The *EU Kids Online* network has been funded by the EC Safer Internet Programme in three successive phases of work from 2006-14 to enhance knowledge of children's and parents' experiences and practices regarding risky and safer use of the internet and new online technologies.

As a major part of its activities, *EU Kids Online* conducted a face-to-face, in home survey during 2010 of 25,000 9-16 year old internet users and their parents in 25 countries, using a stratified random sample and self-completion methods for sensitive questions.

Now including researchers and stakeholders from 33 countries in Europe and beyond, the network continues to analyse and update the evidence base to inform policy.

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1. Introduction

1.1 Overview

EU Kids Online III is a thematic network coordinated by Professor Sonia Livingstone and Dr Leslie Haddon at the Department of Media and Communications, London School of Economics and Political Science. It is funded by the EC Safer Internet Programme in order to coordinate and stimulate investigation into the way children use new media, with a particular focus on evidence regarding the conditions that shape online risk and safety; see www.eukidsonline.net.

In its *first phase* (2006-9), as a thematic network of 21 countries, *EU Kids Online* identified and critically evaluated the findings of nearly 400 research studies, drawing substantive, methodological and policy-relevant conclusions.

In its *second phase* (2009-11), as a knowledge enhancement project across 25 countries, the network surveyed children and parents to produce original, rigorous data on their internet use, risk experiences and safety mediation.

In its present, *third phase* (2011-14), the *EU Kids Online* network provides a focal point for timely findings and critical analyses of new media uses and associated risks among children across Europe, drawing on these to sustain an active dialogue with stakeholders about priority areas of concern for child online safety.

- Specifically, the network has *widened* its work by including all member states, by undertaking international comparisons with selected findings from countries outside the EC, and extending its engagement – both proactively and responsively - with policy stakeholders and internet safety initiatives.
- It is *deepening* its work through new and targeted hypothesis testing of the pan-European dataset to strengthen insights into *the risk environment and strategies of safety mediation*, by testing new and innovative research methodologies for the nature, meaning and consequences of children's online risk experiences, and conducting longitudinal comparisons of findings where available over time.
- Last, it is *updating* its work through a rolling programme to maintain the online database of available findings, and by producing timely updates on the latest knowledge about new and emerging issues - for example, social networking, mobile platforms, privacy, personal data protection, safety and awareness-raising practices in schools, digital literacy and citizenship, geo-location services, and so forth.

All members are listed by country in Annex 1.

1.2 Work packages

The project is organised into six work packages which address the aim and objectives.

Work package 1: Project management and evaluation

- To ensure that objectives, deadlines and quality standards are met, through the establishment of effective and flexible progress monitoring, assessment and quality control procedures.
- To sustain and encourage a dynamic research network engaged in active dialogue with relevant stakeholders, benefiting from ongoing projects internationally and stimulating new research.

Work package 2: European evidence base

- To identify recent evidence about children's use of new media across Europe, in each member state and other participating countries, all coded and entered in an online public database.
- To evaluate the quality of the evidence base, promoting high quality findings, identifying significant weaknesses in the evidence base, and reporting on trends in three annual reviews.
- To reflect on methodological good practice for research on children's internet use, including lessons from EU Kids Online II, and promote these as Frequently Asked Questions online.

Work package 3: Hypotheses and comparisons

- To test a series of hypotheses (theory-led and policy-led) and comparisons (e.g. to explore regional groupings) in the EU Kids Online II dataset, resulting in short reports and full articles.
- To develop and report on bilateral comparisons of European findings and those from directly parallel (e.g. in Russia) or similar projects (e.g. in USA), to understand online risk.
- To develop and report on longitudinal comparisons of EU Kids Online findings and those from previous surveys (e.g. SAFT, Eurobarometer), to understand time trends and changes.

Work package 4: Meanings of risk for children

- To identify and stimulate the use of innovative qualitative methods for exploring difficult contextual and ethical issues that arise when researching children's understandings of and responses to online risk.
- To explore the meanings of risk for children, drawing on innovative methods where possible, to demonstrate the value of such approaches and explore their potential for comparable findings.

Work package 5: Dissemination of project results

- To disseminate project results within national, European and international research forums and thereby promoting existing research and stimulating new research on children's new media use.
- To disseminate project results among national, European and international stakeholders so as to maximise the value of existing research and support the growth of evidence-based policy.

Work package 6: Policy recommendations

- To monitor emerging issues and debates in internet safety policy making at both the national and international level.
- To highlight areas of interest arising from EU Kids Online research for the safety awareness policy community (with WP5).
- To formulate policy recommendations in conjunction with outcomes of other work packages (WP3 and WP4).
- To assess national policy responses to internet opportunities and risks as identified by EU Kids Online.
- To contribute to policy discussion at a European and international level.

2. Report

2.1 Report structure

1. This report is based on the work of the whole EU Kids Online network of 33 countries plus the International Advisory Board. See Annex 1 for a list of all members.
2. This second annual report is organised in two ways. First, we report on activities by date, noting key activities and events in accordance with the project timeline.
3. Second, we summarise activities by work package, noting progress and any issues arising for each work package.
4. The annexes provide additional information (meeting agendas and participants, lists of contacts and dissemination activities, etc.) as appropriate.

2.2 Report on activities by date

November 2012 - January 2013 (T13-15)

- The short report: 'How to cope and build online resilience' was published.
- The short report: 'In their own words: What bothers children?' was published for Safer Internet Day in February.
- Network members identified, coded and submitted information about national studies to WP2. These were collated and entered into the European database.
- The WP4 pilot testing of the individual and focus group interview schedules was conducted in all participating countries.
- Teams continued preparing short reports for WP3.
- Presentations of the EU Kids Online III research findings were made at a series of national and international conferences.

3rd Workshop, Holiday Inn, Prague, 17th-19th January, 2013 (T15)

- Progress was reviewed.
- WP2 was held in plenary.
- WP2, WP3, WP4 and WP6 held sessions in parallel.
- WP5 reported on the analysis of the open ended question in the EU Kids Online survey, and the press release for the report due for SID.
- There were reports from the the EU NET ADB project, the Net Children Go Online project and the Brazil Kids Go Online project.
- Forward Planning Meeting. Activities, plans and deadlines for work for the six months ahead were reviewed and agreed.

1st Management Group Meeting, Holiday Inn, Prague, 19th January 2013 (T15)

- Progress was reviewed.
- WP2, WP3, WP4, WP5 and WP6 were discussed and potential challenges addressed.

- There was a discussion of how the next meeting in Leuven would be organised – this included inviting a range of participants from nearby Brussels.

February-June 2013 (T4-T8)

- The third (Prague) workshop minutes were circulated.
- In WP2 network members identified, coded and added further new studies, improved the existing entries in the database and also wrote summaries of findings for recent reports (published since 2009). The online Frequently Asked Questions were thoroughly revised and the new D2 report was drafted.
- WP3 members continued to work on short reports.
- In WP4 the interview and focus group schedules were adapted based on that feedback from the pilots. Then the main qualitative research (interviews and focus groups) was started.
- The state of the project was evaluated by the coordinator as satisfactory.
- The 2nd 6th monthly report D1.3B was submitted to the EC.
- A substantial WP3 report, 'Country classification: Opportunities, risks, harm and parental mediation,' was published and publicised.

4th Workshop, Leuven Institute for Ireland, Leuven, 4th-6th July, 2013 (T9)

- Janis Wolak reported new U.S. Research about Youth 'Sexting'.
- Ellen Helsper reported on the Country Classification short report.
- WP3, WP4 and WP6 held sessions in parallel.
- Kjartan Olafsson reported on progress in WP2, with a response from Hans Martens.
- Thibuat Keliner reported on 'Future directions for children/internet research and policy in Europe', with a response from Evangelia Markidou.
- Iesel Van der Plancken reported on 'Future prospects for research funding in Europe.'
- The network worked on a revised version of the questionnaire, ready for future use as the occasion arose.
- Forward Planning Meeting. Activities, plans and deadlines for work for the six months ahead were reviewed and agreed.

4th Management Group Meeting, Leuven Institute for Ireland, Leuven, 6th July 2013 (T9)

- Progress was reviewed.
- WP2, WP3, WP4, WP5 and WP6 were discussed and potential challenges addressed.
- There was a discussion of how the next meeting in Reykjavik would be organised, and also of the final reporting of all network results in October 2014.

July-October 2013 (T9-T12)

- The short report 'Zero to eight: Young children and their internet use' was published.
- The fourth (Leuven) workshop minutes were circulated.
- Key conferences (e.g. Safer Internet Forum, IGF) were participated in.
- The WP4 report from the comparative group - Innovative approaches for investigating how young children understand risk in new media: Dealing with methodological and ethical challenges - was published.

2.3 Report on activities by work package

WP1: Project management and evaluation

As planned in the original proposal, the coordinator has undertaken the following in order to ensure effective delivery of the work packages:

- Managed the network co-ordination.
- Monitored and managed the budget.
- Organised the third and fourth workshops.
- Managed the redesign of the online data repository, relabelled the European Evidence Database, to support the work of WP2.
- Managed the design of the project website as the public face of EU Kids Online.
- Renewed and updated the contacts list for project dissemination.
- Liaised with the EC Safer Internet Programme.
- Liaised with and presented at FOSI and other international bodies.
- Responded to a series of ad hoc requests for research and/or policy input from a range of stakeholders.
- Sent out EU Kids Online reports and other documents to conferences and meetings (e.g. Safer Internet Forum).
- Evaluated progress.

WP2: European evidence base

Since November 2012 the activities of WP2 have been focused on planning the final set of deliverables of the work package. April and May 2013 saw the publication of the first version of all WP2 deliverables. All are available at the project website (www.eukidsonline.net) and consist of:

- An updated and enlarged publicly accessible database of more than 1,200 studies where stakeholders can search not only for research sources but also for summaries of recent findings of more than 500 studies.
- A review on the nature of the evidence base, noting recent trends, specific advances in knowledge and/or methods and remaining gaps.

At the network meeting in Leuven in July 2013, a plenary session discussed how the deliverables of the work package could be developed further and how they might look like in their final versions. First, an emphasis will be put on updating the European evidence database with studies that have been made available since the last round of collection ended (January 2013). These studies will be summarised and added to the searchable online database. Second, the Frequently Asked Questions will be revised in terms of providing more examples and resources. Third, the network members indicated a desire to add to the list of planned deliverables a revised version of the 2010 survey on children's online experiences in a modularised form to facilitate comparison over time with the findings of the EU Kids Online II study.

WP3: Hypotheses and comparisons

The **objectives** of WP3 are:

- to test a series of hypotheses (theory-led and policy-led) and conduct comparisons (e.g. to explore regional groupings) in the EU Kids Online II dataset, resulting in short reports and full articles,
- to develop and report on bilateral and multi-country comparisons of European findings and those from directly parallel projects (e.g. in Russia) or similar projects (e.g. in the USA), in order to understand better online risks,
- to develop and report on longitudinal comparisons of EU Kids Online findings and those from previous surveys (e.g. SAFT, Eurobarometer), to understand better time trends and changes.

In order to fulfill these objectives the network is continuously working on the following tasks:

- 1) *Identify relevant research questions:*
 - Assess stakeholder feedback to identify new questions to be addressed.
 - Review new research from EU countries as identified in WP2.
- 2) *Analyse the EU Kids Online II dataset:*
 - Conduct statistical analyses and write reports on results regarding
 - the changing risk environment and
 - strategies of safety mediation.
- 3) *Relate EU Kids Online findings to broader contexts:*
 - Compare EU Kids Online II findings with other countries, as identified through WP2 and entered in the EU Kids Online III online database (bilateral and multi-national comparisons).
 - Compare EU Kids Online findings with data from previous surveys (longitudinal comparisons).

These are the achievements of the WP activities so far:

- Annex 11 provides an overview of all analyses that have been conducted with the EU Kids Online dataset so far, which go beyond the reports D4, D5 and D6 of the previous project *EU Kids Online II) as well as the chapters of the final book of that project.
- The network has identified research questions that are relevant to the above objectives: Network members have proposed topics that meet the objectives of this work package that will be made into Short Reports to be published in the EU Kids Online Working Paper Series (see annex 11).
- Task forces have been formed from network members who will work on the above Short Reports. To aid this process the network has produced “Editorial procedures of the EU Kids Online Working Paper Series”.

WP4: Meanings of risks for children

The work on WP4 was divided into two work groups:

- The *satellite research* group's task was the collection of studies carried out among EU Kids Online members involving qualitative research with focus on innovative methods. This research group worked on the report D4.1 – “Innovative methods for investigating how children understand risk in new media” (T22).
- The *comparative research* group's task was to carry out the comparative research across countries, with a common methodology, focusing on the meanings of online risks for children. This research group will work on the report D4.2 – “Understanding the meaning of risks for European children” (T30).

Satellite research group

- The research group discussed studies that have been carried out recently in following countries: Australia, Austria, Belgium, the Czech Republic, Estonia, Finland, Germany, Greece, Italy, Norway, Russia, Slovakia, Spain and the UK
- National contacts from those countries discussed what counts as innovative methods and how we can define and/or describe such methods and had written up produced case studies.
- The report “Innovative approaches for investigating how children understand risk in new media: dealing with methodological and ethical challenges” (119 pages) was delivered by the satellite research group in September. Fifteen researchers from eleven countries (Australia, Belgium, the Czech Republic, Greece, Hungary, Italy, Malta, Portugal, Romania, Spain and the UK) contributed to writing this report.

Comparative research group

- The research goals have been formulated in following way:
 - What do children perceive as being potentially negative or problematic when using the internet?
 - What impacts and consequences can such negative experiences have?
 - How do they evaluate things that adults consider potentially problematic?
 - What do children do to avoid these problematic experiences?
 - What can children do after having such negative experiences?
 - What coping strategies work best from children’s perspectives?
- Pilot focus groups and interviews took place in November and December. Coding and the coding manual were discussed at the meeting in Prague in January.
- The following eleven countries collected data from March to September: the Czech Republic, Romania (in Romanian and Hungarian), Hungary, Turkey, Greece, Belgium (in Dutch), Italy, Malta, Spain, UK, Portugal and Australia.
- Every country carried out research with a minimum of six focus groups and conducted minimum of twelve face to face interviews. Focus groups were single gender what meant that three focus groups were with boys and three were with girls, aged 9-10, 11-13, and 14-16. Data collection took place in schools. The interview transcripts were subsequently coded.
- In September and October, the Czech team worked on transferring of first level of national coding into Excel files. The system of content analyses of codes was developed to sort the huge amount of data and to help in next steps of analyses. Various research teams were also created to analyse different research themes across data.

WP5: Dissemination of project results

- There was a regular clarification/reminder of WP5 work targets for national teams, specifically:
 - Ensuring that new people sign up for the EU Kids Online contact list
 - Promote EU Kids Online through the social media Facebook and Twitter (@eukidsonline).
 - Promote our newsletter whenever and wherever relevant.
 - Each national team undertook to present the EU Kids Online project and/or project results at a minimum of four events.
 - Ensure national media mentioning of EU Kids Online through frequent interaction with and response to journalists

- Document outputs.
- To meet the internal information needs of network members a shared system was developed involving 1) regular coordinator's reports by e-mail 2) a portal for documentation and discussions in work packages 3) an internal Facebook group for network member's informal information and discussions.
- There was coordination with other WPs for sending out press releases when relevant (e.g. when short reports are published).
- The Facebook page was developed further as a dissemination and consultation tool. The primary mission of our Facebook page is for updates when we have new research findings or reports. The EU Kids Online Facebook page went public on 27th March 2012. The page focuses on research findings and facts and is therefore not active in disseminating practical advice to stakeholders and users outside the research and policy field. We have 890 people who have "liked" us (70% women and 30% men) and who therefore will get our postings on their own walls. Our weekly total reach has increased by 80%.
- Our most popular post was from 29.08.2013 seen by 1338 people on the publication of our "Zero to eight" report.
- The announcement of the upcoming policy book from the network created 48 unique social media stories in terms of likes and shares.
- A Twitter account for the project was set up (@EUKIDSONLINE). Our Twitter account has so far posted 108 Tweets, and has 487 followers.
- The national pages were updated and more references and examples of national outputs were added to make the national pages more useful as resources. See annex 9 for details of web statistics.
- See annex 10 of this report for a list of outputs,

WP6: Policy recommendations

Main Activities

- The objectives on Work Package 6 (Policy Recommendations) are to monitor European and international level policy developments, identifying areas where EU Kids Online may make contributions. A working group comprising members of the EU Kids Online network is active in contributing to a variety of policy fora and to developing policy-based outputs in the form of scholarly articles, books chapters and short reports. A programme of work has been agreed with planned activities over the full duration of the project.
- WP6 held two sessions at the networking meeting in Prague in January 2013 to discuss the planned outputs of the work package. Given ongoing developments in the area of online safety policy, it was agreed to reorganise the order of reports to allow more time to take into account the outcomes of the CEO Coalition as well as the industry-led ICT Coalition. Therefore, the order of D6.2 and D6.3 would be reversed. The former will now deal with issues of policy development and implementation at the national level and the latter would respond more fully to the outcomes of the *CEO Coalition to make the internet a better place for kids*.
- Because of the revised order, the planned completion of D6.2 for March 2013 will not be possible. A revised date of June 2013 was proposed with September 2013 for D6.3 (see schedule below).
- D6.4 will remain in place with a target date of January 2014 and will consist of a cross-European comparative discussion of implementation of EC strategy for a better internet for kids. Planning for this activity took place in the network meeting in Leuven in July 2014.
- D6.5 is a special themed issue of journal addressing policy debates, as featured in EU Kids Online reports, framed in an international context. A proposal has been submitted to International Communications Gazette, published by Sage, and a response is awaited.
- The other principal discussion at the 3rd network meeting in Prague concerned the question of impact and how member countries were able to influence positively the policy process within their own national system. In order to highlight the impact of EU Kids Online research and more systematically collate data on where this was evident, members were requested to submit responses on impacts/best outputs/key events held with national/international stakeholders. These would be promoted on the website and to the national page on the

website. Where no events had taken place, national teams were encouraged to hold or participate in relevant events in order to make connect with the most relevant stakeholders and to disseminate our work.

- The core activity of WP6, its book on internet safety policy published by Nordicom is now complete, and manuscript has been submitted to the publishers. A foreword by VP Kores, European Commission will introduce the book. The planned publication is for the final quarter 2013.
- Policy was one of the key themes of the 4th EU Kids Online network meeting held in the Irish College, Leuven, Belgium, July 4-6, 2013. Thibaut Kleiner, member of cabinet at European Commission with responsibility for Internet governance; Internet trust and security (including coordination of child protection) and digital content addressed the meeting at a session entitled 'Future directions for children/internet research and policy in Europe'. Also in attendance were members of Better Internet for Kids team including Evangelia Markidou and Kristin Bilburg, DG CNECT (Unit G Inclusion Skills and Youth).
- The Leuven Network meeting also began the preliminary work for preparation of a response to the Green Paper Consultation: "Preparing for a Fully Converged Audiovisual World".
- Growth, Creation and Values". The submission addressed those questions which had specific relevance for children and young people's audiovisual and media experiences, focusing on policies regarding Media Literacy (Question 14) and the Protection of Minors (Questions 20-25). WP6 coordinated the submission on behalf of the network which was duly submitted on August 15. The text of the submission is available on the EU Kids Online website.
- It was agreed at the 4th network meeting at Leuven that D6.4 would work closely with the study currently in development by the EC 'Benchmarking of Safer Internet policies in Member States and policy indicators'. As the topics overlap considerably with the intended subject matter of the report, it was agreed that the network would review materials made available the EC consultants and would base further analysis on the data provided. Furthermore, it was agreed that a specific focus on developing an analysis of policy impact would utilise the new country classification developed by EU Kids Online. Thus far, network members have now reviewed draft Country Profile reports for the EC and participated in a workshop held in Brussels (October 2013) on developing benchmarking indicators.
- Brian O'Neill and Cristina Ponte with associate members from the Brazil CETIC–Children Online project have completed a short report 'Risks and Safety on the Internet: Comparing Brazilian and European Findings'. The report to be released in time for the IGF will highlight the international dimension of EU Kids Online research methodologies and give access to a wider audience findings of international interest.
- In July 2013, members of WP6 also participated in a workshop convened by the European Commission on data sharing between industry and researchers. The workshop addressed the kind of data that are needed and asked how collaboration could be fostered. Industry participants at the workshop agreed that data would be particularly valuable but would have to be subject to privacy controls and be presented in suitably anonymised form. It was agreed that reporting trends should be part of the CEO Coalition process. The EC will continue to press for a means of presenting generalized trends, alerts regarding new risks, and a form of agreement committing industry and researchers to agree to work together underpinned by principles, ethical governance.

Other Activities

- Brian O'Neill was appointed as Independent Assessor for the ICT Coalition for a Safer Internet for Children and Young People. The position involved conducting an independent evaluation of the Coalition members' implementation of its self-regulatory code. An open form to be held in November 2013 will invite submissions from third parties on child safety provisions and implementation by the ICT Coalition. A final report is to be presented in March 2014.
- A joint panel of EU Kids Online with ECREA's TWG for Children, Youth and Media was held at the IAMCR Annual Conference in Dublin in June 2013. The panel entitled 'Youth and Online Safety: Policy Debates and Challenges' coincides with the publication of the network book *Towards a Better Internet for Children? Policy Pillars, Players and Paradoxes*. In addition to members of the EU Kids Online network (Sonia Livingstone, Elisabeth Staksrud and Brian O'Neill), other members participating in the panel included Professor Kathryn Montgomery, American University, Washington DC, and members of the ECREA TWG Ulrike Wagner and

Niels Bruggen (JFF - Institute for Media Research and Media Education, Munich, DE). The discussant was Eva Lievens (ICRI, KULeuven, BE).

- Brian O'Neill attended, on behalf of the network, the Digital Agenda Assembly in Dublin in June 19 and 20 and participated in Workshop 1 : addressing the digital skills gaps and learning in the digital age. The focus of the Assembly, held in Dublin to coincide with Ireland's Presidency of the European Union, was on skills, entrepreneurship and building digital inclusion.
- EU Kids Online was represented on the panel on privacy at the FOSI European Forum, 'Year of the Digital Citizen: Online Safety, Data Protection and Privacy' to be held in Google's EMEA HQ on May15th. Also, participating at the Forum were: Thibaut Kleiner, Commissioner Kroes cabinet, Claire Perry, MP, Judith Grant, UKCCIS and a wide number of industry representatives.
- Brian O'Neill will represent EU Kids Online at FOSI's 2013 annual conference in Washington DC. The panel "What's new in research" will feature a summary of EU Kids Online research findings and new initial findings from the Net Children Go Mobile project.

Deliverables

- D6.1 is complete, has been submitted to the publishers and publication is imminent
- D6.2 is complete and was incorporated into the network submission to the Green Paper consultation
- D6.3 has had to be rescheduled. This task is working closely with the Benchmarking of National Policies study commissioned by SIP. The network has received draft country reports and will incorporate this data into a short report to be published in the EU Kids Online short report series
- D6.4 as a consequence will also have to be pushed back by a further 3 months

Annex 9: EU Kids Online Website

Half way through the year the LSE changed the system for monitoring use, moving to Google Analytics. In the period covered by this report, from 1st November 2012 to 22nd March 2013, there were 38,945 visits to the website (www.eukidsonline.net). Data for one month is missing as we changed system, but extrapolating from the above figures this would be 7,789. Google analytics shows that from April 25th 2013 to October 26th 2013 there were 25,805 visits (but this includes the summer months when we expect to get less traffic. Therefore the total for the year is 72,538.

Once again, the 'reports' page has been second most visited page after the home page each month. Also as before, other popular pages are those relating the Best Practice Guide's 'Frequently Asked Questions (from EU Kids Online I) - Google Analytics shows that in the last 6 months 4 of the 10 most visited sites were FAQs. The questionnaires (from EU Kids Online II) were on the 6th most popular page.

Google Analytics now collects some information about visitors. In the last 6 months the countries from which the greatest number originate is the UK, closer followed by the US, then Australia (probably reflecting the close ties with EU Kids Online), Germany, Spain, Finland, Italy, India and Ireland.

Over the course of the year we have gradually moved the reports to the LSE's ePrints - this is a more permanent location and it actually measures downloads. It appears that we have severely underestimated downloads in the past. The total number of ePrint downloads for the two year period was 9,629. However, during that time (a) new reports would have been download from our website in the week between being released and moving to ePrints and (b) older reports may still have been downloaded from our site before the moved to ePrints. Another 1000 downloads as been added to account for (a) and (b), making a total for the two years of 10,629.

Over the last year the most popular report downloaded from ePrints. was (surprisingly) the Polish National report (2,005 downloads). Of the main EU kids Online reports, the most popular were '*In their own words: What bothers children online?*' (838 downloads), '*Children's use of online technologies in Europe : a review of the European evidence base*'(708 downloads), '*Risks and safety on the internet: the perspective of European children: full findings and policy implications from the EU Kids Online survey of 9-16 year olds and their parents in 25 countries*' (557 downloads) and '*National perspectives*' (310 downloads).




Figure 2: Outputs for two years by type

Figure 3: New Contacts for the second year of the project





Figure 4: New contacts numbers by category
