Buddy, can you spare a dime?

In the song the man is really saying: I made an investment in this country. Where the hell are my dividends?... It doesn't reduce him to a beggar. It makes him a dignified human, asking questions—and a bit outraged, too, as he should be.

Everybody picked the song up in 1930 and 1931...the Republicans got pretty worried about it. Some of the network radio people were told to lay low on the song. In some cases, they tried to ban it from the air. But it was too late. The song had already done its damage.
