## Aria Translationa and Notes

Guglielmo and Ferrando have been persuaded to disguise themselves as foreign suitors to test their sweethearts' fidelity. The sweethearts, Dorabella and Fiordiligi, are tempted by the strangers, and cannot decide whether or not to flirt with them despite their vows to Guglielmo and Ferrando. Their guileful maid Despina sings them the following aria explaining that there is no harm in flirting and instructing them on how women should handle men.

"Una donna a quindici anni" A woman of 15 years Must know all the good methods, Where the devil keeps his tail, What's good and what's bad. She must know the little malices That enamour lovers: To feign laughter, to feign tears, And invent good reasons. She must pay attention to a hundred at a time Speak through her eyes with a thousand Give hope to all, be they handsome or ugly, Know how to obfuscate without getting confused And know how to lie without blushing. And this queen from her high throne Can make them obey with, "I can," and "I want." (It seems they like this doctrine, Long live Despina, who knows how to serve!) ["Serve" is meant with a double meaning: Literally, Despina is a servant; plus, she is dishing up some salty advice.]

Text by Lorenzo da Ponte Translation by Naomi Gurt Lind Hoffman's tales are filled with love affairs as he springs from one lady to the next. In act III, his latest love has just died of a weak heart, and Hoffman enters a Venetian palace on the Grand Canal where the courtesan Giulietta joins Hoffman's friend Nicklausse in a languid barcarole. They are interrupted by Hoffman, who sings disparagingly of the pleasures of the flesh. It is shortly after "Belle Nuit" that Giulietta seduces Hoffman and he falls passionately in love with her.

#### "Belle Nuit"

Beautiful night, oh night of love, Smile on our drunkenness! Night sweeter than the day, Oh night of love!

The time flies and sweeps away Our tender feelings Far from this happy place in time The flying away of time!

Warm western wind, Will you caress us? West wind, embrace us, Give us your kisses! Pour your kisses upon us. Ah!
