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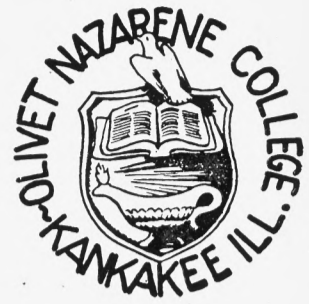

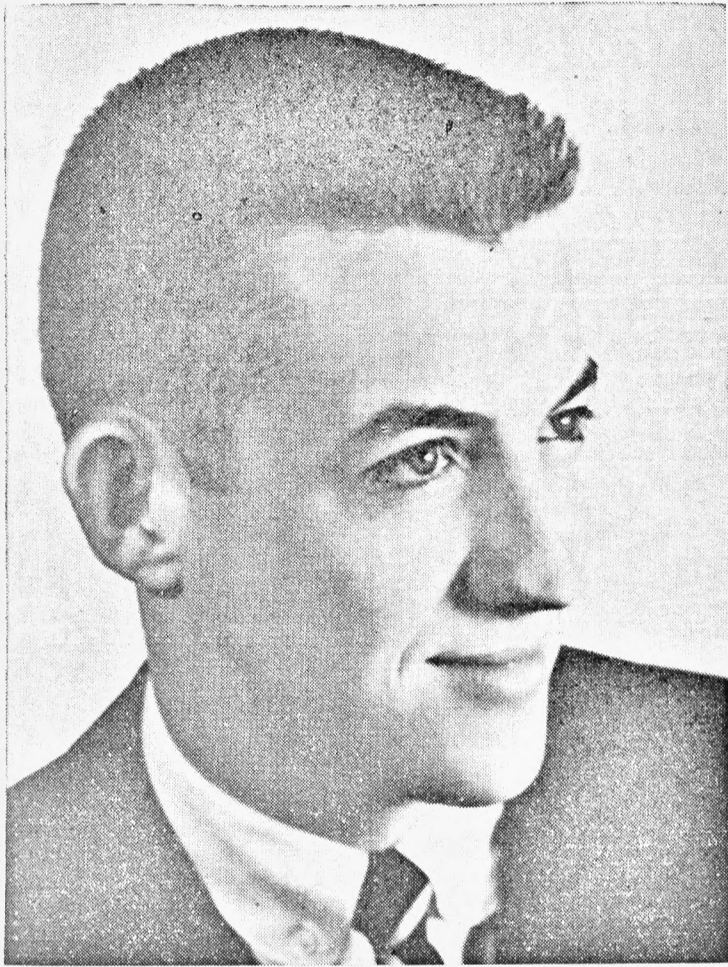

John Hanson of Elyria, Ohio is Olivet's student body treasurer-elect for the coming school year. John defeated Paul Basset in last week's election for this office.

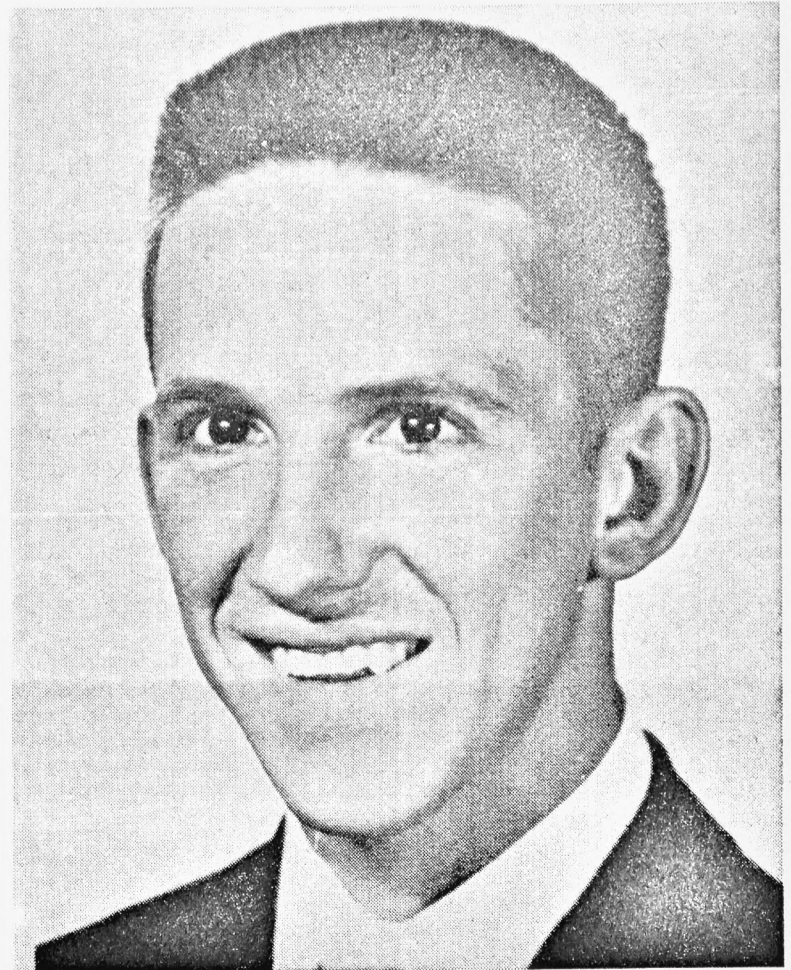

**BIBLE "AIRLIFT" CONTINUES**

From Munich, Germany, Dr. Billy J. Hargis, chairman of the Bible Balloon Project of the International Council of Christian Churches, announced that 100,000 portions of the Bible were sent to Russia, Czechoslovakia, and Poland by hydrogen filled balloons from a launching site near Cham, Western Germany.

This is the second launching of Bible Balloons directed by Dr. Hargis this year in Germany. In the past three years, over a half million portions have been sent behind the "Iron Curtain" by the committee.

**PRAYER IN THE U.N.**

Henry Cabot Lodge, Chief United States delegate to the U. N., has proposed that all meetings of the U. N. General assembly be opened with audible prayer. He feels that the movement of silence that delegates now observe at the opening of the meeting is not sufficient.

"I propose that God should be openly and audibly involved at the U. N. in accordance with any one of the religious faiths which are represented here," he said. "I do so in the conviction that we cannot make the U. N. into a successful instrument of God's peace without God's help - and that with His help we cannot fail. To this end I propose that we ask for that help."

**ANTI-ALCOHOL CAMPAIGN**

In Sweden, in an attempt to cause Swedes to be "less alcohol-minded," the government has ordered unusual restrictions - all newspaper adds for alcoholic beverages have been barred for six months; advertising signs and billboards are to be darkened at night and covered by day.

**BIBLE WINS TOP CULTURAL AWARD IN JAPAN CONTEST**

The colloquial Japanese edition of the Bible, published by the Japan Bible Society, has been chosen one of the top 12 books of the year by the Japanese newspaper "Mainichi" in a contest in which 20,000 books were submitted.

In interpreting what the selection meant to the Christian cause in its country, the National Chinese Council of Japan said; "The Mainichi" is one of the top three newspapers of Japan, and its annual award to the 12 top cultural publications is the most coveted prize in Japanese publication circles. It is equivalent to the classification of "The best books of the year." The publicity value is tremendous.

The award is particularly remarkable in view of the fact only one-half of one percent of the nation's population is Christian.

**Interview With Dr. Reed**

**American Foreign Policy; What Do The Europeans Think Of It?**

What do Europeans think of American foreign policy? To get an answer to this question I interviewed Dr. Reed who recently returned from Europe.

Dr. Reed believes Europeans are apprehensive about our foreign policy. They believe our foreign policy is often inconsistent. And perhaps it is, for while we are constantly crying for peace we are rearming.

It is pretty hard to condemn Russia for militarism when we are at it ourselves. Perhaps we cannot blame them for being a little wary of us.

While Europeans generally have a fear of Russia, other things tend to scare them more. One frightening thing to them is their loss of colonies.

While we back here condemn colonialization, we must remember that colonies are vital to the economy of countries like England and France. If

Europe should lose its trade with these nations, her sun would soon be setting.

**They Fear Revived Germany**

Another thing that Europeans fear is the fast rising German Republic. While Germany under the present regime is harmless, another Hitler could cause trouble indeed. With her potential power, Germany could have a distinct advantage over nearby countries like France and Italy in the event of future hostilities.

What has America done to allay these fears? She is helping Germany rearm and has been fence sitting on the colonial problem.

**Rearming A Necessity**

I also asked Dr. Reed if Europeans are in favor of general rearming. He answered that while they didn't like to, they admitted it was a necessity.

He also stated that the people of Europe wouldn't really have their heart in it if they had to fight another war. However, if the issues were clearly drawn, they would support us. Despite their misgivings about us, they still favor our system to that of Communism.

**Rev. T. Chrichton Mitchell Featured Speaker At First Annual Hymn Festival, May 5**

Rev. T. Chrichton Mitchell, noted authority on Wesleyan hymnody, was the speaker at Olivet's first annual Hymn Festival Saturday, May 5, in College Church.

Besides the combined college choirs, there were visiting choirs from Hammond First Church, Chicago First Church, Danville First Church, and Kankakee First Church. The 200 voice mass choir sang "A Mighty Fortress," "Amazing Grace," "How Firm A Foundation," and "The Lord's Prayer." Following this, Rev. Mitchell spoke.

One of Britain's outstanding clergymen, Rev. Mitchell, is making a return preaching tour of this country. He will deliver the commencement addresses at both the Nazarene Theological Seminary and Pasadena Nazarene College.

He will also represent the British Nazarenes at the quadrennial General Assembly of the Church of the Nazarene, convening in Kansas City, Mo., on June 17.

For several years The Reverend Mr. Mitchell has lectured in homiletics at Hurler Nazarene College in Glasgow, Scotland and Beach Lawn College near Bolton, England. During this time he has also pastored growing congregations in Paisley, Scotland, and Bolton, England—where he is presently serving as minister.

His book on John Wesley is soon to be published by an American firm.

Within the past few months Rev. Mitchell has lectured to gatherings of ministers in Scotland and in England. For six years he lectured to a Methodist conference in England on Charles Wesley's hymns. He is frequently engaged as a speaker at larger religious gatherings in Britain, both within and outside his own denomination.

For several years he has read a minimum of five books per week, along with the detailed studies in reference works necessary to sermon and lecture construction. He begins his reading regularly at 5:30 in the morning.

In spite of his busy schedule he finds time to rollie with his and Mrs. Mitchell's three children and—less often—to sit with other conservative Britons and watch a quiet game of cricket.

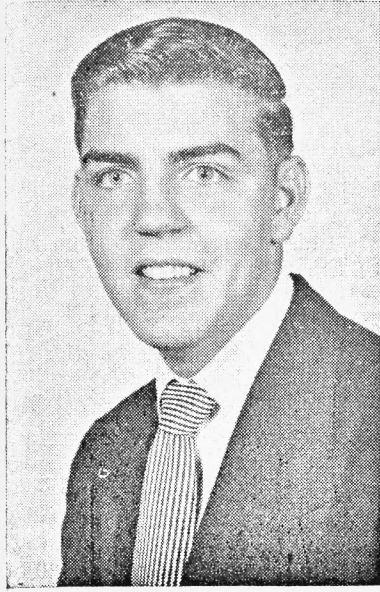
