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COLLEGE'S FUTURE RESTS IN HANDS OF CONVENTION

The destiny of Gardner-Webb College now rests in the hands of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

A vote of the convention in early November at Raleigh will bring a conclusive decision to seven years of hard work and progress by the college toward hoped-for four year status. Dr. E. Eugene Poston, president, recommended this move in his Decade of Advance proposals mapped out in 1961 following his resignation as president.

Gardner-Webb enters the convention with a recommendation from the General Board of the State Baptist Convention. The next-to-last step in over a year of study came July 16 at Campbell College as the 110 member body met in a regular session.

R. N. Stearns, chairman of the Council on Christian Higher Education of the Baptist State Convention, made the motion and the second came from Hubert Honeycutt, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Valdosta. The motion was to approve a recommendation of the executive committee of the General Board and to recommend to the convention that Gardner-Webb be allowed to become a four year school when, in the judgment of the trustees and administration of the college, requirements for accreditation could be met.

Opposition to the 1968-69 move from Dr. Cecil Sherman, pastor

of First Baptist Church of Asheville, who stated that becoming a senior college had created (for Mars Hill College) agony at the point of accreditation and resulted in great pressure on N. C. Baptists to turn to other means for advancing that they had just gone before.

Dr. E. Eugene Poston, president of Gardner-Webb, said the board members that GW is already spending more per student than would be required by the Southern Association for a senior college of the same size as GW.

He said the college plans to limit the number of majors and to retain basically a trinity arts college. Dr. Poston said the library is being quickly brought into line for four year status and that this year 12 new Ph.D. are joining the faculty, two more are commissioned for the 1969-70 year, three faculty members are on leaves of absence during the decade and four more will leave this year to complete study for the degree.

Ferris Roberts of Gastonia and Dr. Roy Robinson of Hickory, trustees of Gardner-Webb, extended the meeting and spoke on behalf of the college. Others attending were Dr. Thurman Lewis, academic dean, Charis Mack, business manager, Thomas J. McInroe, vice-president, Alex Vaughn, director of promotion.

Steps To Present Voting Situation

- 1961—Dr. E. Eugene Poston maps his "Decade of Advance" calling for senior status by 1971, if the college has met other progressive goals.
- 1964—Evidential response 1,000 for first time (1945).
- 1965—Total income surpasses \$1 million for first time.
- 1965—March 20-22 Convocation opens fund drive for "Decade of Advance."
- 1966—Work concludes on campaign with goal of \$1,125,000 more than doubled an \$2,335,000 pledged to Gardner-Webb.
- 1967—Baptist State Convention procedure for requesting four year status are instituted by the college administration.
- 1968—A special joint committee to study Gardner-Webb College recommended in March of 1966 to the Council on Christian Higher Education that Gardner-Webb be allowed to move toward senior status.
- 1968—The Spring session of the Council is held at Mars Hill College and the Council votes to recommend to the Executive Committee of the General Board of the State Convention that Gardner-Webb be allowed to move toward senior status.
- 1968—The General Board of the State Convention votes in July to recommend to the messengers at the State Convention that Gardner-Webb be allowed to move toward senior status.
