Director's Note

"Girls say to me, very reasonably, 'why isn't it a bunch of girls?'
...one thing you can't do with them is take a bunch of them and boil them
down, so to speak, into a set of little girls who would then become a kind of
image of civilization, of society." - William Golding

An Argument for Inclusion

I come to the theatre to explore, not to instruct. To engage with new ideas and discover new questions, and then to share those discoveries with my community. The theatre is not a lecture hall - it is a forum wherein ideas and philosophies can be exchanged, challenged, and reconceived through the characters that give them voice.

Therefore, I am puzzled by the argument I have faced when discussing this production that *Lord of the Flies* can only work with young boys. Personally, I find Golding's reasons for excluding girls in the novel to be dated, reductive, and a bit patronizing. If this island is meant to stand as a microcosm of civilization, then to include only men would be to promote the patriarchal assumptions which have led to the gender divides we continue to face, and fight against, today. Though Golding's argument may reflect attitudes towards gender in 1954, this production is meant for audiences in 2019. If we truly intend to mirror society at large in this group of stranded school children, then that must include females as well.

The lenses and perspectives through which this story has been interpreted are many and varied. One of the more prominent readings is that this is a tale of toxic masculinity. Jack's competitive struggle for power and the bloodlust that ensues are all symptomatic of a society that has indoctrinated its young men to seek dominance, repress emotions, and exploit weakness. However, in a world where women must also compete in order to thrive (or simply survive) professionally and personally, why wouldn't they adopt these lessons of power for themselves? For men to claim competition, violence, and cruelty as all being characteristic of masculinity, it seems to me, denies women terrible, but perhaps essential, aspects of the human condition.

Resident and Guest Artists

Jim Beauregard (Fight Choreographer) has been involved in stage combat for over 25 years. His training began in New York City with Fights "R" Us, where he performed with their resident fight company. Later he taught stage combat, stunt-acro, juggling, period dance and performed with Cumberland Company for the Performing Arts in Rhode Island. Jim toured with the Cumberland Company's elite performing troupe throughout New England and the Midwest teaching master classes and lecture/demonstrations and performing. He has since choreographed and acted in several national touring shows and cofounded and taught at his own studio. Jim has worked as a fight choreographer at Trinity Rep., many regional colleges and for the off Broadway production of The Molly Maguires. Jim was Artistic Director and also a principle performer at Medieval Manor, Boston for 24 years. Jim is currently Associate Professor of Theatre and Dance, and Technical Director for The School of Arts and The School of Dance at Dean College, Franklin, MA. Jim served as Co-Chair of Region I for the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival. Jim still performs, choreographs and directs as an independent guest artist.

Peggy Becker (Properties Designer) is thrilled to be back for a second season with Providence College Theatre Department. For many years, Peggy was the Artistic Producer at 2nd Story Theatre, where she designed, created and gathered props for dozens of productions. She also appeared on stage at 2nd Story in several plays, including The Marriage of Bette & Boo, All My Sons and Auntie Mame. She recently designed props and dressed sets for The Players at The Barker Playhouse as well as Epic Theatre. Peggy is a founding member of WomensWork Theatre Collaborative and is the production designer for its inaugural production, My Left Breast.

Megan Chang (Voice and Dialect Coach) is Assistant Professor of Voice & Speech at Providence College and the Core Curriculum Faculty Fellow for Oral Communication. Previously, she served as vocal coach for Bat Boy the Musical, The Moors, Hamlet, The Laramie Project, Midsummer Night's Dream, Playhouse Creatures, Addams Family the Musical, Marie Antoinette: the Color of Flesh, and Imaginary Invalid at Providence College. She also teaches a variety of workshops on campus, to local professionals, most recently working as a Communications Consultant for Brown University's EMSTL program, as well as in conjunction with Breakthrough Providence. She received her MFA in Vocal Pedagogy from Virginia Commonwealth University with a certification in Oxyrhythms, a breath, body, and voice warm-up and conditioning system designed for actors. Previous coaching credits include: The 39 Steps, A Christmas Carol, Dial M for Murder (Triad Stage, North Carolina); The Winter's Tale, Serjeant Musgrave's Dance, Deadly Sins: A Sword Play, Hoodoo Love, The Blood Knot, August: Osage County, Rodgers & Hammerstein's Oklahoma! (University of North Carolina School of the Arts); The Glass Menagerie,

Cabaret, Dracula, Psycho Beach Party (Virginia Commonwealth University); and The Mystery of Edwin Drood (Appomattox Regional Governors School).

John Garrity (Co-Director) has been a member of the Providence College Faculty since 1976. He was the Managing Director of Theatre for many years and in that capacity was instrumental in the development and design of the Smith Center for the Arts which opened in 2004. Mr. Garrity has worked at the Olney Theatre Center in Maryland, Off Broadway at the MCC Theatre in New York, The Rhode Island Playwright's Theatre and has directed over 40 plays at Providence College. He is the recipient of the Providence College Alumni Association award for exemplary service in administration. In 2006 the Masterpool Foundation established a theatre scholarship fund at Providence College in Mr. Garrity's name.

Anna Grywalski (Costume Designer) is in her third year as Costume Director at the University of Southern Maine. There she runs the costume department, teaches classes, and designs all main stage shows including Tartuffe, The Merry Wives of Windsor, Twelfth Night, A Man of No Importance, and The Importance of Being Earnest. Anna recently designed Fly Me to the Moon at The Public Theatre in Lewiston, ME, The Niceties, and Refuge/Malja at Portland Stage, and Mamma Mia! at QCT. Anna has also worked for Maine State Music Theatre, Marriot Theatre, Contemporary American Theatre Company, The Geffen Playhouse, Otterbein University, and Festival 56 where she met Jimmy Calitri, who she would like to thank for this opportunity.

Renée Surprenant Fitzgerald (Scenic Designer and Painter) is a Set Designer and Scenic Artist from Providence, Rhode Island. She currently teaches Set Design at Brown University, and freelances at professional and educational theater companies around the state. She is also the resident Set Designer and Technical Production Manager for La Musica Lirica, an educational opera program based in Novafeltria, Italy. She holds an MFA in Production Design from Michigan State University, and a BFA in Design & Technical Theatre from the University of Rhode Island.
