grain sorghum, wheat, soybeans and other crops based on crop surveys and growing conditions. Production, as compared to the estimates, are mainly affected by the weather from planting to harvest time.

- ***Prospective Plantings***

Issued in late March, this report contains information on prospective planted acreage for corn, oats, grain sorghum, barley, wheat, soybeans and other crops based on producer surveys. Actual crop plantings and prospective plantings may or may not coincide, depending on what producers decide to do.

Published in late June, it includes data on planted acreages of corn, wheat, grain sorghum, soybeans, barley, oats, dry beans, sugarbeets and other grains based on state and USDA surveys.

Quarterly issues in late March, June, September and December. Stocks both on- and off-farm are

reported for selected grains, by state, for the first of the month of the release dates. Information is gathered from farmer and commercial elevator surveys.

A weekly summary of important cash and futures grain and feed prices at various U.S. markets. It includes information on exports, outstanding export sales and useful price information with comparisons to the previous week and past year.

Issued in February, May, July, October and November. This publication analyzes supply, demand, price and outlook for wheat and rye. Current information on production, market movements, stocks, consumption, prices and foreign trade is presented in tables and charts. Special articles on subjects pertaining to the wheat market are often also included.

Published in May, and October, with brief updates in other months. This publication examines the supply, demand, price and outlook for the major feed-grains (corn, grain sorghum, oats and barley). Current information on production, market movement, stocks, consumption prices and foreign trade is provided. Special articles related to the feed-grain market are also included.

- ***Oil Crops -- Situation and Outlook***

Issued in January, July and October, with brief updates in other months. Supply, demand, price and outlook are analyzed for the major fats and oil commodities, including sunflowers. This publication gives the situation and outlook for food and agricultural sections pertaining to commodities, food, marketing, world agriculture and trade, and farm income. It also updates commodity, food and situation reports and features current information on farm income, prices, production and general economic indicators.

- ***Agricultural Resources & Environmental Indicators***

Annual summary is published in June. More current semimonthly updates are issued featuring topics on agricultural resources, the environment, food safety and technology.

Issued monthly, it indicates prices paid and received by U.S. farmers for various commodities and also includes price indexes and parity prices.

## **Nebraska Statistics Reports**

- ***Nebraska Agricultural Statistics Annual Report, Nebraska AGRI-FACTS, Nebraska Weekly Crop-Weather and Other Topic Specific Reports.***

These publications give a statistical summary of Nebraska's agriculture. The annual report, NEBRASKA AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS, provides data on crops, livestock, prices, farm income, farms, irrigation and fertilizer for Nebraska counties and crop reporting districts. This data, along with other statistical series for the state and nation are published in September. Preliminary county estimates for major crops are available upon request in May.

Nebraska AGRI-FACTS provides a summary of current agricultural statistics for Nebraska, other selected states and the nation, plus updates on exports and farm income. This 4-page release is published twice a month. The WEEKLY CROP-WEATHER covers crop progress, temperatures, precipitation, and soil moisture conditions. Other regular topic specific releases are available periodically.

These releases are available free to individuals and firms providing information on surveys made by the NASS office in Lincoln; others wishing to subscribe must pay a nominal fee. To obtain a checklist of available reports, write to:
