

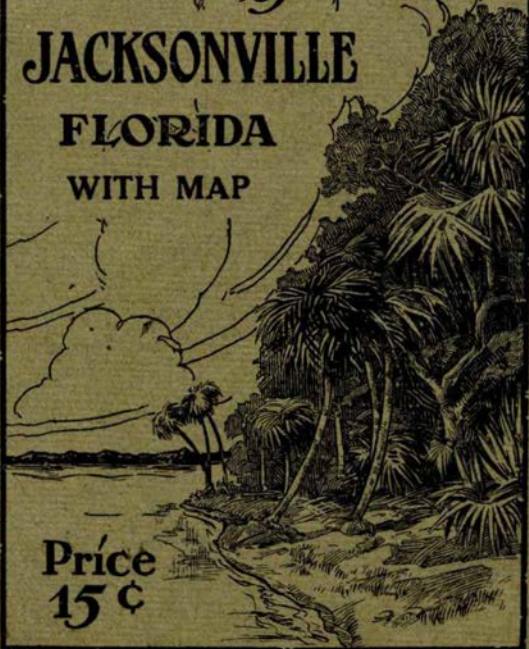

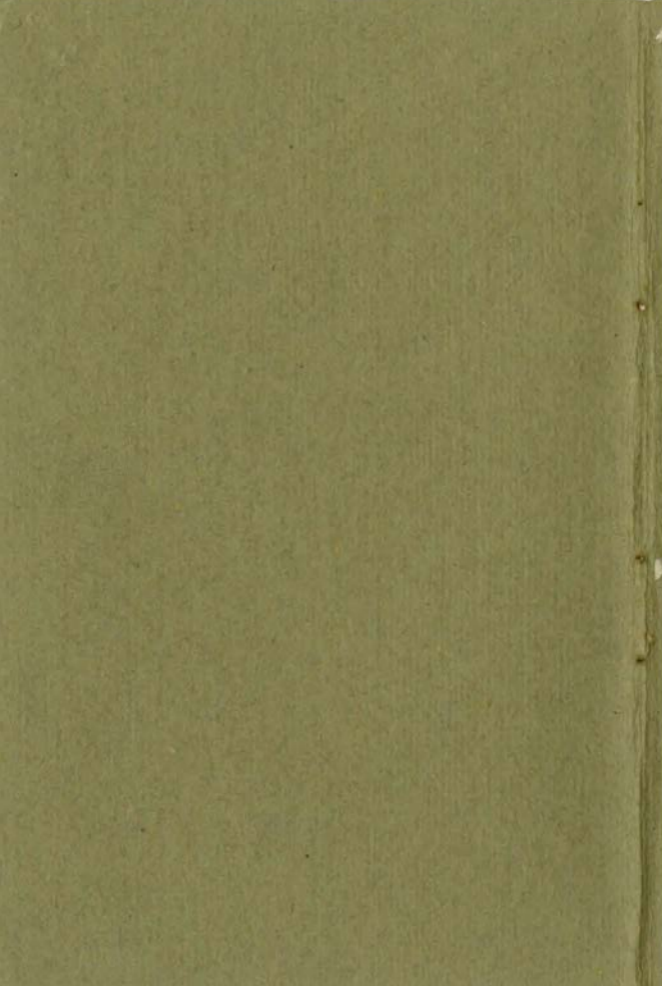

JACKSONVILLE, FLA.

JACKSONVILLE, the county seat of Duval County, is the Metropolis of Florida. It is the most important port on the South Atlantic coast. It is the railroad center and gateway to Florida.

Jacksonville is located on the north bank of the St. Johns River, sixteen miles from the ocean. It was called by the Indians Wacca Pililka (The cows crossing over) and in early accounts of the vicinity it is commonly called the cowford. There were no white settlers here until 1816. At that time a certain Lewis Z. Hogan, who had settled on the south side of the river, married a Spanish widow, Dona Maria Suarez, who had a grant of 200 acres upon the present site of the city. Thither the new family moved. The new settlement was well situated to take advantage of the tide of immigration and trade which was then beginning to flow south. In 1822 an Inn was opened by John Brady. In 1833 the town was incorporated and named Jacksonville, after General Jackson, who was not only a national hero, but one who had been closely connected with Florida history at the time of the secession from Spain.

During the Seminole war it was often a place of refuge for fugitives from other parts of the State

During the Civil War Jacksonville was four separate times captured by the Federal troops. On March 11, 1862, the United States gunboats "Ottawa," "Seneca" and "Perubina" crossed the bar of the St. Johns and with some lighter draft vessels captured the city peacefully the next day. In April the force was withdrawn. The following October it was again seized and again abandoned.

In March, 1863, it was again captured by colored troops, the 1st South Carolina Volunteers, under the command of Colonel Thomas Wentworth Higginson, and part of the 2nd South Carolina Volunteers, under Colonel Montgomery. The presence of the black troops gave considerable offense to the population of Jacksonville and must have led to ill feeling, for when the town was, within a month, again abandoned, there was much burning and looting, which, even in the North, was much criticized; it was, however, again taken by colored troops February 7, 1864, and held till the end of the war. Since that time the history may be said to be that of its growth and commercial development.

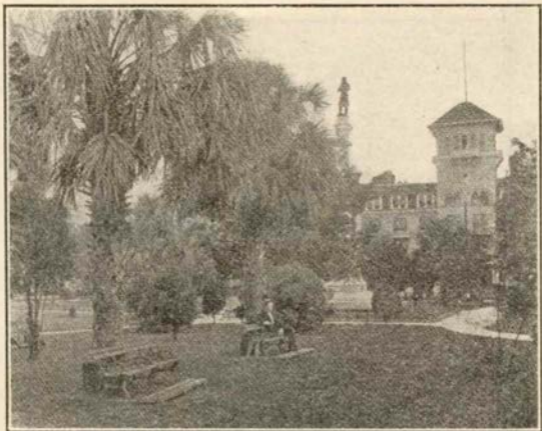

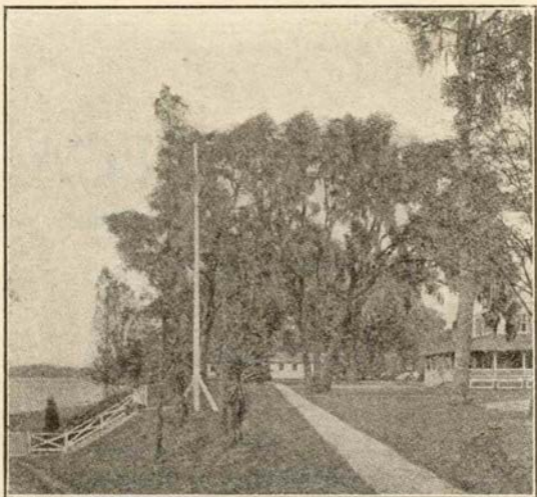

A View of the St. John's River

The St. Johns River, a magnificent tropical stream, unique from the fact that it is one of the two rivers in the United States which flow in a northern direction from its source.

It is about 300 miles in length and three-quarters of a mile in width at Jacksonville, and in many places it widens out into immense inland lakes six to ten miles across, in places it narrows down to between banks to about 100 feet in width; its banks being

wooded to the edge with palms, magnolias and dense tropical growth. Along its banks may be seen some of the finest orange and grapefruit groves in the State.

The lazy alligator may often be seen basking in the sun on logs reaching out into the river.

The white and blue herons and many other birds of plumage add to the beauty of its tropical scene.

Excursion trips may be taken up and down the river from Jacksonville.

The City of Jacksonville has some very fine parks and play grounds. The climatic conditions are extremely favorable to the growth of a very large variety of tropical palms, trees and flowers, water birds, alligators, etc., which add to their attractiveness. In Springfield Park there is a zoological collection.

The City of Jacksonville maintains, for the use of the public, in its parks over twenty tennis courts. The Florida Country Club also has five tennis courts and an eighteen-hole golf links. Members in good standing of other Country Clubs have the usual courtesies extended to them. It is beautifully situated on the St. Johns River at Ortega, is about six miles from the city and is reached by street car marked Ortega, also by a paved road.

by auto across the ferry to South Jacksonville, where there is a good brick surface highway to the beach.

Camp Johnston is located on the St. Johns River, about ten miles south of the city. It is reached by street car or a good paved road. It is said to be the most beautiful camp in the country; 35,000 men were quartered here.

It was the largest quartermaster's camp in the country.

The Florida State Fair is held at Jacksonville, and is the most unique and distinctive attraction of its kind in the country. It is located in the suburb and is reached by the Main Street car.

Jacksonville has the largest stock yard in the South, it is located on Tallyrand Avenue. Take Phoenix Park car and transfer to stock yard shuttle car.

Fishing. The Jetties, just off the coast of Mayport, is probably one of the greatest fishing grounds in the world for sea bass. It is at the mouth of the St. Johns River, about twenty miles from Jacksonville, and is reached by train from the Union Station, or by auto, motor or sail boat. Mayport probably has more visiting fishing men every winter than any other fishing town in the country. Although there are many other fish caught here, sea bass are the chief fish that the big sportsmen want.

There are many other good places to go fishing near the city. At Ortega there is a fishing station, where boats with rod and line may be rented. Take Ortega street car, get off at the other end of bridge. This will give you a good view of the St. Johns River.

Panama Park is another good place to fish. It is on a branch of the St. Johns River. Take Phoenix Park car to the end of line, walk through park to bridge. Boats, rod and line may be rented.

In both of these places trout, bass, brimm, sheep head, perch, cat fish, eel and many other fish are caught.

Amusement. Jacksonville has numerous places of public amusement, such as theatre, which books the best dramatic companies, also a first-class vaudeville theatre and six or seven first-class motion picture theatres which show the latest and up-to-date pictures. It also has several dancing academies, roller skating rinks and swimming pools.

There are many motor boats and launches on the St. Johns River which may be rented for a fishing or pleasure trip.

To the visitor one of the most important features of the city is its hotels. Jacksonville is known far and wide as a city of splendid hotel accommodations.

The capacity of these hotels is 5,000 guests. Their rates of course are fixed in accordance with their respective accommodations.

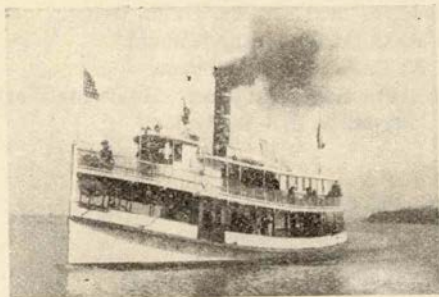

SPECIAL CITY ORDINANCES OF INTEREST TO THE STRANGER

Rules of Traffic—Keep to the right.

In making right hand turns into another street, keep close to the curb.

In turning to the left, do not cut across corner, but drive straight past center then swing left, thus keeping to right of center at all points.

When overtaking another vehicle, pass same to the left.

Before turning any corner, give due notice to those behind you.

On some down-town streets, especially Main Street, vehicles must have right wheels within six inches of curb when parked.

Do not turn in business section, if it requires vehicle to back, but turn at intersection of street or go around block.

Dimmers must be used in the city.

BAGGAGE, CAB, TAXICAB AND AUTOMOBILE RATES

For one trunk or large baggage within two miles 25 cents. For the same, exceeding two miles 50 cents.

For additional trunk or baggage, same as above.

For one person, within city limits, day rates, within two miles, 25 cents.

For one person, within city limits, after midnight, two miles, 50 cents.

For one person, within city limits, day rates, over two miles, 50 cents.

For one person, within city limits, after midnight, over two miles, 75 cents.

For each additional person, same as above.

Child under five years, accompanied by adult, free.

Child under 12 years and over 5 years accompanied by adult, half fare.

Hand baggage, not exceeding 50 pounds carried free; additional hand baggage, 15 cents per parcel.

Cab by the hour, day rates, \$1.00. After midnight, \$1.50.

AUTOMOBILE AND TAXICABS

Automobiles on the street, first hour \$4.00; each hour after, \$3.00.

Automobile from garage, according to capacity, \$5.00, \$4.00 and \$3.00.

Taxicabs—One to two persons, 25 cents for first mile; 20 cents each additional mile.

Three to seven persons, 35 cents for first mile; 30 cents each additional mile.

Taxicabs, waiting time per hour \$1.00 or 10 cents each 6 minutes.

FLORIDA GAME LAWS.

No State Game Warden. County Game Warden, the Sheriff.

Deer and Turkey—Open season November 20th to March 10th.

Wild turkey, quail, (bob-white partridges) turtle doves, geese, brant, ducks, rails, coots, sand pipers, curlews, snipe and plover—Open season November 20th to March 10th. Mud and marsh hens excluded.

Limit—1 deer, 2 wild turkeys, 20 quail or 25 birds of another species and no party of two or more persons shall kill more than 4 wild turkeys or more than 40 quail in any one day, and no person shall kill more than 3 deer, 10 turkeys or 300 of any other game-bird species during open season.

Wild Ducks—Open season November 20th to March 10th.

Export—No person may take or transport out of or within the state any such game, unless same be in his personal possession, or carried openly by the owner thereof.

No person, firm or corporation shall ship any deer, bird or game beyond the limits of the county in which they were killed without ascertaining that the owner thereof has a license and accompany the same.

License—Granted by County Judges of the counties good therein. Non-residents \$15.00 for each county. Good only through open season of the season issued.
