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Next Lessons from the Field Seminar Looks at Supporting Diverse Family Systems

Did you know that two of every five births in the United States are in non-marital families and that one in five fathers today has children with more than one woman?

At the next Lessons from the Field seminar on October 22, Kathryn Edin, Ph.D., and James McHale, Ph.D., will share their knowledge and insights about how we support and promote alliances among adults who share parenting responsibilities. The seminar is entitled "Children in Common: Ensuring the Emotional Well-Being of Children When Parenting Apart."

Edin, who is a <u>Bloomberg Distinguished Professor in the Department of Sociology at John Hopkins University</u>, is a unique researcher. She and her husband moved their family to Camden, NJ, to immerse themselves in a city with high rates of urban poverty. There she developed a deep appreciation for the struggles of her neighbors. In the words of Stephanie Mencimer, a writer for Mother Jones, Edin "turned sociology upside down." To honor her work, Johns Hopkins University awarded her a Bloomberg Distinguished Professorship in 2014.

At the fall Lessons from the Field seminar, Edin will tell stories that exemplify her work. She will address misassumptions about unmarried women in poverty who choose to have children and parents who live with welfare assistance Edin also will challenge listeners to envision interventions that foster healthy families. Among her publications are two books: Promises I Can Keep: Why Poor Women Put Motherhood Before Marriage and Doing the Best I Can: Fatherhood in the Inner City.

McHale, who is the Director of the University of South Florida St. Petersburg's Family Study Center, is a leading researcher on coparenting dynamics in diverse family systems. Through his work with parents who might otherwise appear poor parent risks, he has developed coparenting interventions for fragile families. His recorded interviews with non-married partners reveal astonishing insights into creating strong parent roles. Together, McHale and Edin will provide a rich commentary about families' efforts to raise children even when they are not living together and will focus on interventions that respect and support these efforts.

This seminar is co-hosted by the University of Minnesota Extension Center for Family Development's Children, Youth & Family Consortium (CYFC) and Parents Forever™ program. The seminar, which will be conducted at the McNamara Alumni Center on the University of Minnesota East Bank campus (in Minneapolis), will be broadcast live to more than 25 sites throughout Minnesota and will be available nationally via live web stream.
