He Talked Wildly About Ireland and Was Expelled

HE PRESIDENT OF THE AUSTRA LIAN IRISH LEAGUE PUT OUT OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESE.

LONDON. November 12.-President Mahon of the Australian Irish League, has been expelled from the House of Representatives for a wild speech, describing the situation in Ireland as a "saturnalia of murder, arson and plunder by a foreign army

The motion to expel Mahon was made by Premier Hughes, who maintained that the speech was incompaible with the oath of allegiance.

According to a cable to the Times, Mahon, who was elected as a labor member, had previously told Premier Hughes that he could go to the devil. and the house could do what it liked.

MELBOURNE, Australia, Nov. 11 Mr. Mahon, labor member of the house of representatives, and former postmaster of Australia, has been expelled from the house on motion of the premier who charged disloyal utterance at a demonstration in behalf of the late Lord Mayor MasSweeney Cork. The vote was 34 to 17.

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



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

NORTH AMERICAN SCRAP Belgian Flour Market.

Prospects for Importation at Presen Are Not Encouraging-Wheat and Flour Still Under Control

pects for importation of flour into Belernment control, and all purchases are made through a New York firm. As Belgium has some large and important mills, the policy of the government is to buy wheat mostly, and only very small quantities of flour from time to

From information obtained during a recent visit to the Belgian markets, it seems most probable that, when wheat and flour are decontrolled, the import duty on flour will be reimposed, under much the same conditions as existed in pre-war days. The policy of the present Belgian government is to do all it can to protect and build up its own industries, therefore it is only natura; to suppose that the Belgian mills will receive protection against the imports of foreign flour.

Now that the Holland market is free from control, those firms in Belgium which import flour can sell their imports in Holland, and considerable business is being done in the export of flour from Antwerp, but owing to certain public demonstrations against the return of Germans into Belgium, the German government, as an act of reprisal, is buying as little as possible through Antwerp, obtaining supplies through Rotterdam instead.

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



The Voyage of the Pilgrim Fathers

When one hundred and two daring Pilgrims sailed from Plymouth in September, 1620, most of them realised that they were taking their lives in their hands. Usher, who has tried to collect all the facts who has tried to conect and available about the journey, infers that "she must have been about ninety feet long and twenty-four feet wide, carying a crew of between fifteen and twenty men. Broad to beam, short in (8) the waist, low between the decks, and in her upper works none too tight, she was what was known as a "wet" ship, and, being on this voyage heavily laden and therefore low in the water, shipped more seas than usual. The passengers were distributed aft in the (*) cabins and bunks, not in hammocks, while the crew lived forward." Meals on the Mayflower were pro-

bably served cold. It would have been a difficult job to cook for one hundred and two pascengers in "a frying-pan held over a charcoal fire, or a kettle 🛞 suspended on an iron tripod over a box of sand". But no doubt 'there were many days when the menu was of little consequence. Even under fair winds there was much seasickness and when the Mayflower was stormstruck there must have been real consternation. In mid-ocean for instance, "the main beam of the ship sprung out of place and cracked a little ... , but they produced a great iron jack from the hold, forced the beam back into place, and made it 🟵 fast with ropes and timber braces. The officers and crew vouched for the coundness of the ship below the waterline, pointed out that the voyage back to England was as long and perilous as the continuation to America, and promised to do what they could to make the upper works a little tighter." In the end the Mayflower made good. Two months after she had sailed from Plymouth she was lying at anchor in Provincetown Harbour, on the shores of the New World.

But the worst was still ahead. These men were not at all experienced in 30 pioneering. They did not know how o fish or fire a gun, and they had only a small quantity of food with them and a few hand tools for farming or gardening. They were absolutely imprepared," says Dr. Usher, "for the conditions they actually found, and prought really nothing except good ontributitions, loyalty to each other. good sense, patience, forbearance, and devotion to a high religious ideal."

Toward the end of November the weather became decidedly uncomfortble, snow and wind any rain were especially unfavorable for those of the party who coasted in a shallop along Cape Cod in search of a spot suitable for establishing a permanent colony. The day when Plymouth Harbour was found by the explorers was difficult and eventful. "After some two hours' snowfall, the sea grew rough and the waves sufficiently violent by the middle of the afternoon to break the hinges of the rudder, so that two men with oars steered the shallop. At length the look-out cried that he saw the harbour, and, crowding on more sail in an attempt to make the harbour before dark, they overtaxed Cotton Blankets, White and the rigging: the mast split in three pieces, the sail dragged overboard, and they barely escaped capsizing."

But on Monday, December 21, they were able, not only to sound Plymouth Harbour, but also to make a Men's Fleece Lined Under- landing and explore its shores.
