## Introduction

The Parliament website explains, 'The ceremony...has roots in the religious practice of judges praying for guidance at the beginning of the year. The custom dates back to the Middle Ages...' After the service the judges leave the Abbey via a rear entrance and walked to the Palace of Westminster where the Lord Chancellor entertains them with a 'breakfast' .
