Coastal Theater to present British playwright Harold Pinter's "The Homecoming"

As part of the Wheelwright Passport season, Coastal Carolina Theater will present British playwright Harold Pinter's "The Homecoming," on Wednesday, March 3 through Saturday, March 6 at 7:30 p.m.; and Sunday, March 7 at 3 p.m. All performances are open to the public and will be held in Wheelwright Auditorium. Tickets are \$8 and \$5 for students.

"The Homecoming" opened in London in 1965 to critical acclaim. The play has been described as a brilliant piece of writing that is brutal, funny, and tragic. Pinter is the author of other works such as "The Birthday Party," "The Caretaker," "No Man's Land," and "Betrayal."

"The Homecoming" is a story about a family of five men - a retired butcher, a chauffeur, a pimp, a boxer, and a philosophy professor - and their troubles when they invite one brother's wife, Ruth,

to join the family.

Sandi Shackelford, director of "The Homecoming," said in order to maintain the intimacy of the dramatic work, the audience will be seated on the stage around a thrust set; seating is limited to 115 each night. Shackelford has directed college theater productions such as "And Miss Reardon Drinks a Little," "Aunt Dan and Lemon," Bus Stop," and "1959 Pink Thunderbird." In addition, Shackelford performs "An Audience With Fanny Kemble," a one-woman dramatization based on the writings of the 19th century actress, feminist, and abolitionist.

Committee to study alternative management styles

Chancellor Ingle has named a joint faculty/staff committee to study alternative management styles for the college's administration. The focus of the committee will be on management methods, administrative philosophy, values, and responsibilities.

Faculty member leads NATO workshop in The Netherlands

Richard Dame, Palmetto Professor and faculty member of the Marine Science Department, recently directed a NATO Advanced Research Workshop at Castle Moermond in The Netherlands.

The workshop, entitled "Bivalve Filter Feeders and Marine Ecosystem Processes," was attended by 32 leading scientists from NATO countries, including Belgium, Canada, France, Germany, The Netherlands, Spain, United Kingdom, and the United States. The three-day meeting focused on past accomplishments and future research needs in the areas of water dynamics; bivalve nutrition and growth; predation of mollusks, crabs, and birds; primary food sources and feeding rates; nutrient cycling in systems dominated by bivalves; and system modeling and management of bivalve systems for human use.

During the workshop, Dame presented a paper, "The Role of Bivalve Filter

Feeder Material Fluxes in Coastal Ecosystems." Presentations from the meeting will be published in a book by Springer-Verlag of Heidleberg that is scheduled for December printing.

Dame has been on temporary leave from Coastal since summer 1992 when he was named director of the Ecosystems Studies Program at the National Science Foundation (NSF) in Washington, D.C. He also was named the NSF representative to the National Wetlands Committee.

Dame earned a bachelor's degree in biology from the College of Charleston, a master's degree in zoology and ecology from the University of North Carolina, and a Ph.D. in biology and marine studies from the University of South Carolina. He joined the Coastal faculty in 1971 and served as chair of the Marine Science Department until 1991, when he was named the first Palmetto Professor in the

University, where she is the program information coordinator for the Cooperative Extension Service, Youth Development 4-H.
