Although 76 years old, the Bolling Springs native never allowed in his devotive work for anything of betterment for the college, church or community.

Rev. T. Max Linnens perhaps put his finger on the pulse of our times when at the funeral of Mr. Hamrick he stated, "One thing which worries me is that it appears there are few young men of this attitude and manner coming along to replace the likes of O. P. Hamrick."

You could count on him throughout his 46 years as an educator at the college and later at the Bolling Springs School. You could count on him during funeral campaigns for the college or in Lions Club work. You could count on him at church, as a member of the advisory board of the college, as a town board member and as a member of the board of trustees of the Baptist Memorial Hospital.

But more than all this, you could count on him as a steady friend who could agree to disagree. His love for his community and church are reflected strongly on every page of his book, BORN AT THE CROSSROADS.

During my first year in Bolling Springs he asked for assistance in photography with his book. As I rub with him he talked of the landmarks, of the changes, and of the progress with the tone of voice that a man uses only for his children who are growing stronger and more handsome each day.

This insignificant assistance was, I felt, forgotten. Not so, when the book came off the press. Mr. Hamrick brought a copy to me with an expression of gratitude written in it. You could count on him to remember, even small favors.

He wrote in the foreword to his book:

"I am thankful that I was born in a town and a county where the individual and groups could struggle with the problems that faced them without the handicaps of class, extreme poverty, political distastefulness, religious persecution and philosophical ideas with opposition, death and suppression.

While the times in which we live sometimes seem fraught with insurmountable difficulties, it is also a time of opportunity and challenge. Things that seemed hopeless when I was a boy turned out much better than I thought they ever could. This is no time to become discouraged and hide our heads in sand because the world is in a state of turmoil and confusion."

SPRING SPORTS . . .

Spring sports at Gardner-Webb College are of a wide variety but generally dominated by baseball. Despite the fact that the baseball team is nationally ranked, the sports of tennis, track and golf are expected to gain in interest.

Coach Jerry Bryson will send his baseball team on a new diamond this season, with new fences, dugout and infield. He hopes to improve on fifth place national ranking in 1967 should the team be able to win the Western Conference and Region 10 titles. Although he has five returning hitters, power at the plate, and good depth, the pitching staff is inexperienced and made up solely of freshmen. Wayne Church, ace pitcher of last season with a 14-1 mark, will be missed badly.

Coach Ken Sanford has increased the training tempo for track and is expecting to have a good spring. Revised College will be the favored team in the conference meet this season but the Bulldogs will be their nearest competitor.

Tennis under Coach Jim Taylor has taken on ability and the program has, under his direction, become a firm part of the intercollegiate program. Last year was a long one as the Bulldogs took considerable jumps before bouncing back to scare Anderson in the conference tournament. Anderson finished the season in fourth place nationally.

The golfers usually take first or second place and their advisor, Dr. Garland Allen, is hoping this year will be no exception. In 1963-64 the team swept first place honors and in 1963-64 the team came in second.

Victoria Pete Townsend and Steve Starnes are expected to be the leaders on the squad. Eleven persons tried for the six positions open on the squad.

Bulldogs Go To National Playoffs

After four years of frustration, it was "all the way to Kansas" for the Gardner-Webb College basketball team. The Bulldogs won a thrilling 112-110 overtime victory over Ferrum College of Ferris, Va., to win the Region 10 title and the right to go to Hutchinson, Kan., and the national playoffs March 19-23.

Led by 7-2" Anita Gilmore who had 45 points in the game against Ferris, Gardner-Webb wrapped up a regular season of 36-1 and an eighth national ranking.

The Bulldogs are averaging over 100 points per game and are nine men regularly as they often wear the opposition down physically in fast breaking, man-to-man defensive play.

Coach Eddie Halbrook has led the Bulldogs in the Region 10 playoffs all of his four years at the college but had been ousted on three previous attempts at the prize. The cages faced Northwestern of Safford, Colo., in their first game in the playoffs.

Although this marks a first for basketball, the basketball team went to the nationals in baseball in May of last year, ending the season as fifth in the nation. The football team has played in two post-season bowls in the past.
