Dr. Henson Will Direct Division of Psychology And Education

Dr. James P. Henson has been appointed director of the Division of Psychology and Education at Gardner-Webb College and will also be Chairman of the Department of Psychology in the new senior college curriculum.

Dr. R. F. Caithness will be Chairman of the Department of Education and will continue as Director of Alumni Affairs.

Prior to this move, the Psychology Department was a part of the newly formed Department of Education. When it was decided to offer a major in each, a division was set up, including a supportive studies in Library Sciences. Dr. Henson has the doctorate from Indiana University with a specialty in Educational Psychology. A native of Rutherville, Dr. Henson has the B.S. and the M.A. from Appalachian State University, and the B.D. Degree from Southeastern Seminary.

Dr. Caithness has the doctorate from Florida State University, the M.A. Degree from I-S-C in Columbia, S. C. and the undergraduate degree from Presbyterian College. He was principal of Ashley High School in Columbia for 14 years.

Gardner-Webb will be uniting elementary and secondary teachers as part of the new four year program. Concentration in Library Science will qualify public school teachers to serve as teacher librarians in both accredited elementary and secondary schools.

Thomas J. McGraw Named Vice-President In Charge of Academic Affairs

Thomas J. McGraw has been appointed vice-president of academic affairs at Gardner-Webb College by college trustees.

Dr. Henry Smith is the only newcomer to the administration and he will be assistant to the president in fund raising, public relations and administrative affairs.

McGraw moves into this new post from a position as vice-president in charge of public relations, fund raising, and administrative affairs. A graduate of Gardner-Webb College and Wake Forest University, McGraw attended Kings Mountain public schools and graduated from Kings Mountain High School. He has the M.A. Degree from Appalachian State University and did additional study at Duke University. His World War II service in the U. S. Navy and before coming to GW was a coach and teacher at Wallace, Madison and Newton-Conover and

the supervisor of Catawba County in charge of listing and assessing over \$12 million in property. He served as vice-president of the N. C. Association of Assessment Officers and in 1962 came to Gardner-Webb as director of development. McGraw is married to the former Betty Falls of Lumberton and they have three daughters. During the 1965 commencement exercises, he was cited by the college for his contributions to education and youth.

Dr. Lewis is a native of Mississippi and has held the post of academic dean for two years, coming into it from the GW faculty. A graduate of Mississippi College, Dr. Lewis has the B.D. and Th.D. from the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and in 1966 received the M.A. in Biblical Hebrew from John Hopkins University in Baltimore, Md.

Losers were the toast of a Kansas prairie city last week after demonstrating every attribute of courage, skill and sportsmanlike conduct when they came out to play. The stateless Huskies, Kans., and the National basketball tournament.

The Gardner-Webb College Bulldogs, down by 22 points at midway of the first half, came plodding back to make the nation's number two major college team go three overtimes for a victory. Three pep rallies on the street in front of the Baker Hotel had fans grinning and chattering. At 8:30 p.m. "80 edition" to the greatest show in Kansas, Professional JUCO, form adopted the bulldog southerners and weren't disappointed. The first loss to Robert Morris of Pittsburgh, Pa., only brought about another pep rally and the stopping of traffic. It received statewide coverage in Kansas and the "Dogs" didn't let these new found fans down. They roared back to whip Beyond of Florida, 80-75.

This brought them to an historic clash. In the focus bracket were the highly-touted, sophomore players from Phoenix. Unknown at 32-0 when they arrived and the victim of an upset, this squad was dysmorphic. They came out and ripped the GW lads to pieces for 12 minutes. Still the GW fans screamed support. Suddenly it began to happen. Down by 13-9, the Dog's little New York guard, Steve Kebbeck, came alive with character and hit those long field goals. Arnie Gilmore and Eric Fleming of Gardner-Webb College were named to the National Junior College All American basketball team today.

Gilmore, 7-2 center, was named to the second team and Fleming was given honorable mention. Both were instrumental in the Bulldogs' drive to 10th in the nation and an impressive 31-3 record.

Gilmore averaged 22 points a game and pulled down 386 rebounds while Fleming had a 22.1 average and grabbed 354 rebounds. Neither player has indicated their future plans, despite rumors in several newspapers that they

will leave GW for major colleges. Gilmore scored 769 points during the 36 game season, hitting 60.6% from the floor and 56.1% from the foul line. Fleming had 798 points with a 36.1 percentage from the floor and a 66.8 percentage from the charity line.
