Policy Trumps Politics in the Choices of Voters in Democratic Primaries and Caucuses

The conventional wisdom is that voters in Democratic primaries and caucuses are preoccupied with defeating President George W. Bush. Who can beat Bush is all Democratic voters care about.

A close analysis of exit polls from nine Democratic primaries and the Iowa Caucus reveals that government policy dominated judgments about electability or who could beat Bush. In addition, Democratic voters are not fixated on the War in Iraq, as has been widely assumed. The economy and jobs along with health care and Medicare ranked much higher in the minds of voters than the War in Iraq.

John Kerry's success rests with convincing voters in the Democratic primaries and caucuses – a slice of the electorate that tends to be far more liberal than voters in November – that he shares their policy views and is electable. Although Democratic voters were split on whether they agreed with Kerry's issue positions overall, they overwhelming agreed that he could beat Bush and tended to support his views on the top issues of health care and Medicare, the Iraq War, and, to a lesser extent, the economy and jobs.

These findings emerge from exit polling by the National Election Pool, a consortium of five television networks and the Associated Press.

Democratic Voters Focused on Policy

Voters in all of the nine states that held Democratic primaries over the past month have consistently indicated that agreement on major issues tops defeating Bush as their primary reason for choosing a candidate. Graph 1 shows that by wide margins Democratic voters put a higher priority on issue agreement than beating Bush. In no state did voters put the defeat of Bush as their principal consideration. (Table 1 in the Appendix provides detailed information.)

Although Democratic voters placed issues over electability, they disagreed over which candidate represented their views on issues overall even as they converged on Kerry as best positioned to beat Bush. Graph 2 shows that majorities in eight of the nine primary states agreed that Kerry offered the best prospect for winning; even in South Carolina (which Johns Edwards won), Kerry was seen as electable as Edwards. Democratic voters,

though, split on whether Kerry or another candidate best represented their issue positions overall. (Voters in New Hampshire and Arizona did not clearly tilt toward one candidate in particular.) Put simply, voters who put the highest priority on defeating Bush latched onto Kerry; voters who were most concerned about issue agreement overall split their support among the candidates. (Table 1 in the Appendix provides detailed information.)


Worries about the Home Front Dominate Concerns about the War in Iraq

The conventional wisdom is that the War in Iraq is the most important issue in the minds of Democratic voters. Indeed, Howard Dean staked his campaign on his unstinting opposition to Iraq.

Exit polls from the nine primary states and the Iowa Caucus show, however, that voters were preoccupied with the domestic front rather than the Iraq War. Graph 3 reveals that the economy and jobs along with health care and Medicare mattered most to voters in all 10 states. (In Delaware, 35 percent ranked the economy and jobs as their first concern while 20 percent identified health care and Iraq as mattering most.) In no state did Democrats single out Iraq as mattering most in the selection of a candidate. (Table 2 in the Appendix provides detailed information.)

Although Graph 2 indicated that Democratic voters who were primarily concerned about issues were a bit divided among the candidates, John Kerry consistently drew the largest share of votes for his positions on the top three issues in the campaign – health care/Medicare, the Iraq War, and, to a lesser extent, the economy/jobs. Graph 4 indicates that Kerry's positions on the economy/jobs mattered most in eight states; his views on Iraq were preferred in seven states; and he held a narrow advantage on the economy/jobs in five states (voters did not clearly differentiate among the candidates in two states). 

"Did you vote for your candidate today more because you think: he can defeat George W. Bush in November; he agrees with you on the major issues."



Graph 2. Candidate Qualities that Clearly Mattered Most in Determining Vote Choice


"Which one issue mattered most in deciding whom you are supporting today?"
