What are "Open Access Textbooks"?

- Textbooks written with Creative Commons license: can be used and adapted by anyone
- Textbooks tailored to specific courses
- * Accessed electronically, with an option to print
- * Free!

PDXScholar

- PDX Scholar is a publishing platform that is part of the PSU Library
- * PSU has been publishing open access textbooks since Winter 2015
- * In the first 6 months=
 - over 300 downloads
 - * PSU students saved over \$23,000 on textbook costs

Conclusions and final thoughts

- Open Access Textbook publishing is a growing trend in higher education
- * There are almost no OATs in the ESL/EFL field
- * Authors are able to create content based on curricular needs
- Open Access Textbooks offer flexibility to authors and students
