Ricentennial Day was held on campus on Wednesday, April 28. The day-long program featured a special Bioentennial Chapel program, picnic lunch, recreational activities with competition between dorms, movies, vesper services and a dance. It was truly a most anjoyable day for the Gardner-Webb family.

The Fellowship of Christians United in Service enjoyed its best year ever during 1975-76. Over one hundred and forty students at Gardner-Webb College had opportunities to perticipate in 43 revivals held throughout Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Florida during the year. The revival team is a most important aspect of a student's education and opportunity to share Christ. When the teams are invited to a church for a weekend revival the students live in the homes of the church members. Each student has an important part in the revival team, such as preaching, directing music, playing the organ or plane, singing solos, teaching a Sunday School class, sharing a personal testimony, or leading in fellowships. The FOCUS teams had more requests than

McGraw Receives Honorary Degree From

College



DR. THOMAS J. McGRAW Thomas J. McGraw, acting president of Gardner-Webb

College, received the honorery distree of Doctor of Laws during the 89th annual spring commencement exercises of Campbell College on May 10 The bonor, according to Dr. Norman A. Wiggins, president of Gardner-Webb's sister institution, near Raleigh, was in consideration of McGraw's major contribution to the development of Gardner-Webb as a senior institution during its

recent years of advance to senior college standing. Gardner-Webb's Southern Regional Accreditation, first received in 1979, was reaffirmed last December by the Southern Annicietion of Colleges and Universities. As vice-president for academic affairs since 1969, McGraw has given major leadership in the self-studies and other parti-

culars of academic and administrative development preliminery to qualifying Gardner-Webb for its present full recognition as a senior college. A graduate of Gardner-Webb, who has had his further

higher education at Wake Forest, Appalachian State, and Duke universities, McGraw moved from public school administration to his first position at Gardner-Webb, director of development, in 1962. He has had successive additions of responsibility at vice-presidential levels, having become in 1973 executive vice-president and dean of the college. He has been serving as acting resoldent since February of this year.

Since 1971, when be was named its alumnus of the year, President Wigning noted, he has been cited twice by trustees, faculty, and staff of his own college for outstanding contributions to its progress.

Receiving similar recognition with Dr. McGraw in the awarding of bonorary degrees during the graduation caremonies were Dr. Carlyle Campbell, president emeritus of Meredith College, son of the founder of Campbell: retiring U.S. Congressman David Henderson, who is a member of the school's presidential board of advisors; the Reverend Jimmy Morriss, director of the A.J. The internship program piaces students with cooperating business firms or other organizations for a full-time semester of work experience during their Junior or Senior year. The work experience is supervised by an individual designated by the comnany or organization within which the student is employed. The student is actually enrolled in BA 320-In-

ternship, which carns the student 15 semester hours credit as well as providing him with valuable reactical experience. The student's grada is determined by the faculty coordinator after be receives evaluations from the student and his supervisor.

The internship program was initisted in 1972 under the guidence of Mrs. Helyn Lowery and Mr. Deck Andrews of the GWC Department of Business Administration. Since that time more than 40 students have purticinated in the program which limits
