Tires Slashed in PC Lots

Just about the only good thing about Mondays is that they are a time to catch up on the weekend's gossip. This week, however, this different, frightening exchange could have been overheard across campus, "Hey man, did your tires get slashed, too?" "No, I was one of the lucky ones!"

This past weekend thirtyeight cars parked on campus in Schneider, Peterson, and the Commuter parking lots were reported to have had their tire "flattened in some fashion," according to campus Security. The vandalism occurred sometime before Friday night. No apparent pattern, motivation, or perpetrator has been deter-

mined "I really needed to use my car the morning I found it," lamented Maribeth Page '96

Her father had to drive up to PC on Monday to help her with the repairs.

One might wonder how someone (or several people) could have possibly slipped passed PC security to commit such a prank. Although a reasonable question, Captain Bathgate, Head of PC Security, explained that it was actually Security who discovered the vandalized cars. If they had not, eighty, ninety, or even one hundred cars might have been hit, he concluded. In addition, students, faculty and staff cars were all affected alike. It cannot be determined right now if the "slashing" was accomplished by someone within the college, or even if it was a student or not.

It really stinks because I just had my car completely checked out a couple of days before this all happened," complained Christian Capizzo '96.

PC Student Charged in Chicago Slaying

Last Wednesday, Providence College sophomore Andrew Suh was arrested by Chicago police for the first degree murder of his sister's boyfriend, Robert O'Dubaine. Suh, 19, is currently being held on \$500,000 bond at the Cook County Jail in Chicago for the September 25th murder.

Three days before Suh's arrest at O'Hare International Airport, his sister Catherine was charged with conspiracy in her boyfriend's ambush killing. According to Grand Central Area Detective William Johnston, her arrest was made based on phone records and other evidence discovered after

O'Dubaine's slaying. Immediately following her arrest, Suh traveled to Los Angeles and wired \$20,000 to Catherine's attorney which covered bail and legal fees. She was released. From California, Suh re-

turned to Chicago on a flight that stopped over in Dallas-Ft. Worth. At the airport, he was seen carrying large amounts of money (\$55,000 in cash), but no baggage. Airport officials contacted the Drug Enforcement Agency. The DEA questioned him as a drug courier suspect. Suh was released and continued on to Chicago where local authorities were waiting.

"When we brought him in for questioning, he wanted to talk," Johnston said. On Wednesday, November 17, Johnston confirmed that Suh confessed.

Investigators believe that O'Dubaine's killing ties into the October 1987 murder of Suh's mother, Elizabeth. Elizabeth was found dead in her Evanston dry cleaning shop. Since her death, Catherine Suh has remained a prime suspect in the un-

solved slaying because of "inconsistent statements" made about her whereabouts during the time of the

Catherine Suh began dating O'Dubaine when she was fifteen and has been living with him for several years. Recently, O'Dubaine threatened to end their relationship. Officials speculate that O'Dubaine knew the circumstances concerning the death of Elizabeth Suh. In fear that he would disclose details of the crime, Catherine allegedly plotted to dispose of O'Dubaine.

According to Johnston, Catherine told Andrew that she was being abused and threatened by O'Dubaine. Andrew flew to Chicago to aid his sister.

At Andrew's preliminary hearing on Friday, November 12, prosecutors detailed the alleged events that took place on September 25. They speculated that Catherine called O'Dubaine and complained of car trouble. When O'Dubaine went to his garage, Andrew was waiting. He shot O'Dubaine in the head and neck.

After Andrew Suh's arrest, Evanston police have reopened their investigation of his mother's death. Suh, who was 13 at the time of his mther's murder, has never been a suspect in her slaying.

According to police, Elizabeth Suh owned valuable pieces of land in South Korea and had received a large insurance settlement after her husband's death from cancer.

The investigation extended to the PC campus Monday morning when Providence Police searched Suh's room in Fennell. It is unknown if they discovered anything pertaining to the investigation.

An arraignment date is yet to be set. "Things are basically at a standstill," Johnston said. "But it's likely he will be indicted for first degree murder."

Before you begin calling friends and family in search of furniture to fill your new apartment, Carolyn Ryan, Director of Off-Campus Housing, would like a peek at your new pad. In a state-ment issued yesterday by Mrs. Ryan, the college has decided to tighten the standards set to allow students to live off-campus. The move, summarized in the following statement by Mrs. Ryan, was made in order to provide students with a safer and healthier living environ-

"All Providence College students planning to reside off-campus must have permission from the Director of Off-Campus Housing to do granted to students only for those addresses deemed to be in compliance with the City of Providence minimum housing codes.

The following list con-

tains the addresses of properties in compliance. See page 4 for this list. Additional properties will be added as repairs are com-pleted and compliance attained.

The administration considers failure to receive permission a serious disciplin-

Permission will be ary matter. Students residing in properties not in compliance with minimum housing codes will not be permitted to register for classes, or will be withdrawn from

Landlords whose properties have not yet met compliance with city codes will have to do so within the next 30 days in order for those properties to be listed by Off-Campus Housing as available rentals for our students.

Addresses not listed can be checked at the Off-Campus Housing Office. Some addresses are in violation of Providence Minimum Housing Codes. In other instances, landlords have elected not to have their properties inspected."

Captain Bathgate claimed that he has never seen such a multitude of damage done to vehicles here. It is not the norm. As he usually does in a situation like this, Bathgate called several of the sur-rounding colleges to see if something similar had occurred there. This time, there were no imitations. "There are always isolated incidents, however, and especially recently incidents offcampus," he said.

"I have already gotten a dent in my car door! If I got my tires slashed my dad would never let me bring my car back to school!" declared Meghan Burke '96, who has been parking her car in Lot C all this semester.

Right now security is giving priority to preventing any further acts. They are investigating and definitely are looking for an apprehension. Two extra guards have been assigned to watch, and Providence City Police have been contacted. Providence detectives are now patrolling the community and paying special attention to any activity in the area.

One might also wonder if Providence College will provide any type of compensa-tion to the students affected

by the vandalism. This might actually be a case for the insurance companies to negotiate themselves. While the Business Affairs Office was unable to be reached for a comment, the question must remain unanswered for the present.

"I really think that the parking lots should be bet-ter lit," said Stephanie Vece '96. Even though Stephanie called a tow truck to repair her damaged car, her father also had to drive up to

school to fix it properly. While understanding the immediate need for a solution, Captain Bathgate reasonably proposed that security cannot stop everyone on their way to their cars. The events significance, though, has not lost its effect. "Security is just as disturbed as the students," he said.

When the new apartments on the east campus open for residency in September 1994, they will have a distinctive feature that is not available in the other apartments - entertainment centers. The 'L' shaped apartment will have a room similar to that of Colonial's Corner in Raymond Hall. Students will be allowed to use the room as a type of 24 hour social lounge. The facility being built into the larger apartment will take the place of the Last Resort.

The Last Resort will be closing and will be remodeled into an academic building. At this time, Fr. McPhail stated that the academic building would probably go to the Art Department.

As a transfer student, I am currently in the middle of velopment of Western Civilization program. Although I am impressed with the scope and presentation of the curriculum of the D.W.C. class, I have observed a shortcoming that must be addressed.

By administering examinations, quizzes, and papers, professors are afforded an opportunity to distinguish between those individuals who are learning a great deal, those learning an average amount, and those who are not learning

much at all.

Unfortunately for students in the D.W.C. program, some professors are apparently unaware of the reason colleges use a grading system. At mid-term this year, 82 freshmen recieved failing grades in Civ. This represents nearly 10% of the freshman class and leads directly to my opinions as to the cause of this amazing sta-

The disproportionate number of low grades in D.W.C. are a direct result of the testing methods used and a conscious effort to disinflate grades in the program. I have found that the objective exams given in my Civ class are rife with vague, ambiguous questions that are nearly imposible to answer without resigning one-self to an educated guess.

The objective exam offers the professor with an unparalled opportunity to scientifically measure how his students are progressing. To achieve this, however, one must offer tests that are nondiscriminatory in nature. Unfortunately, the professors in this department seem to be more concerned with how difficult they can make their contributions to their respective teams than with operationally definining the learning occuring in class.

New World Illusions

Former President George Bush declared, at the end of the Gulf War, that a "New World Order" was dawning. Bush gave the impression that this new world order was one of peace throughout the world, and that this peace would be spear-headed by the United States of America. Well, the United States has spearheaded the new world order, but it is hardly one of peace. The new world or-

der is chaos, violence and death. The so-called Middle East peace settlement has caused an increase of violence in the occupied territories. This peace settlement, which transfers control of the Gaza strip and the city of Jericho to the Palestinian Liberation Organization, is set to take place in less than a month. This conflict dates back to the Hebrew entrance into Canaan. The Hebrews, from whom the modern day Israelis trace their ancestry, came into the conflict with the Philistines, who are the ancestors of the Palestinians. This is the New World Order: America involves itself in disputes that it cannot solve.

Somalia is a situation that confuses many Americans. Operation: Restore Hope was intended to bring food and medicine to the suffering Somali people. To the Editor:

For more than half a century the American Association of University Professors (AAUP) has acted upon two principles: that colleges and universities serve the common good through learning, teaching, research, and scholarship; and that the fulfillment of this function necessarily rests upon the preservation of the intellectual freedoms of teaching, expression, research and debate. All components of the academic community have a responsibility to exemplify and support these freedoms in the interests of reasoned inquiry. The members of the PCAAUP Executives Committee applaud Mr. Olohan's efforts ("Academics First?", The Cowl, 10/28/93.) to open debate on professional responsibilities of the faculty at Providence College. We suggest however, that Mr. Olohan consider the follow-

A thesis must be supported by precise and specific evidence. Mr. Olohan's use of "a" professor, "some" teachers, "many teachers", "many a professor", "all too often" suggest a less than solid basis for his rather broad indictment of "Academics First" and "some" or "many" members of the Providence College faculty.

"Academics First" is a phrase coined last fall to introduce parents to the PCAAUP in a brochure that very simply state "The AAUP believes in academic excellence taking precedence at Providence College. Our goal is to focus the college's priorities on becoming one of the top three comprehensive colleges and universities in the Northeast." One way to meet that goal is to ensure that an excellent faculty is recruited, hired and retained at Providence College. A climate that supports this goal necessarily provides faculty is recruited, hired and retained at Providence College. A climate that supports this goal necessarily provides faculty with academic freedom, support for scholarship and adequate and appropriate salary and ben-

Mr. Olohan's assertion that faculty should be "happy" that they "just had cuts in their benefits" suggests a lack of understanding of the issues and insensitivity toward faculty whose professionalism should be rewarded by adequate compensation. These cuts, in fact, constitute a very real loss in purchasing power by the faculty at Providence College.






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My Top 5 Picks for Comedy Shows

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

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

Cross Country Preps For NCAA's

National Championships on Monday

Just when you think the fall sports seasons have come to an end, you find there still to be a few outstanding athletes whose season lingers on. In fact, the runner's season at Providence College basically never ends. Cross-country ends, indoor begins, indoor ends, outdoor begins, outdoor ends, and the summer becomes an important season for training. The men's and women's cross-country teams traveled to Leesburg, VA this weekend, looking to qualify for the NCAA championships, and to extend this particular season just a little

The women's team attended the ECAC championships where they took fifth as a team overall and first in their individual district. Villanova dominated the women's championship, putting the first, second and third finishers across the line.




NCAA qualifier Andy Keith ('94) bursts ahead of the pack.

When you think PC basketball, the names that come to mind are Dickey Simpkins, Michael Smith, Abdul Abdullah, and Coach Rick Barnes. But how about these names: Sonya Lewis, Jennifer Mead, Lucie Fontanella, and Stefanie Goettsche, not to mention Coach Bob Foley. Lady Friars basketball is the most successful sports program at Providence College. Period. Believe it or not, PC women's basketball has the highest winning percentage of any team in Big East basketball.

So why doesn't anyone know about Coach Foley and his successful program? "It might have something to do with lack of exposure", cracks Coach Foley, "Seriously, PC women's basketball could be the best kept secret on the PC campus." Consider this: during Coach Foley's eight year tenure the PC women's team has appeared in the NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament five times, had six 20-win seasons, won a Big East Tournament crown and finished first in the Big East regular season standings. The highlight of Foley's eight years was a trip to the round of 16 in the NCAA's in 1990.

Coach Foley also has the highest individual winning percentage of any coach

in Lady Friar basketball history, with an overall 171-76 record, good for a .692 winning percentage. In his first season, Coach Foley took a .500 team to a 24-6 record in 1984-85 and PC's first Big East regular season crown with a 14-2 conference mark. His success that year earned him Coach of the Year honors from the Big East Conference as well as being named New England District I Coach of the Year by Converse. Since then Foley has compiled a 90-42 record in the Big East and has coached his team to the Big East Tournament championship game four of the last five seasons.

The Lady Friars have developed a reputation as a high scoring team that will put points on the board. In the 1990-91 season, the Lady Friars led the nation in scoring with a 96.7 average per game, breaking the 100-point barrier 14 times, a new PC school record. The last four seasons the Lady Friars have been ranked in the Top 5 nationally in scoring, with the 96.7 scoring average in 1990-91 setting a new NCAA record. The Lady Friars have led the Big East in scoring seven of Foley's eight seasons as coach of PC's women's program, also.

The PC Lady Fri-

ars basketball team sports four returning seniors from a team that went all the way to the Big East Conference Championship game: Sonya Lewis, a senior guard; Lucie Fontanella, a senior guard/ forward; Stefanie Goettsche, a senior center; and Jennifer Mead, a senior center/forward. They also feature five returning letterwinners: Collette Cavallo, a sophomore guard; Sarah Miller, a sophomore guard; Lori Penrod, a sophomore center; Ayanna Walden, a sophomore guard; and Heide Moyano, a junior guard. With the addition of freshmen Jennifer Davis, a guard; Nadine Malcolm, a center; and Mandy Saunders, a guard, the Lady Friars have a team that is

both deep and talented. With a schedule that features games against national powerhouses Tennessee, Old Dominion, Rutgers, Penn State, and Big East rival Miami, the Lady Friars have their work cut out for them. These names may not mean much to the average fan, but all five of those teams have been ranked nationally in the top twenty this year and had appeared in the NCAA's, which features only 48 teams (as opposed to the men's tournament, which features 64 teams). The Lady Friars will be tested early and often.

Coach Bob Foley places emphasis on this season as being important for his seniors. "Every class I've had has graduated with a Big East Championship watch (given to the tournament champions). With four seniors to provide leadership and the strong showing the Lady Friars had in the tournament last year, we have the talent and the potential to win the Big East this year," comments Coach Foley.

As far as the Big East conference is concerned, the teams that will challenge PC for the title are Connecticut, Georgetown, Miami, and Seton Hall, but, Coach Foley is quick to add, "don't rule out the other five teams (St. John's, Villanova, Syracuse, Boston College, and Pittsburgh). The Big East is a tough conference with tough teams."

With an explosive offense that features four players who averaged double figures last season, the Lady Friars look to put some serious points on the board.

More than in the men's game, the women's game allows for more players to score, which makes for a more exciting and team-oriented game. "With our team and the players we have,


there is potential for a different player or all of our players to step up and be the goto player when we need it. When you have four players who will graduate with 1,000 career points (Lewis, Fontanella, Goettsche, and Mead), the potential for explosiveness is there."

Coach Foley also is excited that he has a team that can shoot the three-pointer with consistency. When you add that to an already productive offense, you have a volatile combination- one that could explode and wipe out the opposition on a daily basis.

The Lady Friars open the season on Friday,

November 19, against the PEC Hungarian Club Team at Alumni Hall here on the PC campus. After the Mal Brown scrimmage last Sunday, the Lady Friars should be ready to go out and play their game, which means lots of scoring and exciting fastpaced basketball. So come on out and support your Lady Friars, because if you're not following Lady Friar hoops, then you're missing the winningest sports program that PC has to offer and a chance to watch the most exciting brand of basketball around: Lady Friar basketball.

Most of PC's sports teams feature walk-ons. You know, those players who weren't deemed "important" enough to put on scholarship, were squeezed out of a scholarship in a logjam on the roster but are still on the team, or those players that practice with the team but don't dress for the games or get in

Most of the teams also feature players from far-away places who have picked PC here in Rhode Island, a different state (and sometimes even a different country). The players who for one reason or another choose a school that was far away for either academics, sports, higher level of competition, etc. But not every team here at PC features a player that is a non-scholarship walk-on who worked way up benchwarmer to starter and major contributor to the team's success, not to mention an indispensable status as a player that can do it all. There is one team that fea-tures just such a player. That team is the PC Lady Friars women's volleyball team, and that player is Cate Rohrs.

Hailing Glencoe, Illinois, just twenty minutes outside of Chicago, Cate Rohrs is the starting outside hitter on a team that as of November 11 was sporting an 18-10 record and gearing up for the Big East Tournament this weekend. She was initially attracted to PC for the academics and the fact that PC featured a good, competitive volleyball program was a plus, for she intended to walk on as a freshman. Coming from a close family- she calls her brother her "biggest fan"- with con-nections to PC didn't hurt

Cate became interested in volleyball in grade school. "They had it in grade school and I started playing in fourth grade. It was real popular when I was young and I just kept playing." She says that volleyball appeals to her more than any other sport because "it's more exciting than any other sport. It's challenging and fully involving. No other sport can you put so much into and

have it be so rewarding."
She also cites volleyball as a sport that helps in everyday life, too: "It helps you deal with everyday stress in your life and also teaches you about time management, because you have practice, games, and schoolwork,too."

Her PC career has been a long and interesting trip. Coming out of high school, she was an all-conference and all-region selection as well as captain of her high school team. Coming to PC as a walk-on, she didn't expect to start right away, but neither did she expect to sit on the bench for her first two seasons. "It was frustrating," she says of her first two seasons, "alot of times I wanted to just hang it up. But I stuck it out." As time went by, however, Cate started to get some playing time, until she eventually became a starter this season. "Being able to play different positions helped," notes Rohrs, who added that it helped also that she kept a good attitude and worked

When asked about playing volleyball here at PC, Cate says that this is the closest team she has ever been a part of. "We spend alot of time together off the

court. We're a really tight team. What other PC team rides together to and from matches in vans together and is as close as us? That's one of the best things about playing for PC." In the offseason, the women's volleyball team plays intramural sports together as a team - "Last year we won the 5-on-5 basketball championship," notes Rohrs- and, like several of PC's other sports teams, the Lady Friars do volunteer work at the Camden School in Providence.

Rohrs is an honor student here at PC in her major, Humanities, and was awarded PC's Scholar-Athelete award last year. As a team, the women's volley-ball team has one of the highest team GPA's in the school, something she notes with considerable pride. A member of the Class of '94, she already knows what she wants to do upon graduation. "I want to get into the Jesuit Volunteer Core and go out to the Northwest to do volunteer work in communities. It's highly competetive and I'm in the midst of my application, so I'm keeping my fingers crossed. After that, maybe teaching, probably with grade school kids."

"I'd like to take some time off from volleyball, and maybe coach little kids some time."



"We just didn't seem to have our legs as well as last night", theorized a disappointed McShane.






"I keep to myself when running, but it helps to have my teammates around me when running as they constantly are there pushing me to go harder."

UNH Sweeps Home and Home Series From Friars

The PC Friar hockey team and their fans breathed a heavy sigh of relief early last week. The shift in feeling from mourning to jubilation was attributed to the end of the season series with the Maine Black Bears last Saturday night. The outlet to

vent these frustrations would be the University of New Hampshire Wildcats, last weekend's opponents for a home and home series.

Despite the modest expectations, things got fishy on Friday night at Snively Arena when the Friars painfully succumbed to the Wildcats 3-2. Saturday night saw the Friars return to Schneider and a broken

Zamboni, not to mention an inoperative offense in a 5-2

Cheered on by a rowdy sellout crowd at Snively on Friday, UNH opened up by winning the face-off and immediately pressing the Friar blueliners. This strategy paid dividends 2:02 into the game when freshmen Eric Boguniecki planted the puck in the net amid traffic, compliments of Glen Stewart. A couple of Wildcat fishermen placed their stamp of approval by releasing their Atlantic salmon catch on the ice.

Three minutes later UNH star Rob Donovan took advantage of a hard check to John Lavarre, setting up a breakaway score for Tom O'Brien. PC struck back with their own firepower at 6:02 though, thanks to a Brian Ridolfi slapshot. Chad Quenneville set things up by winning the face-off. The final fourteen minutes of the 1st then took on a rougher tone, featuring both PC's strong penalty killing skills and woeful penalty Mike Coach McShane made a fateful observation: "These first period turnovers killed us."

The second period opened with a flurry of shots directed at Bob Bell, including a slapshot to the face by Jason Dexter. The defense eventually caved in during a 4 on 3 penalty situation, thanks to Eric Royal's power play score. Assists were credited to Dexter and Ted Russell. This third and final Wildcat goal served as a wakeup call to the Friar offense. This shift in momentum peaked when lan Paskowski chipped in the rebound of John Lavarre at 16:28. "That was a great feeling, and it helped to be set up by John's shot", summa-rized the unlikely scoring

The Friars continued their newfound offensive aggression when loe Hulbig opened the third period with some shifty stickwork, but was unable to squeak it past Trent Cavicchi. The entire Friar offense was flying flush with breakaways and opportunities, but each time the Friars were denied by luck or the strong Cat defense. Frustrations mounted in the final 1:30 when UNH kept the puck in the PC zone, keeping Bell from exiting the net, icing a 3-2 victory. "we came on really good in the second half, but UNH drew the puck early and we couldn't put it in the net", summarized McShane.

The Friars returned home on Saturday night to immediate bad luck, an uncooperative Zamboni machine, causing a 45 minute delay. The Providence Bruins Zamboni

driver made the biggest save in this contest, driving his machine down Douglas to Schneider in time for the second period. This further deepened the suspense surrounding the return of former Friar Mike Heinke, finally resurfacing in UNH blue two seasons after leaving PC. Three hours later though, one would have to conclude that postponement would have been better than

The first period saw UNH starting on the offensive again, the beginning of an impressive 34 save performance by Dan Dennis. The freshman netminder's sole first period blemish occurred at 14:23 when Tom Nolan's blast hit the right post and deflected in.

PC's power play then awakened from a long sleep when Russ Guzior skated up the middle and planted the puck past Heinke at 17:20. This was only the Friars fifth power play goal in thirty tries this season.

The Wildcats regained the lead less than a minute into the second period on a Nick Poole backhander from Donovan, but the Friars stormed right back on George Breen's breakaway


would be over.


