Program Notes

Vaughan Williams, like his friends Gustav Holst and Dan Godfrey, knew the band idiom well as a result of conducting bands. *Sea Songs* is one of the simpler works by Vaughan Williams, and it was written for British military band in 1924. The composer loved the folk song heritage of his native land. He also knew the English sailing song and he used three in *Sea Song* - "Princess Royal," "Admiral Benbow," and "Portsmouth." The form is ABCA, the scoring direct, and the music is most rewarding for the player and audience alike.

Yorkshire Ballad was composed in 1985. It is a rather uncomplicated three statement setting of a folk-like melody with an effective climax at the last phrase of the third statement. Each statement of the melody, counter melody and accompianment is passed through different voices of the ensemble. In a common ballad form, this ballad is composed of four, four bar phrases in AABA form.

Suite from Bohemia is based on medieval Bohemian folk-songs that were influential in the life of Nelhybel. The four movements depict life in Bohemia, now a part of the Czech Republic. The first movement features a very simple theme that is developed in various styles. The second contains a clarinet solo that states the theme. This theme can be heard throughout the movement. The third movement depicts a tournament. The percussion section is featured in the opening section and the trumpets state the main theme. Nelhybel uses a layering effect to develop the melodic material. The fourth movement consists of music for a round dance. Metal percussion instruments begin this movement. The melodic material is presented in the clarinets and grows in intensity as more instruments are added. The piece concludes with an accelerando that drives to the end.

The cantata *The Saga of King Olaf* based on the writings of the poet Longfellow, was written by Sir Edward Elgar between 1894 and 1896, and is recognized as one of Elgar's four main works of the 1890's. All four used leitmotifs or leading motives freely and imaginatively. A beautiful, flowing chorus from *King Olaf*, 'As Torrents in Summer', has been skillfully arranged for band by Albert Oliver Davis.

Chant and Jubilo was commissioned by the Four States Bandmasters Convention in Texarkana, Texas, and first performed there in 1962. The Chant opens softly, with a simple melodic line which recalls the melodies of a Gregorian chant. The end of the Chant concludes with a cymbal roll which leads into the

opening trumpet fanfare of the Jubilo, where the feeling is jubilation, praise, and joy. The fanfare theme is then heard in variations, before the activity is resolved in affirmation, a call to joy and a closing hallelujah.

Chorale and Shaker Dance has become a standard in the band repertoire since its premiere at the national convention of the Music Educators National Conference in 1972. The work contains two basic ideas: the chorale, which is a simple, single phrased melody, and the Shaker song, "The Gift To Be Simple." These melodies are used in alternation, combination, and with rhythmic variation throughout the composition.

In the summer of 1900, near the end of his Frankfurt Conservatory days, Percy Grainger vacationed in the Scottish Highlands. It was during this journey that the eighteen-year-old Australian conceived the lovely melody for his Walking Tune. He originally scored it for wind quintet in 1905, and later for piano and piano duet. Various existing Walking Tune manuscript fragments for families of clarinets and saxophones, flutes, oboes, bass oboe, and horns, dating from as early as 1918, suggest that Grainger planned to score it for a larger wind group. So, in 1940 when Eugene Goossens suggested that Grainger might score Walking Tune for the winds of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, he probably eagerly accepted the commission. Grainger completed the symphonic wind arrangement during a round-trip train ride between New York City and Birmingham, Alabama, October 7-13, 1940 and was premiered by the winds of the Cincinnati Symphony on November 1 of the same year. It was very well received by the audience and press, though it was never published. This arrangement by Larry Daehn tries to remain true to Grainger's original scoring, with an augmented instrumentation.

Fantasies on a Theme by Haydn was commissioned by the Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association in 1968 and was dedicated to Mr. Leonard Falcone at his retirement as Director of Bands at Michigan State University. The score includes the following note by Dello Joio:

> This work for band is based on a theme from a composition for piano by Haydn. The subtly conceived theme, I concluded, offered an opportunity to fantasize in the musical language of today. The three movements are a constantly varied examination of Haydn's basic idea. The bubbling humor of the first and third fantasies flank a second which is intensely lyric. In the final sense, it is my homage to a composer who will always remain contemporary.

La Fiesta Mexicana is subtitled A Mexican Folk Song Symphony for Concert Band, and it was written after Reed had spent a year in Mexico studying folk music and composing on a Guggenheim Fellowship. The entire work depicts a religious festival dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary and it faithfully represents all of the contrasts and contradictions of these festivals. It is both serious and comical, festive and solemn, devout and pagan, boisterous and tender. The first movement is a prelude and Aztec dance opening with the traditional pealing of the church bells and the noise of fireworks announcing the beginning of the fiesta. The main part of the movement represents a midday parade (announced by the trumpets) featuring a group of brilliantly plumed and masked Aztec dancers who dance with increasing frenzy to a dramatic climax. The second movement, titled Mass, is of a serious, liturgical nature. The principal theme is chant-like and it is set amid coloristic sections representing the tolling of church bells. The last movement, titled Carnival, is given over to unceasing entertainment and celebration. At the beginning of the movement we hear the itinerant circus, then the market, the bull fight, the town band, and finally the "cantinas" with the band of "mariachis."

BANDS AT ILLINOIS STATE UNIVERSITY

Wind Symphony and Symphonic Winds are select groups of the finest instrumentalists at Illinois State University, performing outstanding and representative works in all styles from "classical" to "avant-garde." In addition to campus programs, the Wind Symphony tours annually. The Wind Symphony has been a featured performing ensemble at the American Bandmasters Association Convention, the Illinois Music Educators Association Conference and the College Band Directors National Association National Convention.

The Symphonic Band is comprised of approximately 90 outstanding wind and percussion players from across campus. It performs quality band literature and presents two concerts each semester. This organization rehearses two times per week.

The University Band is comprised of non-music major and music majors gaining experience on a secondary instrument. This ensemble provides students the opportunity to continue playing while devoting the major portion of their time to other academic disciplines. This organization presents one concert at the end of each term on campus.

Chamber Winds are numerous quartets and quintets which are coached by members of the applied music faculty at ISU. The collective ensembles perform a diverse repertoire and concertize both on and off campus.

The *ISU Jazz Band* is a select group of approximately 20 musicians who make up a fully instrumentated "big band." Emphasis is placed upon the study of diverse jazz styles and literature, ensemble performance and improvisation. The band has been awarded outstanding performance honors in group and individual categories at numerous festivals across the Midwest. The ISU Jazz Band schedules numerous performances both on and off campus.

The *Illinois State University Marching Band*, "The Big Red Marching Machine," has a long and proud history of performances at major events at home and across the Midwest. Each year, in addition to performing at all home football games and for over 4,000 high school band members at the State of Illinois Invitational High School Marching Band Championship, the "Pride of Illinois" travels to an away ISU football game and a televised Chicago Bears game. In November of 1992 the band performed in exhibition for the Bands of America Grand Nationals at the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis, IN.

The *ISU Pep Band* provides spirit and enthusiasm at all ISU men's and women's home basketball games as well as various other events on campus and in the community. Membership is open to all students who participate in another band during the academic year.
