Pre-Registration Change, Salary Resolution Passed

After extensive discussion, the six-point faculty salary and benefit resolution and pre-registration recommendations introduced by the University Chapter of the American Association of University Professors were passed by the Faculty Council Monday.

The Council endorsed the principle of the resolution, said Dr. M. R. Gutsch, secretary of the Council, but further action on it must be carried out by the President and Board of Regents.

Legislative action and constitutional amendment will be required for certain points of the resolution, he said, and perhaps consultation of an insurance company for point five.

The resolution requested salary increases for all University personnel; extension of health service facilities to staff members; increased old-age retirement protection; an on-campus faculty center with eating facilities; increase or supplementation of the group term life insurance now available to staff members; and the establishment of faculty grants to give full-time faculty members seeking 'doctors' degrees at other institutions \$1,000 per year during the period of study.

Danish Astrophysicist New Observatory Head

McDonald Astronomical Observatory, located in Fort Davis, and jointly operated by the Universities of Texas and Chicago, will have a new director January 1.

Dr. Bengt Stromgren, internationally known Danish physicist, has been appointed to replace Dr. Gerard P. Kuiper, who resigned recently. In the interim between Dr. Kuiper's resignation and the appointment of a new director, a four-man board, headed by Dr. Otto Stuve, has been heading the activities of the observatory.

Dr. Stromgren has also been chosen chairman of the Department of Astronomy at the University of Chicago, and director of that institution's Yerkes Observatory in Wisconsin.

Legislature Receives Teachers Report-card

Three big issues will be presented to the next session of the state legislature December 11, concerning higher education in Texas, John D. Moseley, executive director of the legislative council, told a joint meeting of the Texas State Teachers Association and the College Classroom Teachers Association last evening.

Interested in raising the professional standards of the college teaching profession in Texas, the Association points to the low pay rates teachers now receive and gives statistics to support its views.

Dr. J. T. Patterson Awarded Elliot Science Medal

Dr. J. T. Patterson, distinguished professor of zoology, has been notified by the National Academy of Sciences that he has been awarded the Daniel Giraud Elliot Gold Medal for 1947. Though presented annually, several years are required to determine the value of published research work.

Dr. Patterson was given the award in recognition of his contributions to genetics, particularly his papers on "Isolating Mechanisms" contained in Volume V, "Studies in the Genetics of Drosophila," issued by the University Press. Presentation will be made at the annual meeting of the Academy in Washington, D.C., on April 23-25, 1951.

Parker to Inspect Army ROTC Units

Maj. Gen. Edwin P. Parker, provost marshal general of the United States Army, will inspect Army ROTC units at the University November 28 and 29, and will attend the A&M game here Thanksgiving day.
