#### Medieval Iberian Song in its Mediterranean Context: from

Andalusian *muwashshahat* to the Cantigas de Santa Maria Abstract: This paper reviews the evidence for influence of Mediterranean Islamic culture on song and music of the Iberian Middle Ages, especially in Galician-Portuguese *cantigas*, both of secular and devotional nature. The aspects covered areperformance practice (cyclic concept and modalities of *contrafacta* in secular song, with special mention of a poem by King Alfonso X); form and rhythmic patterning in the *Cantigas de Santa Maria*, (where both *zajal* form—associated to virelai and Andalusian rondeau schemata—and patterns modelled on Al-Farabi's treatises are found). Musical examples are provided together with historical discussion of their respective context.
