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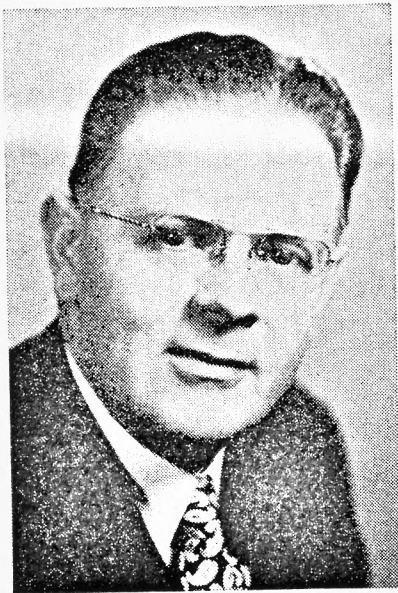
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Byron Leaving To Accept North Carolina District

Dr. Lloyd B. Byron, who had started his fifth year as pastor of the Olivet College Church of the Nazarene in August, announced his resignation last Sunday at a meeting of the church members.

The Rev. Byron will leave his post as the local pastor Oct. 19 to take over the superintendent's job of the North Carolina District of the Nazarene Church. He will have 40 churches under his jurisdiction.

No successor has been named to fill the vacant position. However, the Rev. Mark R. Moore, superintendent of the Chicago Central District, will meet with the church board this Friday night to consider prospects for a new pastor.

The Rev. Moore will confer with Dr. G. B. Williamson, general superintendent of the church, in considering a man to take over the position.

A native of New England, the Rev. Byron formerly served as pastor at the Pasadena, California First Church of the Nazarene for six years and at the Lansing, Michigan First Church for five years. He is a graduate of Eastern Nazarene

SNOW TO SPEAK IN FALL REVIVAL

Starting Oct. 5th and continuing through Oct. 12, will be Olivet's fall revival with the Rev. Donald E. Snow as the special speaker.

Rev. Snow, now pastoring the Muncie South Side Church of the Nazarene, has been a very prominent evangelist in both the Nazarene and Pilgrim Holiness Churches.

The church board has created a special committee to arrange for a going away reception in honor of Dr. and Mrs. Byron to be held Oct. 15. The committee is composed of C. L. Henderson, Mrs. C. S. McClain, Harold Curl, Dr. Willis Snowbarger, Mrs. C. T. Corbett, and C. S. McClain, chairman.

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FROM THE PASTOR'S STUDY

What will you find at Olivet? In the college catalog you find references to buildings and grounds, campus organizations and activities, courses and professors; but there is more than that at Olivet; and in a very real sense you will find here what you want to find.

Maybe that is why some find fault, although we cannot deny that we have our faults; but when that is all we find, or the most central thing to look at, that find is unfortunate. I read of a man who handed a glass of water to a friend, while asking him what he saw. The friend looked closely but saw nothing. Upon urging he looked longer and more carefully, and then joyfully declared he had found it. "There's a small speck of dirt in the bottom of the glass." He hadn't noticed the beauty of the glass, the high quality of the crystal, the clear sparkle of the water. He saw that infinitely small part that was bad.

Some will find failure, and that amounts to a mere tragedy. With the opportunities and challenges, with the fellowship and friendships, with God honored and blessing, with the inspiration and helpfulness of students and faculty, with more advantages than I can mention, what a tragedy to find but failure at Olivet!

Experience proves that many will find friends; and friendships formed in college are among the most enduring of life. I need not dwell upon the importance of proper friendships, for we recognize that our friends mark us for life. Nor do I need to enlarge on the desirability of many friends, when we remember that they will carry through the rest of our days. But I do urge that none will be content with a small circle, a tiny group, an isolationist fringe. Get into the middle of this grand group and make friends in every direction.

Then some will find themselves. And one of the compensations beyond silver and gold is that of witnessing the development of maturity and of having some part in bringing students to proper moorings, of guiding them to self-discovery and personality certainty, of watching youth find themselves in God's plan and become persons in the social community.

Enrollment Increases

Freshman class enrollment for this fall comes to a total of 268 as compared with last year's 189. An increase of 79 freshmen necessitated more housing provisions, this semester. Freshman class includes 146 men contrasted to 122 young ladies.

Sophomores boost a 162 for their class, while the juniors outnumber the seniors 135 to 120. Theological certificate students are 18, unclassified college, 39, and high school students number to 27. Eight are enrolled under ministerial studies, and 94 are listed under special sub-college students.

Dr. Ralph E. Perry, registrar of Olivet, reports a grand total of 880 registered students.

Last year somebody in Madison, Wisconsin, tried to find out how many people would sign the Declaration of Independence if it were passed around in the form of a petition. The majority were timid and unwilling to sign.

Now we have a reverse situation. The Penn State Daily Collegian circulated a petition reading: "We give the bearer of this petition permission, upon receipt of our signatures, to hang us by the neck until dead."

This clause was buried in the middle of an otherwise harmless petition. Of 165 students approached, 81 signed it.

Three Olivet students won Honorable Mention in the contest. 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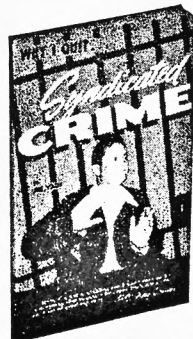
