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Skating Her Way To Success Maureen Murphy '21 Invited to National Team Evaluation Camp

Providence College's standout women's hockey player, Maureen Murphy '21, was one of the select few hockey players throughout the country to be invited to participate in the 2018 U.S. Women's National Team Evaluation Camp.

"It was a lot of fun, but I think I was most excited to go and learn from everyone that was there," Murphy commented on her most recent trip to Biddeford, Maine, where the elite camp was held.

The camp, which took place from Sept. 13-17, was set up to evaluate the top-tier talent in the current Women's National Team player pool. The camp splits players into two teams and the teams participate in three intrasquad scrimmages along with going to practices.

"They were evaluating on three different standards," Murphy explained. "There is a tournament in a month and a half in Saskatchewan, Canada and they will pick a roster from people at this camp. They were also evaluating for post-grads and the third was just your overall standing in the national player pool. They have all of these players... and they are ranking and restarting for this quad. It resets every four years for the Olympics."

Murphy, who is still an eligible U-22 player, was one of the 37 players from around the country to be invited to attend the camp. Of the 37 players invited, 17 of them were members of the Olympic team that just won gold in PyeongChang, South Korea.

"I was most excited to go and learn from everyone that was there just because that was my first experience with the national team and obviously I was pretty nervous," Murphy commented on playing with these elite players.

"I think everyone there understood... where we were coming from so [the players] were super helpful. It was also really intense because I'm not going to outwork or out-skill these Olympian players any time soon. You just had to really work hard and grind it out."

Murphy said her favorite part of the camp was "getting to play with people that I had always looked up to as a kid... it was super cool for me."



Featured Friars: NAMI Support Group Students Take On-Campus Counseling into Their Own Hands

One of the many staples of Providence College is the variety of groups on campus.

The National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) support group is an up-and-coming group joining campus in October. NAMI, based in Rhode Island, is partnering with a group of PC students to hold meetings, inviting students to discuss the stigma surrounding mental health.

One of the founding members, Laura Arango '20, explained that she, as well as others, including Jamie Rush '20, Alex Shute '20, and Jackson Gany '19 will be going through a training process that will have them become facilitators rather than therapists. Doing this will allow the students at PC to join in on a conversation constructed by peers in a more comfortable environment.

The organization aims to support students struggling with mental health. Arango explains, "We are not therapists. We are here to support you. If you need something, you can talk to us. Not you need to do this, this, and this. We want to be able to provide support for our peers."

She continued on to say, "Mental illness is a sad thing to talk about and it can often be something people do not openly talk about because they may not think they have it or that they can talk about it."

When asked what was different about NAMI, Arango said, "There is nothing like this on Providence College's campus, yes there this the health center but this is completely different.'

She continued, saying, "Since this is run by students, we are hoping that more students would want to come take part in this because we are all kind of on the same level. And as said before, we aren't telling people what they need to do. But rather be there if they need to talk about their experiences and what they are going through."

NAMI's goal is to see the individual first and not the illness. Students are trying to understand that mental illness has environmental triggers or can be caused by traumatic events. "We aim for better coping skills by findings right in experience with others," said Arango.

Last year, PC Active Minds hosted an event that brought the Rhode Island affiliation to Providence College. This event capitalized the statement that mental illness is a

The Center for Career Education & Professional Development is implementing new programs and resources this year. One of the major programs being brought in is Handshake, which is replacing eFriars as the Center's main job and internship resource

"Handshake is different because the first priority of the organization is the student," said Laura Pellecchia, associate director of internships at the Career Center. "It works on artificial intelligence, LinkedIn for Providence College students and so as students go in they'll have profiles to apply alumni.

to jobs for their favorite companies and it'll make more suggestions of what other companies, jobs, and events that students should be looking at. It's pretty interactive and really intuitive, and the more students put into it the more they're going to get out of it," added Pellecchia.

Handshake is connected to over 100 other schools, so companies that post to the program at one school can be easily found by others. "We have way more opportunities than we ever had with eFriars," said Pellecchia.

Another development this year is FriarLink, which has been around since last year but is being updated further this year. FriarLink functions like

"When PC students log in and alumni log in they answer a set of questions, and then once you're in the system the system actually makes recommendations of matches like what alumni can help you with how you answered those questions,' stated Pellecchia.

Once matched with alumni, students can then use FriarLink to set up a teleconference so they do not have to give out personal information if they would prefer not to.

A program that will be implemented in the spring is V-Mock, which allows students to upload their résumés, which are graded with red, vellow, and green; green being excellent. With a résumé that gets a red or a yellow, the program will provide suggestions on how to improve the résumé. We're going to suggest that students come in to the office at that point, red or yellow, and if you're green you're good to go, you can apply for jobs. It's going to take the lift off of students to necessarily have to come in, especially if they're in the green. If they've been here three, four, five times and they run it through and they get green then they don't have to come in," said Pellecchia on the program. The other main program being added this semester is the Friar Four Career Core for professional skills development. This is split into two sections: the first being a Microsoft Office Excel certification and the second being a series of workshops. The first series that is being run is "Professionalism & Work Ethic." "Through these series students can work through them to get badges and put these on their resumes," said Pellecchia. The Microsoft Office Excel certification is going on currently, with more certifications to come. The "Professionalism & Work Ethic's" series has upcoming workshops Sept. 20, Sept. 27, Oct. 4, Oct. 11, Oct. 18, and Oct. 25 all in room 202 of the Science Complex from 1 - 2:15 p.m.

"We have a ton of new novices who are already really dedicated to the team and who are itching to get to our first tournament," she mentioned.


Butler believes that the upcoming competition will have a positive turnout for not only the new members, but also for the team as a whole.

Rhode Island Partakes in Primary **Elections**

Rhode Island's midterm primary election occurred this week, and the Democratic trifecta state, will see in the general November election.

The Wednesday election was open to all Rhode Island residents, including members of the Providence College community. The election was held in order to determine Senate seats, gubernatorial candidates, and local offices.

Democratic nominee Gina Raimondo, incumbent since 2015, edged out Matthew Brown on Wednesday night. The results were 57.1 to 33.6 in the gubernatorial race.

The Republican nominee Allan Fung also won the race against Patricia Morgan, 56.4 to 40.1.

Her leftist campaign stood on improving the state's economic status, as well as the education system. She also increased the state's funding on preschool programs and all-day kindergarten. Additionally, she is credited with an increase of jobs as well as wages in the state

"As a college student, I think it's super important to vote at our age, especially. It means being in charge of our future and the future of my state," Galvao said.

Raimondo hopes to keep the Affordable Care Act in place during her tenure, and will strive to prevent its repeal.

The U.S. Senate race also took place on Wednesday, and incumbent Sheldon Whitehouse won his reelection 76.8 to 23.2 against Patricia Fontes.

Students of the College were eager to make their own personal change and cast their votes in the election, hoping to have an effect on Rhode Island's future.

Dranny Galvao '21, said she believes that at her age, it is crucial to vote and be apart of the future for politics. The Rhode Island native said she was thrilled to be able to vote and be so close to her lifelong community. "As a college student, I think it's super important to vote at our age, especially. It means being in charge of our future of my state," Galvao said.

PC, which has its very own political groups, PC Democrats and PC Republicans, offered students a voting center right on campus and helped students exercise their civil right.

The Senate race, intertwined with the confirmation of Brett Kavanaugh, Trump's SCOTUS nominee, will also be in full effect come November, either prolonging or proceeding with Kavanaugh's confirmation.

The general election for Rhode Island is Tuesday, November 6.

Accusations Against Brett Kavanuagh **Escalate**

Brett Kavanaugh, judge on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit, is currently under investigation during his confirmation into the Supreme Court.

Nominated by President Trump, Kavanaugh has recently been charged with alleged sexual misconduct and has been questioned by senators during his confirmation process.

The GOP nominee's confirmation has been delayed by the Senate due to Christine Ford accusing Kavanaugh of trying to force himself on her during a party in high school that involved alcohol.

Kavanaugh has denied Ford's allegations. Both will testify to the Senate Judiciary Committee addressing the allegations and in a public forum on Monday.

Republican Senator John Kennedy of Louisiana predicted on Sunday that the Judiciary Committee will vote to advance Kavanaugh's confirmation despite the new allegations of sexual misconduct.

However, the confirmation will be pushed back until after Kavanaugh and Ford's testimonies to the Senate.

Along with Democrats' skepticism of Kavanaugh, the allegations against him have set the confirmation timeline behind schedule, and has caused debate amongst both Democratic and Republican senators.


Republican Chuck Grassley of Iowa, judiciary committee chairman, counts on moving forward despite the allegations from Ford.

During last week's committee meeting, Democrats asked for a oneweek delay due to the committee rules allowing any member to request a delay on the vote of a nominee. This was prior to the announcement that

both parties were going to testify. The future of Kavanaugh's confirmation lies in the hands of the Senate, which is currently a tight Republican hold, 51-49 majority in the chamber. No Democrat has come out in support of Kavanaugh's nomination.

GOP sources have said that they expect the final confirmation vote to be this month unless swing-state Republican Senators Susan Collins and Lisa Murkowski go against the party line.

Now that the midterm election is behind the nation, the Senate's eyes are on the 10 Democrats Trump carried in the 2016 election, as everyone is intrigued to see how they will react against the Kavanaugh decision.

Tropical Storm Florence Wreaks Havoc In the Carolinas

Natural disasters are a horrible and scary reality that the whole world must face at one time or another.

This past weekend, Tropical Storm Florence hit both North and South Carolina. The result has been catastrophic, as dozens of people have lost their lives and hundreds of people have been left

Carolina began to flood around midnight on Sept. 14. She spoke about how her husband, a 6'2 man, went out to try and help people, but the water was already above his chest.

"My husband kept hearing people yelling for help," said North Carolina resident Annazette Riley-Cromartie.

On Sunday, Governor Roy Cooper of North Carolina reported that the storm has "never been more dangerous than it is right now," and advised residents to evacuate immediately, if they had not done so already.

Management Agency, commented, "We want citizens to follow state and local warnings. There is a tremendous amount of flooding."

Along with damage, Tropical Storm Florence has caused hundreds of thousands of power outages.

Duke Energy, North Carolina's energy company, has reported that while the power outages are a concern, their biggest issue at the moment is a coal ash spill caused by the rain. The spill displaced 2,000 cubic yards of waste, resulting in contaminated drinking water.

Some of the worst damage has occurred in

injured or without a home.

Originally a Category 4 hurricane, Florence was downgraded to a Category 1 storm, making it a tropical storm before it made landfall in North Carolina on Friday.

However, residents of both North and South Carolina were still highly advised to evacuate, as the powerful storm was expected to cause massive flooding and destruction.

The storm moved through both of the Carolinas, causing massive floods with nearly 30 inches or more of rain in certain areas. Rivers, dams, and other waterways began to flood neighborhoods and cities, leaving hundreds of people stranded.

Winds were reported to have been as fast as 35 miles per hour. Fallen trees have caused major damages to properties and have caused the deaths of several people.

Fortunately, many people were evacuated from the areas with the most flooding and damage before the storm began.

However, current reports say that 32 people have died since the end of the storm on Sunday, and as rescue teams continue to move throughout the Carolinas, this number may rise.

One woman reported that her town in North Residents of North Carolina cope with massive flooding.

Jeff Byard, associate administrator for response and recovery at the Federal Emergency

Wilmington, North Carolina, where roads have been completely flooded and access to the town has been completely cut-off.

This means basic necessities, such as clean drinking water, have been cut-off as well.

"If we do not get the needed fuel within the next 48 hours, we will not be able to continue water service for public health and safety," stated the public water utility department.

Only time will tell if Wilmington will have access to clean drinking water and other resources in the coming days.

Volunteers from the National Guard and aircraft carriers have tried their best to begin rescue missions throughout the Carolinas.

They have also attempted to begin recovery efforts, but it will take much time and energy before these southern towns will be restored to normal.

Florence continues to make her way up the coast, now as a tropical depression.

The storm moved toward Virginia on Monday, and will continue North.

Donations are currently being accepted by various relief organizations to help the Carolinas rebuild and restore their towns.

Her Voice Matters Too: Female Students Feel Silenced in College Classrooms

As the #MeToo movement continues to bring the prevalence of sexual harassment and sexual assault in professional and academic environments to light, women still often find themselves being discouraged from using their voice. The most recent public example of this silencing occurred when Serena Williams was charged with the violation of "verbal abuse" during the 2018 U.S. Open Women's Championship last week when she defended herself against a charge of "coaching." This recent event involving Williams brings up the ongoing issue of women being silenced by men. Silencing women does not just happen on the large scale, but in our very own daily lives, especially in the classroom and workplace. Gender stereotypes affect women in academic settings from the time they are in elementary school until they graduate college. Young girls, particularly those who have an interest in entering the science, technology, engineering, and mathematics fields, face many biases from teachers and male students. An article written by Soraya Chemaly published by Time Magazine in 2015 noted that in 2014 "rates of girls taking

STEM-related advanced placement tests reached a record low," and that, "In two states not a single girl (in some states there were also no boys of color) took the Computer Science AP."

Despite the significant advancements women have made in terms of receiving equal education, women are still often boxed out of certain fields.

There is also a noticeable difference between male and female students when it comes to how students ask or answer

Oftentimes female students find over the past 19 years, Prattle found that themselves starting emails with, "I'm sorry to bother you but..." But why should asking a professor for help be something to apologize for?

It is rarer for a male student to preface their answer with such doubt or with an apology.

Unfortunately, as Williams' recent controversy reminds us, the silencing of women continues into the workforce. An article recently published by men spoke 92 percent of the time."

One of the reasons for this is that women simply do not hold as many higher-up corporate positionas as men do. But this data also suggests that even if women are supposed to be involved in discussions, they are being interrupted by their male co-workers.

Maranz and Greenfield also write that, "Studies have found that men talk more than women in all kinds of group settings, including school board meetings and the Supreme Court." These findings validate the experiences that women like Williams are publicly speaking out about. Far too many women experience being silenced or being treated differently in their profession solely because of their gender. Women everywhere should use Williams as an example to show that they do not deserve to be treated any differently, nor do they need to speak any differently. Williams is a role model for anyone who has felt silenced or disregarded because of their gender, race, or sexuality, and her now infamous quote, "You owe me an apology," is the new rallying cry for all who feel silenced. Because of women like Williams who dare to call out sexism and injustice when they see it, hopefully more women and minority groups will feel confident in demanding the apologies and respect they deserve.

LSAT Fails to Assess Students' True Abilities: Emphasis on Unnecessary Skills Holds Students Back

All Tasmanian Wombats are endowed with an abnormally productive pituitary gland, reliant on a hyperactive mitochondrial orchestration involving myriad proteins... What is the "main idea" of this passage?

idea" of this passage? Sifting through such gibberish at one's rickety library desk, the hour is far closer to sunrise than sunset. This is a typical night of Law School Admission Test (LSAT) studying, scrambling for those few, precious points that determine where I can attend law school.

Hours of arranging six stray cats into acceptable sequences, ensuring Daisy doesn't have to suffer the indignity of sitting next to Sue! Evenings spent deciphering the "main idea" of a riveting account on nematodes' central nervous systems, or what "necessary assumption" the author's case depends on.

As Providence College's seniors race to pad their law school applications, pouring time and money into the LSAT, it is important to consider the questions: is this time well spent? Are you reinforcing skills essential to success in law school, and is the test sorting you into a school that matches your ability?

"Of course," claimed the Law School Admissions Council (LSAC), administers of the test. Dividing a dozen daffodils into three pots is vital for one's success as a lawyer, as these logic games demonstrate one's "analytical reasoning."

A gifted logic gamer both understands the nuances in complex rules and can make "deductions on this information," just as lawyers do daily with byzantine legal codes.

Similarly, a candidate's law school success depends on becoming masters of the test's "Logical Reasoning" and "Reading Comprehension" sections.

Contrary to the LSAC's grand assertions, their LSAT is not a useful determinant for success in law school. Rather, it is merely a bizarre, arbitrary hurdle for applicants to overcome, siphoning time away from activities that really do bolster legal skills.

According to research published in the Social Science Research Network, the LSAT is an "overvalued predictor" of success, urging that it "predicts more weakly" than one's undergraduate GPA, "college quality," "work experience," and a candidate's major.

Shockingly, four hours on a Saturday is not as predictive as the four years' worth of hard work that goes into your college GPA. All of the nights spent cramming for exams, struggling to master elaborate texts, and constructing argumentative papers infuse students with critical reasoning skills.

In fact, a student with a high GPA and low LSAT score is more likely to succeed than one with outstanding LSAT scores and a miserable GPA.

Making matters worse, conquering this "overvalued predictor" is both time-consuming and expensive, according to secondary education expert Caroline Kitchener of the *Atlantic*.

Since the exam's "Logic Games" section tests "a completely new set of skills" from undergraduate coursework, it is near impossible to learn skimming through a cheap prep-book.

Faced with a test that amounts to 50 percent of one's application, aspiring lawyers spend an average of \$950 to \$1,600 on an 80 hour LSAT prep class, with some shelling out an additional \$150 an hour for a tutor.

Moreover, many students confessed to Kitchener that the LSAT forced them to quit jobs, desperate for time to learn the exam's Sodoku-esque puzzles.

For those struggling to make ends meet, this immense cost can be an insurmountable barrier, crippling their chances of attending law school. Why should bright, yet cashstrapped, applicants have to decide between sorting imaginary puppies and earning money for rent?

Aiming to fill their halls with capable law students, law schools should encourage students to focus on work that does improve skills.

Reward students for the hours spent in the library, grinding out papers, and prepping for exams. Prize the applicant who rose the ranks of student government, ran a club, or scored an internship downtown. Not the one who can quickly put seven puppies in order.

Reading Quizzes Aren't Objective

Regardless of major or grade, the routine reading quiz is an unavoidable stressor to any Providence College student.

Most professors assert that the sole function of any reading quiz is to assess that students have attentively read their assigned homework.

However, lately students have complained that their reading quizzes require more a than just a basic comprehension of the text.

Professors are assigning reading quizzes that call for students to demonstrate an acute understanding of the reading through short response questions or an in-depth analysis of a quote or selection.

Additionally, many students complained that answers to their "reading quizzes" tend to be highly subjective, thus their responses are marked incorrect if their interpretation of a text is not adequately aligned with their professors.

While students should eventually be able to achieve an in-depth comprehension of an assigned text, is it justified that they should be responsible for proving an advanced level of understanding upon a first reading?

If a professor is going to advertise an assessment as a "reading quiz," it is only fair that the assignment be highly objective and straightforward enough that a sufficient grade will be attainable for any student who diligently read the text. Ideally, a more complicated assessment evaluating a deeper comprehension of the text could be assigned to students after they had the opportunity to discuss the text with their professors and peers. In turn, they will reach more enlightened conclusions about their assigned readings.

On Sept. 6, Childish Gambino kicked off his This Is America tour in Atlanta, Georgia. The rapper, whose real name is Donald Glover, confirmed at the concert that this will be his last tour under the Childish Gambino name: "If you're at this show, then you know that this is the last Gambino tour ever."

Glover had previously hinted at a retirement of the Childish Gambino moniker in January when he said that the next album he releases under the name will be the last: "I stand by

"I'm really appreciative of this. I'm making another project right now," he said. "But I like endings, I think they're important to progress," he continued. "I think endings are good because they force things to get better."

Fans of Glover should not despair, for, the wording of his statement, "the last Gambino tour," does not necessarily rule out future albums or live performances under a different name. In fact, many of his fans firmly believe that his final Gambino album will not be the last album Glover ever releases, due to the constant growth of his musical style and rising celebrity status. At his show in Boston on Sept. 12,

After opening by informing the audience, "This is not a concert. This is church," he rapped popular hits such as "I. The Worst Guys," "II. Worldstar," and "V. 3005," off his 2013 album Because The Internet. He interspersed these with more soulful funk songs such as "Boogieman," "Riot," and "Terrified," from his 2016 album Awaken, My Love! along with his recent hit single "Feels Like Summer."

He closed his setlist with a fiery performance of his 2018 song "This Is America," which took the internet by storm in May, en-route to becoming Gambino's first no. 1 single. During this song and throughout his Boston Gambino show, captivated his

Gambino ended his show's encore with a soulful rendition of his Grammy Award-winning hit "Redbone." His voice dripped with emotion as he repeatedly nearly screamed at the audience, imploring them to "Stay woke!" a fittingly dramatic end to an outstanding performance.

Whenever the retirement of the Childish Gambino name does occur, Glover will certainly not be pressed to find work, as he has appeared in a growing number of movie roles recently. Last summer, he appeared in Spider-Man: Homecoming. This past May, he dazzled audiences as young Lando Calrissian in Solo: A Star Wars Story. Next summer, he will voice the role of Simba in the upcoming liveaction remake of Disney's The Lion King.

Glover's most popular work outside of his music career remains his television show Atlanta, which he writes (along with his brother Stephen), directs, and stars in. Atlanta, which portrays two cousins navigating the rap scene in the titular city, has received immense critical acclaim and various accolades, including two Golden Globes and six Emmys. Atlanta has been renewed for a third season, which will premiere in 2019.

Glover's This Is America tour will hit 18 locations across the United States (and one show in Vancouver) and conclude in mid-October. His upcoming album, the fourth and final as Childish Gambino, is currently untitled and does not have a set release date, although it is expected at some point in late 2018.

Kid Lit Authors Say, "No Kids in Cage

The children's literature community spoke up and took action when needed most. This past June when the Trump administration declared a "Zero Tolerance" immigration policy that literally tore families apart. About 2,000 children were separated from their parents and detained at the U.S./Mexico border, some being kept in cages surrounded by metal fencing. Children's literature, or "Kid Lit," authors responded immediately to the policy, sparking the creation of "Kid Lit Says No Kids in Cages." Their mission statement details, "We believe that innocent children should not be separated from their parents. We believe the "Zero Tolerance" directive issued by Attorney General Jeff Sessions is cruel, immoral, and outrageous. We believe the Department of Justice is engaging in practices that should be restricted to the pages of dystopian novels." Twenty powerhouse authors in children's literature signed the initial statement, including Ransom Riggs, Tahereh Mafi, Marie Lu, Jenny Han, Adam Silvera, and Nicola Yoon. Other familiar names signed the mission statement following the announcement of the campaign such as Rick Riordan, Victoria (V.E.) Schwab, Tomi Adeyemi, Becky Albertalli, Leigh Bardugo, Roshani Chokshi, and Angie Thomas. A declaration closes the passionate mission statement in bold, red letters: "We demand and expect better, and call on our readers to do the same." Featured in the Los Angeles Times and Publishers Weekly, the articles

highlighted the bold campaign of the Kid Lit community and their power as a rallying force.

Not only does the campaign urge the audience to sign the statement, it also encourages readers to help in any way that they can. "Kid Lit Says No Kids in Cages" calls for donations that are then split between six organizations: Refugee and Immigrant Center for Education and Legal Services (RAICES), The Florence Project, the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), Women's Refugee Commission, Kids in Need of Defense (KIND), and Al Otro Lado.

The campaign initially set a goal of

\$42,000, which was met in under 24 hours. Two weeks later, the donations amounted to over \$200,000 with 5,000 signatures on the statement. Their next goal was to reach \$275,000. Now, over \$240,000 has been raised.

Kid Lit also compiled resources including posters, graphics, and other information to enable their readers to spread the word and raise their voices against the separation of families. The Kid Lit community also urges readers to call their representatives and to register to vote, citing it as the "best way to hold your government accountable."

Getting Serious...But Not Too Serious

Netflix Original Bojack Horseman Returns With Successful Fifth Season

Originally airing on Netflix in 2014, Bojack Horseman, one of the streaming site's most lauded original creations, is back for a fifth season. Created by Raphael Bob-Waksberg and starring the voices of Will Arnett, Amy Sedaris, Alison Brie, Aaron Paul, and more, Bojack is known for its unique ability to blend the airiness of smart humor with the heaviness of serious topics.

This aspect of the show is front and center in the most recent season, as its ensemble of characters attempt to navigate their lives while dealing with a myriad of realistic and burdensome issues. The 12 new episodes explore issues such as strained relationships, divorce, drug addiction, asexuality, identity, loss, adoption, and, most topically, the #MeToo movement.

It is the delicate balancing of these more serious topics with the comedic aspect of the show, however, that prevents the episodes from getting bogged down in deep issues. Samantha Nelson of The Verge addresses this in her review of season five, stating, "This is heavy material to cram into 25 minutes, but each episode succeeds through a mix of sharp dialogue and the goofy humor inherent to a world equally populated by humans and anthropomorphic animals."

Through the excellent writing and witty humor that is incorporated into every one of Bob-Waksberg's episodes, the viewer is able to both reflect on, and be entertained by the storylines of his characters. While a viewer may be contemplating the morality of a character's actions one minute, he or she may be laughing at the concept of, for example, actual fleas shopping at a flea market in the next scene. The interplay of these dueling facets of the show is exactly what makes it work.

Bojack Horseman boasts relatability and shock value, keeping the viewer hooked and giving them some incredibly complex characters to both sympathize with, and critique along the way.

Toronto International Film Festival: Dramas Steal the Show

It is that time of the year again: film festival season. Following the Venice Film Festival earlier this month, the annual Toronto International Film Festival (TIFF) began last week and wrapped up on Monday.

The festival is one of the most popular film festivals in the world, garnering more than 380,000 attendants annually. Each year, more than 4,000 films are entered, and only between 400 and 460 are shown. In the past, films that were shown at TIFF have performed pretty well during awards season. The transition from child to adult roles has been a consistent issue for child stars in Hollywood. The public generally recognizes them for their more minor roles in films and dismisses the idea of them starring in leading roles in films of their own. An example in this phenomenon is 19-year-old actress, Joey King.

Until recently, many movie fans were not familiar with the name Joey King, despite her presence in movies and television shows going as far back as *The Suite Life of Zack & Cody* in 2006. Many recognize her for her role as Ramona opposite Selena Gomez in *Ramona and Beezus* as well as from major motion pictures, such as *The Conjuring* and *The Dark Knight Rises*. However, in these cases King plays the role of a child, which is how she was perceived by the public and critics alike until her new movie, *The Kissing Booth*, premiered on Netflix this past May.

The Kissing Booth became a Netflix sensation as viewers watched the main characters fall deeply in love despite the forbidden nature of their relationship. Even though the movie has a 13 percent rating on *Rotten Tomatoes*, the audience score is at 64 percent. Even better is the fact that Netflix reported that one in every three users has watched the movie.

Despite a low critic rating, King has moved into a new level of stardom with this movie that has allowed her to develop a much larger fanbase to follow her through whatever she chooses to do next.

King currently has eight million followers on Instagram, a drastic increase from the 600,000 she had before the movie released. King's huge growth in popularity because of *The Kissing Booth* makes her transition into adulthood stardom a successful one, and the public will definitely be interested in her career from here on out.


Egypt Station: Paul McCartney's Legacy Continues On

At the height of the 1960s, The Beatles' innovative sound was just beginning to take over the music industry. Decades later, the band's legacy still remains present to composers, fans, and individuals all over the world. This is particularly evident in the case of renowned singer and instrumentalist, Paul McCartney, who recently released a solo album entitled *Egypt Station*, which debuted on the Billboard 200 chart at no. 1.

This album is McCartney's first studio release since 2005. At 76 years old, it is clear McCartney is not yet finished producing music. Undoubtedly, McCarthy is still regarded very highly, with Rob Sheffield of Rolling Stone stating in a review of the new album, "Make a list of all the songwriters who were composing great tunes in 1958. Now make an overlapping list of the ones who are still writing brilliant songs in 2018. Your list reads: Paul McCartney. Egypt Station boasts a full setlist, consisting of 16 tracks. Many of the songs adhere to the acoustic sound that initially brought so many towards the music of the Beatles. Those who listen to any song on the record will hear visible incorporations of steady drum beats, and calming bass. There is also a rather consistent balance of slow, melodic songs with faster-paced lyrics. Furthermore, the cover art for the album was extracted from artwork produced by McCartney back in 1988. It features a colorful landscape scene of a blue sky with clouds and the sun, as well as characteristically "Egyptian symbols and shapes." Clearly, his inspiration for the artwork was the concept of simplicity. "I liked the words 'Egypt Station.' It reminded me of the 'album' albums we used to make...'Egypt Station' starts off at the station on the first song and then each song is like a different station," McCartney has said regarding the new record. "So it gave us some idea to base all the songs around that. I think of it as a

dream location that the music emanates from." One of the most notable songs that reflects the sound and style of The Beatles is McCartney's "Confidante," which was released prior to the complete album. While the typical definition of the word connotes the image of a trusted friend or advisor, McCartney explains that the song is a tribute to his guitar and the impact the instrument has had on him since the early days PHOTO COURTESY OF CAPITOL RECORDS

of his career. This parallel, among others, is an indication that McCartney still has much more to offer the music industry, whether that be as a historically noteworthy member of The Beatles or simply as a champion and lover of music.

It is clear that McCartney has come a long way since The Beatles' *Please Please Me* was released in 1963. *Egypt Station* leaves listeners with a well-rounded picture of who Paul McCartney is as an artist.

There are so few books that feel like an event when you read them, where you seem to enter a realm of magic outside normal space or time. Leslie Marmon Silko's Ceremony (1977) is one of those rare books. In the opening lines, the reader learns that the story is what Thought Woman, the Laguna Pueblo goddess of creation, is thinking. "You don't have anything if you don't have the stories," readers are told. *Ceremony* goes on to give us many stories, chief among them the tale of Tayo, a mixed-race Laguna who returns to his New Mexico reservation traumatized from World War II. Caught between white and Laguna worlds, between killing the enemy and feeling brotherhood with the enemy, Tayo must reconnect with the stories of his people and take part in a ceremony in order to heal. His ceremony becomes the book's ceremony, and the readers are inscribed in a global community that must learn what Tayo learns: we are all in a myriad of ways, like filaments in a spider's web. Silko

weaves folklore and war stories into

a vivid depiction of the Southwest, providing a window into the beauty of Native American culture as well as the violence continuously committed against it by the "witchery" of a white world that pretends we are all separate.

The novel is both hypnotic and stirring. Translating oral storytelling into written words, Silko encourages us to recognize our universal kinship, keeping the ceremony going, in the pages and beyond.





This past Thursday marked the release of the Men's Basketball Big East Conference schedule. The Providence College Friars look to make it their 6th straight NCAA Tournament appearance under head coach Ed Cooley-this is currently the longest streak in program history.

The Friars will open up their Big East season when they play at home against the Creighton University Blue Jays on Monday, December 31. This will be the first time in three years that the team will open its season at home.

The Friars split the regular season matchups with the Blue Jays last year; each team winning on its home court. The Friars met the Blue Jays in the quarterfinals of the Big East Tournament where they won in overtime and advanced all the way to the Big East Tournament finals.

One of the biggest games of the year will be the Jan. 5 matchup between defending national champions, the Villanova University Wildcats, and the Friars, which will take place at the Dunkin' Donuts Center. One of the three losses that the Wildcats had last year came at the expense of the Friars at the Dunk.

The Ŵildcats lost four starters to the NBA Draft: Jalen Brunson, Mikal Bridges, Donte DiVincenzo, and Omari Spellman. However, they have added a couple top prospects in 5-star guard Jahvon Quinerly and sharpshooter Cole Swider. The Wildcats recruiting class is ranked the 9th best in the country.

the 9th best in the country. The downside to the Villanova game is that it takes place over winter break. Last season, over winter break, the Friars hosted the third-ranked Xavier University Musketeers at the Dunkin' Donuts Center; where the Musketeers fell 81-72. For students, it is not ideal to have the Wildcats visit over break, as the student section is seen as a vital ingredient for an upset victory.

A few other games to keep on the radar are when the Friars play the Butler University Bulldogs. They have home and away games during the last three games of the season, where each team will be vying for NCAA Tournament bids and seeding. PC's final home game will be against the Bulldogs on March 9. Some of the other dark horses to watch in the Big East are the Marquette University Golden Eagles and the Georgetown University Hoyas. Marquette lost a potent scorer in Andrew Rousey but still returns Sam Hauser and Markus Howard. Last year, Howard dropped 52 points against the Friars at the Dunk. A few pre-season polls have the Golden Eagles in the Top 25 or just outside of it. The Hoyas are entering their second year under the leadership of Patrick Ewing and things are getting interesting in our nation's capital. Ewing is showing that he can recruit by hauling in three 4-star recruits. Overall his class was ranked number 31 in the country. With Villanova, Xavier, and Seton Hall losing so much star power, the conference may be as open as it has ever been.

Murphy commented "maybe" with a laugh when asked about being picked to play with the team heading to Saskatchewan in the upcoming months, after having played with the USA U-22 Women's Select Team in a three-game series against Canada in early August.

Her August trip to Canada was not the first time USA Hockey has called upon her to represent them. Prior to starting at PC, Murphy was invited to play for Team USA at the 2017 Under-18 World Championships in the Czech Republic. The team went on to bring home the gold medal.

Murphy, who is heading into her second season with the Lady Friars starting on Sept. 28 against Concordia University, finished her inaugural season with a teamleading 28 points, which consisted of 19 goals (the most on the team) and nine assists. Of her 19 goals, five were game-winners and four were short-handed; she tied first nationally in short-handed goals. Appearing in 36 games last season,

Murphy also put up seven multipoint games.

Her success last season landed her the title of Hockey East Rookie of the Week three times, Hockey East Top Performer six times, and Hockey East Rookie of the Month in December. Murphy was also named



to the Hockey East All-Rookie Team and was a Second Team All-Star. She was deemed a New England Hockey Writers All-Star and was awarded PC's hockey team Seventh Player Award.

On her success last season, Murphy humbly commented, "Players can't have success without the team. It's a collective unit kind of thing."

Looking at the upcoming season, Murphy believes the team will find success in the "amount of work that we put in as a team over the summer" and the "really good people" that were brought onto the team.

"I think we're all really excited as a team," Murphy added about newly assigned Head Coach Matt Kelly. Kelly was also asked to attend the Evaluation Camp as both a coach and an evaluator. While Murphy did

Colin Kaepernick Nike Ad Stirs Controversey

Earlier this month, Nike debuted a new commercial featuring former National Football League (NFL) quarterback, Colin Kaepernick, and other popular athletes. The campaign encourages Nike customers to "Believe in something. Even if it means sacrficing everything." This advertisement is a part of Nike's 30th anniversary of the "Just Do It." campaign.

In 2016, Kaepernick began kneeling during the pre-game performance of the National Anthem in peaceful protest of violence, specifically police brutality against people of color. His actions received national attention in both the forms of support and anger.

The polarized opinions of individuals generated controversy around Kaepernick and sparked conversation in regard to freedom of speech, the right to demonstrate peacefully, and the disrespect of the American flag.

This controversy became central to the dialogue surrounding professional sports and gained a lot of momentum through attention from various media outlets. In late May, NFL owners "unanimously approved a new National Anthem policy that requires players to stand if they are on the field during the performance but gives them the option to remain in the locker room if they prefer." Teams will receive fines if any players or personnel on the field refrain from standing during the National Anthem.

Nike took a risk by producing this commercial, and entered a politically and socially active conversation. Matt Powell, a sports retail analyst at market research firm NPD Group, explains that

"the campaign sent a strong message to Nike's core customers: Millennials and younger men in cities. Two-thirds of the company's sneaker customers are younger than 35." Wedbush analyst Christopher Svezia analyzed the approach as increasing core customers' loyalty because "[Nike] communicated to them in a way that is

authentic, culturally relevant, experiential and emotionally engaging."

This advertisement, and the backlash and support that Nike has received because of it, continues to demonstrate the unique complexity of the intersection between the sports world and the political and social realms.

Serena Williams Feels Cheated After Upset Loss

The 2018 U.S. Open Women's Championship match was surely a match for the ages, and it will live in infamy.

Serena Williams was matched up against Naomi Osaka, a 20-year-old hailing from Japan. Williams was seeking her 24th Grand Slam title, which would have given her a share of the all-time record for Grand Slam singles wins, while Osaka was gunning for the title of the first Japanese tennis player to ever take home a Grand Slam.

Osaka jumped out to an early lead by taking the first set 6-2 over Williams. Then things turned ugly. During a back and forth second set, Williams recieved a violation for receiving coaching tips from her coach, Patrick Mouratoglou, from the sideline. No player is permitted to receive any sort of coaching during a match. Williams insisted that the "thumbs up" she received was not coaching and followed up by telling chair umpire Carlos Ramos, "I don't cheat to win. I'd rather lose."

Later on during the set, a visually upset Williams smashed her racket out of frustration, giving her second code violation, which is a point penalty. Therefore, Osaka was awarded an extra point.

At multiple moments throughout the match, Williams expressed her irritation with Ramos, ultimately calling him a "liar" and a "thief." Calling Ramos a "thief" was apparently the last straw for the umpire, and Williams was awarded her third code violation for verbal abuse, which resulted in a game penalty. Williams' back was against the wall, as that game penalty put Osaka up 5-3 in the second set.

An extremely emotional Williams called for tournament officials to issue an explanation and she continuously expressed her feelings that it was not fair to be given that penalty. Williams also made it clear that she believed she was treated unfairly in this situation because she is a woman. She argued, "There [are] a lot of men out here that have said a lot of things, and because they are men that doesn't happen to them."

Willams survived one more game before falling to Osaka in straight sets 6-2, 6-4.

Directly after the match, Williams' coach Mouratoglou admitted to coaching her and went on to say, "I was, like 100 percent of the coaches in 100 percent of the matches." This quote makes the whole situation a lot more interesting, as Serena was insistent that she was not "cheating." In a press conference following the match, Williams refuted Mouratoglou's statement by explaining, "[W]e don't have signals. We have never discussed signals. I don't even call for on-court coaching. I'm trying to figure out why he would say that." She stuck to her story throughout the press conference, adding, "He took a point from me. He alleged that I was cheating, and I wasn't cheating." Although this was an extremely intense match that will surely be talked about for ages, a great accomplishment for Osaka was overshadowed by controversy. The broadcast's announcers explained, "[Osaka] was given one game and one point, but she absolutely earned everything else... she was a champion this whole tournament."

No fall sports team has found consistent success this year like the Providence College Women's Soccer Team. Though both the Men's and Women's soccer team and the field hockey team were picked to finish fourth in their respective Big East Preseason Coaches' poll, with a 6-2-1 record, the women's soccer team has a better record than all other teams and has exceeded expectations at this point in their season. The men's team currently sits at 3-4-1, while volleyball is 6-5 and field hockey is 4-5.

So far this year, PC is undefeated at Chapey Field (5-0-0) and the team's only two losses came against two top-15 nationally ranked teams, Duke University and the University of North Carolina (UNC), at the Duke Nike Classic. The team also tied 1-1 against the University of Arkansas, who is 5-2-2 and plays in the Southeastern Conference, one of the tougher conferences in Division I soccer.

Hogan leads the league in saves with 46.

The Friars defense, led by Katie Day '19 and Hailee Duserick '19, have given Hogan plenty of protection in front of the net. PC has allowed the third fewest goals in the Big East this season with six goals in nine games. The two seniors have started every game for the Friars this season and are tied with the most minutes on the field.

As the team begins conference play on Sept. 22 against Villanova, the Friars will enter the game with the second-best record in the Big East, behind only 10th-ranked Georgetown University, who has yet to lose a game. Last season, PC earned the third seed in the tournament, and they returned many of their key contributors this season, as they look to challenge Georgetown for the Big East crown.


