Coastal offers PBS series on Total Quality Management

A two-part series on Total Quality Management will be offered on Wednesday, Sept. 9 from 1 to 4 p.m. and Thursday, Oct. 1 from 2 to 5 p.m. in GCEC 003. Presented by PBS via satellite, the teleconference is \$20 per session or \$35 for both parts. Fees will be waived for Coastal faculty and staff.

The brainchild of W. Edwards Deming, Total Quality Management emphasizes customer and employee involvement in problem-solving.

The first segment of the series, *Improving Service with TQM and Controlling Costs in the Public Sector*, features the application of TQM used by Joseph Sensenbrenner during his three terms as mayor of Madison, Wis. As program moderator, Sensenbrenner shares cost-cutting, morale-boosting TQM techniques that have been copied in numerous cities.

The second part of the series, *The Project Process*, describes step-by-step ways to begin a TQM plan for your own organization. The program also includes a panel discussion by public sector experts who have witnessed TQM transformations within their organizations.

Sensenbrenner was deputy attorney general for the state of Wisconsin and mayor of Madison, Wis. from 1983 to 1989. He became a TQM convert when he saw the radical cost and time savings the techniques produced during his tenure as mayor. He is a business consultant to governments implementing TQM.

Kintz received national media attention in January 1992 when she organized "Calling All Colors," a race unity conference at Coastal for children that attracted 100 registrants in the third through eighth grades. She was nine years old when she was named President Bush's 750th Point of Light in April 1992.

Files is a teacher, author, and speaker in the fields of whole language, teacher collaboration, and children at-risk. She is the director of Coastal Writing Project.

New appointments announced by Chancellor

Acting athletic director/associate athletic director

Interim Chancellor Ron Ingle has appointed Andy Hendrick acting athletic director at Coastal, effective Aug. 31. Hendrick, an attorney, is an associate professor of business administration.

Ingle also appointed Jess Dannelly associate athletic director for administration, effective Aug. 31.

The appointments come in the wake of the resignation of Ed Green, who has been athletic director for the Big South school for three years. Green will remain at Coastal through June 1993 to assist with fund-raising and marketing for the athletic program.

In announcing the acting athletic director's appointment, Ingle said, "Andy Hendrick's experience in the Big South and NCAA and familiarity with NCAA regulations, combined with his faculty rank will ensure the continued close relationship between academics and athletics at Coastal Carolina College." Ingle said Hendrick will maintain his tenured faculty position in the Wall School of Business Administration and Computer Science and will continue his teaching responsibilities.

Hendrick said, "The major challenge Coastal faces is to assure our Division I status, which requires that we increase our scholarship base and add two sports within this academic year. The coaching staff at the college has consistently produced outstanding teams with limited resources. I look forward to working with this outstanding group of leaders, who, I am confident, will continue their commitment to Coastal Carolina College athletics. I also look forward to working with Jess Dannelly on a daily basis. Over

the years I have come to respect his talents and knowledge about athletics and admire the hard work he has done for Coastal."

Hendrick earned a bachelor's degree in education from the University of South Carolina in 1973 and a juris doctor degree from the University of South Carolina School of Law in 1976. He has maintained a part-time legal practice since he joined the Coastal faculty in 1980 as an assistant professor of business administration. He has been municipal judge for the city of Conway since 1987 and is temporary municipal judge for the town of Pawleys Island.

Hendrick has been the faculty athletics representative to the National Collegiate Athletic Association since 1984. He was chair of the Southeastern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) Committee on Athletics from 1987 to 1990, a member of the Commissioner Search Committee for the Big South Conference in 1988, and chair of the athletic director Search Committee at Coastal in 1986. He has been a member of the Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics since 1983.

Dannelly is assistant director of athletics NCAA compliance officer, head coach of the women's softball team, and equipment supervisor for physical education. He joined the Coastal faculty in 1984 as instructor of physical education, assistant athletic director, and assistant baseball coach. Dannelly was athletic director at USC Salkehatchie from 1975 to 1984. He earned a bachelor's degree in health and physical education from the University of South Carolina in 1974. ~

State law requires cost disclosure in certain publications

The 1992-1993 South Carolina Appropriation Act includes a proviso requiring state governmental bodies to include specific information about printing costs in bound publications.

Total printing cost, total number of documents printed, and cost per unit must be included on the last printed page of all bound publications. This information must be included regardless of source of funds. Items printed for resale are exempt.

A bound publication is defined as

information printed for distribution and put together by any of the following methods: saddle stitching, perfect binding, side stapling, plastic binding, wire binding, or glue.

The new Public Relations/Publications request form has a box in the "printing specifications" section that must be checked if the publication is to be bound. If you have any questions regarding the state law, contact Cathy McPherson in Public Relations. ~
