Plot synopsis:

Mandel's oratorio ("near-opera"), Semele, concerns the unhappy consequences of a liaision between the Theban princess Semele and the god Jupiter. During this aria, Jupiter's wife Juno plays a trick on Semele and hands her a mirror in order to bolster her confidence to demand immortality from Jupiter. Semele likes what she sees in the mirror.

Plot synopsis

Mozart's comedy *Die Entfuhrung aus dem Serail*, one of many operas inspired by the Turkish craze that gripped 18th century Europe, was composed from 1781-82 for the national Singspiel company patronized by the enlightened Emperor Josef II. In Act II, the captive European maiden Konstanze languishes in the seraglio with naught but sorrow ("Traurigkeit") on her lips. But when threatened with torment unless she submits to Pashs Selim's demands that she love him, she galvanizes herself and replies that she laughs at any torment he can devise ("Martern aller Arten")

Plot synopsis

The daughter of the regiment, Marie, who was found on the battlefield by a regiment of grenadiers after she was abandoned in her cradle, proudly sings the regiment's song.

Plot synopsis

In the true story of Baby Doe of Leadville, Colorado, Baby Doe sings the aria "Dearest Mama" as she composes a letter to her mother telling her of her new found love, Horace Tabor. Later in the opera, after she and Horace have begun a silver mining enterprise, she sings the Silver aria to show a group of gentlemen how magnificent silver is.
