## KENNEDY-SINCLAIRE PROGRAM GETS UNDERWAY

### R. Patrick Spangler Re-Elected Chairman of the Board of Trustees



R. Patrick Spangler, the Shelby businessman who led the Gardner-Welch College Development program for two years, has been elected Chairman of the Board of Trustees for the second consecutive year. Elected as Vice-Chairman was Lloyd C. Bass of Shelby, a former chairman of the board. Royce Gendrell of Forest City is the new secretary.

### District Alumni Meeting Was Held

The American Alumni Council held its District III, IV Conference in Boiling Springs, Jan. 30 - Feb. 2, following a Jan. 28 - 30 "Annual Giving Institute." Mr. U. A. McManus, Director of Development, attended.

The "Annual Giving Institute" and the "Editor's Workshop" featured numerous workshops in the area of alumni work. The AAC Conference is of tremendous importance to the alumni program, according to Mr. McManus. He states that in the Fall a strong endowment giving program will be initiated among C.W. alumni to continue annually with the assistance given at the AAC being of great value in formulating the final plan.

One of the first workshops of the conference was "So You Want To Do An Annual Giving Campaign." This was led by Stanley R. McAnally, an AAC Representative and by Elizabeth Bond Wood of Sweet Briar College. Following Gardner-Welch discussions as to what should begin such an endeavor, Mr. McManus enthusiastically participated in all phases.

### New Boards Have Huge Tasks Facing Them In Next Four Years

The Board of Trustees has taken first steps toward a possible multi-million dollar capital improvements program.

Meeting Monday, December 4, on the campus, the board authorized a feasibility study to begin in January 1968 on whether a capital improvements fund-raising effort should be begun.

If the study shows that such an effort is feasible, preliminary work toward a Fall 1969 and spring 1970 campaign might begin in July 1969.

Start of such a campaign would coincide with what the college hopes will be the first junior class. The school is attempting to gain four-year status, with the present freshman class as the first class in the senior college program.

Trustee, who reelected R. Patrick Spangler of Shelby as chairman, also agreed to enter the Kennedy-Sinclair program that raises college fund-raisers and helps raise funds. The program, already used by 152 other colleges, would seek endowments and other funds such as bequests.

In a related development, Spangler called for a \$2 million capital improvements program in the next "two years of hard work."

### College Administrators

#### Attend N. J. Seminar

Gardner-Welch College has entered the Kennedy-Sinclair Educational Gift Program as part of its growth in the area of financial development.

This is a cost-recovery program directed by the Reverend U. A. McManus, director of development. The program is composed of several parts: the distribution of motivating publications to the potential donor in order to stimulate them by pointing out the many tax advantages in making gifts; reading worthy donors through a sensible financial planning approach which benefits the donor and, hopefully, Gardner-Welch College, and working with professional people who handle this type of service such as trust officers and attorneys.

Kennedy-Sinclair Educational Gift planning is based on the fact that there are billions of dollars of accumulated wealth in this country which is now being taxed through a majority of individuals of wealth to apply judicious estate planning.

Scores of schools are using this plan developed since 1950 by the Kennedy-Sinclair organization.

Publishers' planning is underway and January 14-16, Mr. McManus and Dr. E. Eugene Paxton, president of the college, attended a three-day Educational Gift Seminar in Saddle Brook, New Jersey. There Mr. McManus received intensive training in the field of financial planning techniques. Presidents of the participating institutions attended classes but did not handle so many details in their training.

Many regional colleges have reported success in this program. One of these is the University of South Carolina which reported \$35,000 in cash gifts and \$143,000 from wills after four meetings of the board-chair THE ECONOMY OF GIVING.

The Kennedy-Sinclair approach takes into account that tax advantages are a prime motivating force. A study by The Brookings Institution revealed that 42 percent of all major gifts would not be made at all if the deductibility were lost.

At a joint dinner meeting of trustees and the Board of Advisors, Spangler said he believed the program could be accomplished and expressed optimism that this would become a senior college by 1971.

Spangler's program in the next two years would include a new entrance to the campus, a new chapel and auditorium, more lighting on campus, renovation of some buildings and further beautification efforts.

## Lee Named To Executive Committee



Mrs. Grace Lee, director of the School of Nursing at Gardner-Webb College, has been appointed to the Executive Committee of the National League of Nursing's Council of Associate Degree Programs.

She is one of eight persons in the nation on this committee which has as its primary purpose the cooperation, development and improvement of education for nursing. She has been director of the Gardner-Webb program since its beginning in August of 1965. Although only one year old in 1966, the Gardner-Webb program had already received notice of accreditation from North Carolina and "Reasonable assurance of accreditation" from the National League of Nursing.

Mrs. Lee, who resides in Rutherfordton, has the M. S. Degree in Administration in Nursing Education from UNC-Chapel Hill and has done special study at Columbia University in New York. Her undergraduate work was at Florida State University and she also has a nursing diploma from the Rutherford Hospital School of Nursing in Rutherford—a school which was moved into the G-W program in 1965. She has worked as a head nurse in hospitals, as a nursing instructor, as a supervisor of nurses and was director of Nursing at Rutherford, Harrisburg, Va., and Gardner-Webb.

She has one son, Eddie E. Lee, and is of the Baptist faith.
