BIBLE "AIRLIFT" CONTINUES

From Munich, Germany, Dr. Billy J. Hargis, chairman of the Bible Balloon Project of the International Council of Christian Churches, announced that 100,000 portions of the Bible were sent to Russia, Czechoslovakia, and Poland by hydrogen filled balloons from a launching site near Cham, Western Germany.

This is the second launching of Bible Balloons directed by Dr. Hargis this year in Germany. In the past three years, over a half million portions have been sent behind the "Iron Curtain" by the committee.

PRAYER IN THE U.N.

Henry Cabot Lodge, Chief United States delegate to the U. N., has proposed that all meetings of the U. N. General assembly be opened with audible prayer. He feels that the movement of silence that delegates now observe at the opening of the meeting is not sufficient.

"I propose that God should be openly and audibly involved at the U. N. in accordance with any one of the religious faiths which are represented here." he said. "I do so in the conviction that we cannot make the U. N. into a successful instrument of God's peace without God's help - and that with His help we cannot fail. To this end I propose that we ask for that help.' ANTI-ALCOHOL CAMPAIGN

In Sweden, in an attempt to cause Swedes to be "less alcohol-minded," the government has ordered unusual restrictions - all newspaper adds for alcoholic beverages have been barred for six months; advertising signs and billboards are to be darkened at night and covered by day.

BIBLE WINS TOP CULTURAL AWARD IN JAPAN CONTEST The colloquial Japanese edition of the Bible, published by the Japan Bible Society, has been chosen one of the top 12 books of the year by the Japanese newspaper "Mainichi" in a contest in which 20,000 books were submitted.

In interpreting what the selection meant to the Christian cause in its country, the National Chinese Council of Japan said; "The Mainichi" is one of the top three newspapers of Japan, and its annual award to the 12 top cultural publications is the most coveted prize in Japanese publication circles. It is equivalent to the classification of "The best books of the year." The publicity value is tremendous.

Dr. Reed believes Europeans are apprehensive about our foreign policy. They believe our foreign policy is often inconsistent. And perhaps it is, for while we are constantly crying for peace we are rearming.



Prof. Liddell sang "Theme and Variations from Jack and Jill" and Rev. Ross spoke of "the gift we have within us that of our Christian heritage."

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

The 26th annual field day held at Olivet Nazarene College on May 3, 1956, proved to be one of the most interesting events in the past few years.

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
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
