

Coastal racism conference for children selected as Program of Excellence

"Calling All Colors," a race unity conference for children held at Coastal in January 1992, has been named a Program of Excellence by the National University Continuing Education Association. The award is one of three given in the association's Region III, an area comprised of 12 Southeastern states and Puerto Rico.

"Calling All Colors" was clearly the program that showed the most imagination and the greatest public service," said Stephen Langston, an administrator from Georgia State University, who chaired the selection committee.

"It is especially pleasing to receive regional recognition for 'Calling All Colors,' said Audrey Garland. Garland and Ginny Kintz, graduate assistant, accepted the award at the NUCEA regional meeting Oct. 15. "Calling All Colors" was coordinated through Graduate and Continuing Education. The conference attracted 100 registrants in the third through eighth grades. Participants focused on ways to overcome racial stereotypes and become more culturally sensitive.

Anisa Kintz, the 9-year-old Conway student who organized the conference, was named President Bush's 750th Daily Point of Light in April 1992. The honor attracted national media attention - and the attention of Disney studios. Kintz also was featured on a two-hour Disney special focusing on the Point of Light award recipients aired July 4, 1992 on CBS. Kintz and six other children from around the country will be featured with the Rev. Jesse Jackson on a Disney Channel special on children combatting racism; the program will be aired Wednesday, Dec. 9.

Marine and Wetland Studies to host wetlands forum

The Center for Marine and Wetland Studies will host part three of the annual Fall Forum, "Wetlands as Filters," on Thursday, Nov. 19 at 7 p.m. at the Myrtle Beach Martinique Hotel, 7100 North Ocean Boulevard, Myrtle Beach. The forum is free and open to the public.

Included on the panel of professionals for "Wetlands as Filters" are: Quinton Epps of the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control; Larry Schwartz, environmental planner with Grand Strand Water and Sewer Authority; and Glenn Guntenspergen of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service National Wetland Research Laboratory. The panel will be moderated by Katherine Taylor of Coastal's Center for Marine and Wetland Studies. The panel will accept questions from the public.

The annual Fall Forum serves to promote the exchange of information and discussion of pressing environmental issues facing the Grand Strand.

The Center for Marine and Wetland Studies is partially funded through the Horry County Higher Education Commission. Its mission is to facilitate research of the marine and wetland environment of the area. Ongoing projects include studies of coastal erosion, relative sea level changes, mineral resources and geological framework, wetlands, and water quality.

Author Franklin Burroughs to present readings

Author and Conway native Franklin Burroughs will present readings from his works on Monday, Nov. 9 from 3 to 5 p.m. in GCEC 003. The reading is free and open to the public; registration is recommended.

The program is co-sponsored by Coastal's Waccamaw Center for Cultural and Historical Studies and Graduate and Continuing Education. Charles Joyner will introduce the speaker.

Burroughs is the author of *Billy Watson's Croker Sack*, published in 1991 and 1992, and *Horry and Waccamaw*, published in 1992. He will read from his books and from works in progress.

Billy Watson's Croker Sack was an editor's choice of The Book-of-the-Month Club. One of the essays in the book, which originally appeared in *The Georgia Review*, was published in *Best American Essays for 1989* and two other essays in the book

were given honorable mention.

"I have read the essay 'Snapping Turtle in June,' in the *Georgia Review* and it really knocked me out," Charles Joyner said. "He (Burroughs) is an essayist of the quality of Emerson and Thoreau."

Burroughs is the son of Franklin G. and Geraldine Burroughs of Conway. A 1960 graduate of Conway High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in 1964 from the University of the South in Sewanee, Tenn.; a master's degree in 1965 and a Ph.D. in English in 1970, both from Harvard University. He and his wife and children live in Maine, where he teaches English at Bowdoin College. He has been a member of the Bowdoin College faculty since 1968.

Archaeological conference to be held

An archaeological conference, titled "A Conference on Site Formation Processes: Bioturbation and Gravity as a Significant Factor," will be held Saturday, Nov. 14 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Little Theater. The conference is free and open to the public; registration is not necessary. Conference participants will have the opportunity to review the polarity of available data and discuss varied interpretations.

Keynote speakers include international scholar Donald Johnson and conference organizer Jim Michie. A professor at the University of Illinois, Johnson has seen the methodology highlighted in the conference in various regions throughout the world.

Michie and Johnson independently discovered the process which is based on the premise that underground disturbances by plants and animals displace artifacts and cause downward movement. The method rejects traditional theories of site burial. According to Michie,

the formation process was initially viewed as radical due to its non-traditional nature, but is being accepted by a growing body of scholars.

Michie said he expects archaeologists and soil scientists from South Carolina, Georgia, and North Carolina to attend the conference.

The conference is funded, in part, by a grant from the South Carolina Sea Grant Consortium.

With 17 years of professional archaeological experience, Michie has led excavations at Richmond Hill and Wachesaw plantations; through mid-December he is leading a search for ruins of *The Oaks*, the plantation home of wealthy rice planters who lived in the Waccamaw Neck in the 1700s and 1800s. He joined the Coastal faculty in 1990 and is associate director of the Waccamaw Center for Cultural and Historical Studies at the college.

Oral history of Horry County is focus of programs for TV

The first segment of Coastal's Horry County Oral History Project will be aired on South Carolina Educational Television, WHMC TV-23 in Conway, on Saturday, Nov. 7 at 5 p.m. The 30-minute program, "Wood and Water," records memories from elderly citizens about wood and water in Horry County - including logs, rivers, swamps, bridges, boats, ponds, trees and the Intracoastal Waterway.

Excerpts from the second part of the project, "Horry Stories," can be seen on WBTW TV-13's "Daywatch" on Friday, Dec. 4, 11 and 18 and Thursday, Dec. 24, aired from noon to 12:30 p.m.

Portions of "Horry Stories" also will be aired during "Southern Style" on WCOX 5 on Friday, Jan. 8, 15, 22 and 29 at 10 a.m. and 7:30 p.m.

Since 1989, more than 40 people have been interviewed about the history of Horry County. The results of the interviews have been produced in three parts ("Wood and Water," "Horry Stories," and "No Match For Our Dad") in VHS form and are available for check-out through Kimbel Library, the Horry-Georgetown Technical College library and public libraries in Horry County.

Randall Wells, project coordinator, said the project was funded, in part, by the South Carolina Humanities Council, a state program of the National Endowment for the Humanities. The project was awarded a \$7,534 grant, matched by the college, from the South Carolina Humanities Council.

David Parker was the technical director for the programs and Catherine Heniford Lewis, historian and former librarian for Horry County, served as a consultant, writer and speaker. ~
