In the Cathedral - notes

"In the Cathedral" was commissioned by euphonium soloist Brian Bowman and R. Winston Morris, the director of the *Euphoniums Unlimited* ensemble. The lyrical opening bars present thematic material that is subsequently developed during the unfolding of the work. The attentive listener will recognize allusions to things associated with cathedrals such as canters, chants, and church bells. Although not based on a specific detailed program, the music is intended to express the reverence, beauty, and exhilaration one is likely to sense upon entering a grand place of worship.

Dr. Neal Corwell, having previously served from 1981 to 1989 as featured soloist with "Pershing's Own", the. US Army's premier band stationed in Washington DC, recently rejoined that military organization and is now once again playing euphonium as a member of the armed services. During the intervening years in the civilian world, he earned his doctorate in music from the University of Maryland and made his living as a freelance musician, appearing overseas and across the United States as guest euphonium solo artist and composer at numerous events each year. Dr. Corwell was also an adjunct faculty member at both Frostburg State University and Shepherd College, teaching low brass and electronic music.

Neal continues to accumulate awards for his musical compositions and remains active as a performer, frequently presenting solo recitals and master classes, in addition to his musical activities with "Pershing's Own". Several of his compositions and performances have been included on recent recordings released by *Mark Records, Crystal Records, RJR Digital, TRYFAN, HRS*, and *Nicolai Music*, and his solo CDs include "Distant Images" (1994), "Heart of a Wolf" (2000), and "Out Sitting in his Field" (2004). Dr. Corwell is a former executive committee member of the International Tuba Euphonium Association, a former board member of the International Women's Brass Conference, a current editor for the International Tuba Euphonium Association Journal, and a founding (and current) member of "Symphonia", a professional ensemble chosen from among the nation's leading low brass performers. Neal has performed exclusively on *Willson* euphoniums since 1978, and he has been an official clinician for DEG Music Products, Inc (The US distributors of the instrument) since 1983.
