SENIOR WEEK TO BEGIN TODAY WITH INVESTITURE PROGRAM

Investiture Day ceremonies held today, Friday, May 22, in Howe Chapel begin the Senior Week program. The graduating senior class turns over to the incoming senior class their rights and dignity, and the new Student Council officers are installed at that time.

On Sunday, May 24, the baccalaureate sermon will be delivered by Dr. Harold W. Reed in worship services at the College Church of the Nazarene at 10:30 a.m. The Annual Sermon service will be at 7:30 p.m. that day with the Rev. Mark Moore, district superintendent of the Chicago District of the Church of the Nazarene, the speaker.

The National Nazarene honor society, Phi Delta Lambda, will hold its annual banquet and confer awards Tuesday, May 26. Alumni Day, with presentation of distinguished alumni awards, is observed May 27 followed by the commencement concert at 8 p.m. in Birchard Field House.

Dr. G. B. Williamson will be the speaker at the commencement ceremonies to be held at 10 a.m. Thursday, May 28, in Birchard Field House. The commencement will end the undergraduate studies of 124 students. Forty-two Bachelor of Arts degrees, seventy-three Bachelor of Science degrees, twelve Bachelor of Theology degrees, and one Theological certificate will be awarded to the honorable seniors. A Doctor of Divinity degree will be conferred upon Rev. Orville L. Maish, of Michigan, and three Greene scholarships will be presented to three undergraduates: one junior, one sophomore, and one freshman. The College Marshal and the College Queen for the commencement exercises are Jeriel Beard and Dorothy Acord respectively. Each year the young man and the young lady in the junior class having the highest cumulative grade point averages are designated as College Marshal and College Queen and lead the commencement procession.

Student Wages To Increase In Fall

It was recently announced by Mr. Henderson, business manager of the college, that there will be an increase in student wages. Beginning in the fall semester of this year those students now earning less than \$1.00 per hour will automatically receive an hourly increase of \$.05.

According to the same report from the business office this hourly increase will effect everyone who is working for the college in any capacity; approximately 150 persons are said to be involved.

GRADUATE WORK TO INVOLVE FOUR OLIVETIAN MEN

Four members of the senior class of '59 have made graduate study plans involving university and foundation assistance. John Wyman has been selected for membership in the National Science Foundation Academic Institute for the 1959-60 academic year. Stipend and allowances total \$3,430 for the year.

Keith Johnson has been named a half-time assistant in chemistry at Michigan State University where he will do graduate work beginning in September. Keith's \$1,800 per year appointment will be principally chemistry laboratory teaching in the University College.

Maurice Howe, a history major, has received a \$700 scholarship to the University of Iowa to continue his graduate studies in this field.

George Dunbar, a post graduate student in the field of music education was appointed by Dr. H. W. Reed to be the recipient of the Olivet Nazarene Scholarship which is awarded by the University of Illinois in the amount of \$600.

Besides accompanying the above soloists on their numbers, the orchestra will be presenting "Finlandia" by Sibelius.

You have "made the grade," in more ways than one. There are many casualties, as you well know, between Freshman Orientation and Senior Investiture. We need not tarry here to seek the reasons. They are better known to you perhaps than to anyone else. At least they are more personal, for those who have dropped out are not to you mere statistics in some office file; they were your personal friends and classmates.

But you held on when others let go. You took the high hurdles in stride when others stumbled. No doubt you too thought many times that you could not make it, and were tempted to give up. Your diplomas will soon be in your hands because you solved problems that others could not solve, and because you "kept on keeping on."

Your college — its faculty, staff, and trustees — your friends, and especially your parents are proud of you and rejoice in your success.

Your transcript is the official record of your work here at Olivet. Your diploma is the seal of approval. But official documents do not record the whole story, and in the final analysis cannot record the most significant. These documents are in the main certifications of knowledge. They are indications but not guarantees of success.

Knowledge of itself is useless. Wrongly used it leads to folly. Rightly used it leads to wisdom. The proper end of education is not the acquisition of knowledge. This is only the narthex to the Temple of Education. Wisdom is the sanctuary of the temple. Any educational process that leaves you stranded in the narthex of life is not worthy of the name.

The profoundest question that education has ever faced was asked by Job when time was young, "But where shall wisdom be found? and where

is the place of understanding?" He searches in vain "to the ends of the earth," and "under the whole heaven." He then declares in triumph, "God understandeth the way thereof, and knoweth the place thereof . . . And unto man he said, Behold the fear of the Lord, that is wisdom, and to depart from evil is understanding."

(See the 28th chapter of Job.)

The same thought is stated many times in the Bible. "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom: and the knowledge of the holy is understanding." (Prov. 9:10)

We congratulate you, Seniors, on your accomplishments. But the task ahead is far greater. It is that of your knowledge into "the wisdom that is from above, (that) is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, and easy to be entreated, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality, and without hypocrisy." (James 3:17)

This is a lifetime task and will require the best that is in you. But again the Bible points the way. In one of Paul's greatest Christological statements we read of Christ, "In whom are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge." (Col. 2:3) The key to life's successes are in His hands. "Ye are complete in him."

We are confident that as you leave the halls of your Alma Mater (literally, fostering mother) that you will far excel our fondest hopes, and in the arena of life you will prove, as others before you are proving, the soundness of Olivet's basic educational philosophy of "Education with a Christian purpose." Olivet's reputation is now in your hands. We believe you will make good.

Ten thousand blessings on you, as you go with our prayers and best wishes to serve your day and generation according to the will of God!

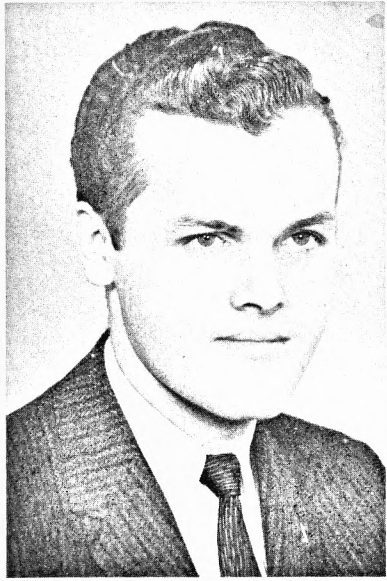

Students Give \$2,000; Missionary Project

The Missionary Band chooses each year a project for the whole student body. This is done under the direction of the Department of Foreign Missions of the Church of the Nazarene. Chosen for this year's project were two national workers' homes. One is located in Limbe and the other at Fort Johnston, Nyasaland, Africa.

The total cost of these homes was \$2,000. This amount was raised by weekly offerings in Chapel. Only one concentrated effort was made and that was in March when in one day nearly \$500 was contributed by students, faculty and staff. The money will be sent to the Department of Foreign Missions who will authorize the building of the homes.

The National Workers' homes will be occupied by national pastors. These are converted nationals who have been called into the ministry and are pastoring Nazarene churches in the mentioned places.

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OLIVET CANCELS EUROPEAN TOUR

Dr. Willis E. Snowbarger, Dean of the College, has announced that the European Study Tour for 1959 has been cancelled. There were a number of registrants for the tour, but not enough to make the trip possible.

Dr. Snowbarger has recommended that those who signed up for the tour join a shorter tour being conducted by Greenville College, a Free Methodist College located in Greenville, Illinois. That trip will cover approximately the same route, with the exception of the British Isles. The Greenville tour is being put on by the same tour agency.

No tour is being planned for the summer of 1960 as this is the General Assembly year; however, tentative plans are being formulated for a study tour the summer of 1961.

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Olivet To Increase Faculty and Courses

Olivet's continuous effort to constantly improve brings many changes in both its physical facilities and its faculty. Next semester we will see several new additions in the faculty.

Athel McCombs, who is completing his Ph.D in speech this summer at Purdue University, is coming to head the Department of Speech and to be the director of varsity debate.

The administration is encouraging the effort with budget and coaching time allowance. A new course in "Oral Interpretation of the Scriptures" will also be offered by Mr. McCombs.

Dr. Leroy Brown, who has been teaching only one-half time for two years, will resume full-time teaching duties at Olivet next fall. With Prof. Beeman continuing at one-half time this will give the strongest staff in speech the College has ever had.

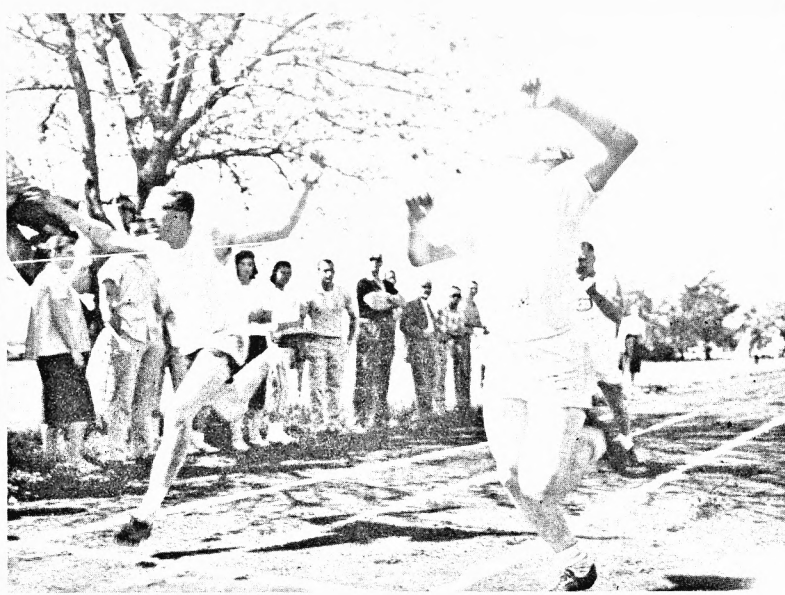

Indian Athletes Win Field Day! Two Records Set In Close Contest

Olivet's students and faculty, taking advantage of a "free" day on May 12, turned out en masse to watch as the three intramural societies vied for track and field honors on Field Day. The day was a complete success with record breaking performances turned in both by individual and team efforts.

The Indian Society cause, greatly aided by their women, proved to be the strongest. By their victory on Field Day they also secured for themselves the All-School Trophy. This proved to be a down-to-the-wire race with "winner take all." Although Dorothy Acord of the Trojan women contributed 11 points to their effort, the absence of more point winners hurt them badly.

Dale Reedy, a Trojan, turned in a fine time of 2:08.4 in the 880 yard run for a new record. The Trojan medley relay team of Dale Reedy, Burrell, Cook, and Dorsey, also established a new mark of 3:59.4. The former of these marks had stood for 10 years. Although the Trojan men outpointed the Indians 43 to 42, the Indian women more than offset that deficit scoring 30 to the Trojans 19. The final overall tabulation read: 1. Trojans, 72, 2. Indians, 63 and 3. Spartans, 28.

All-School Trophy Presented To The Indian Society

The climax of Field Day was the presentation of the awards in Birchard gymnasium last Tuesday evening, May 12. Letters were presented to all the men who lettered in softball, football, and basketball and also to the women who had lettered in softball and basketball. 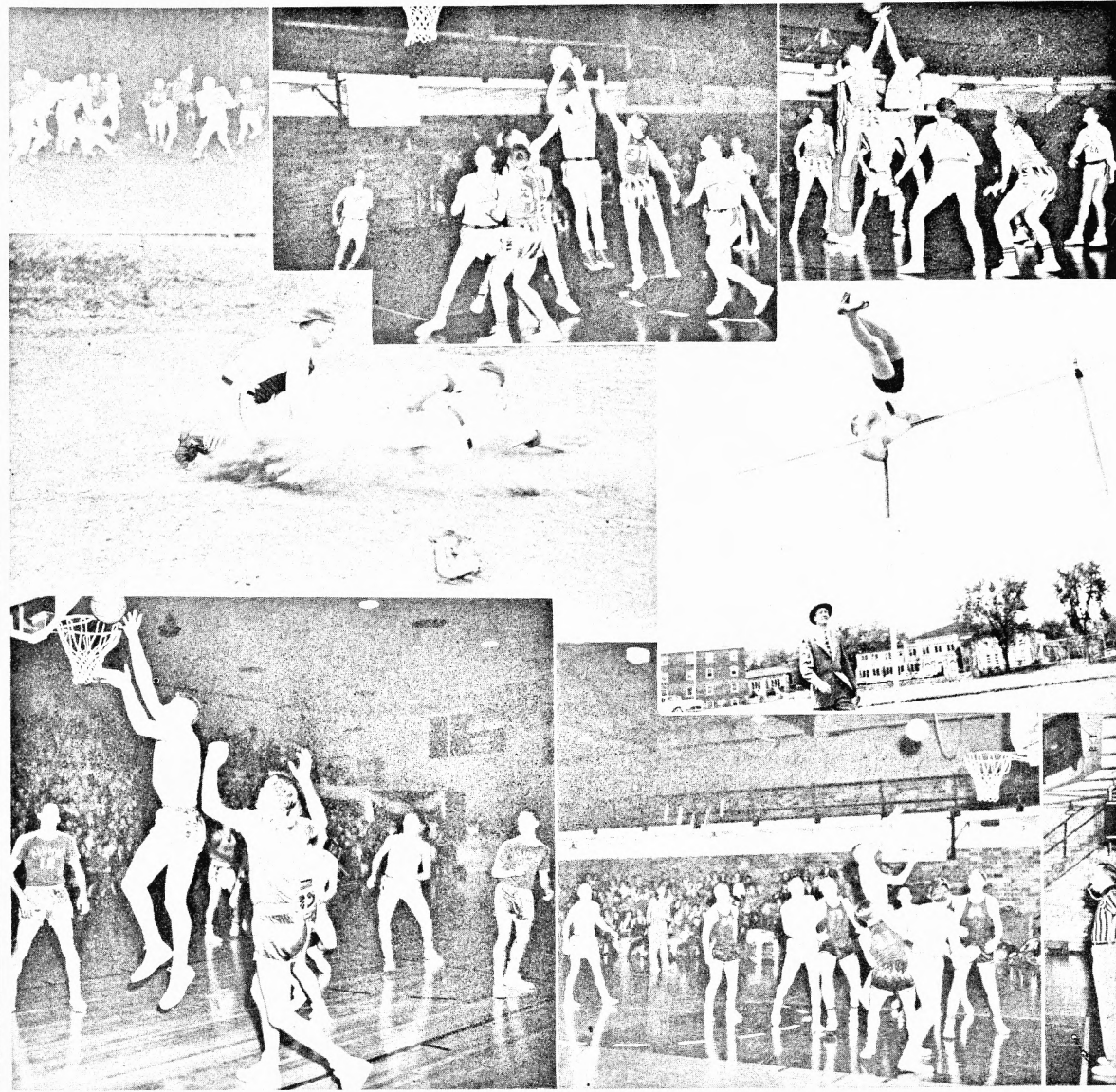

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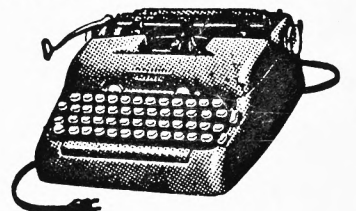
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
