#### DRAMATURG'S NOTE

Dale Wasserman's One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest does more than merely mirror the lives of patients living on a mental ward. The patients and the staff of this ward serve to represent all human beings and society. It is this representation of mankind that makes the message of the play incredibly terrifying. Close observation of the staff and patients makes one question the existence of humanity on this particular ward. Dehumanization is the loss of humanity, or the degeneration of those qualities which characterize the "humanness." Wasserman's portrayal of the total institution exposes the dehumanizing practices of

mental institutions in the first half of the century.

Self-awareness, self esteem, the capacity to love, and an individual's free will are all traits of "humanness" that Wasserman depicts as lacking in the world of Nurse Ratched's ward. The frightening reality of this ward emerges when many of the patients confess that they willingly entered into this world. When Nurse Ratched's patients are dehumanized by the identical uniforms she chooses for them or by the use of electroshock therapy, the men of this ward struggle to maintain their individual identities and the very qualities that make them human. Wasserman uses these dehumanizing practices to pose an important question: Are these patients any different from people who believe they live freely within society? Is the "machine" of civilized society any different from the electroshock therapy machine when it comes to trying to conform the way a person thinks and behaves? Wasserman leaves the answer of this question up to every individual who chooses to become a spectator of this institutionalized "society."

#### DIRECTOR'S NOTE
