# The Blue Foundation for a Healthy Florida Grants Span Generations With Awards of \$148,110 to PACE, Gulf Coast Community Care

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. – The Blue Foundation for a Healthy Florida, Inc., announced today it has awarded \$148,110 to two West Central Florida non-profit organizations, representing 16 percent of its inaugural grants. The Blue Foundation awarded \$81,000 to PACE Center for Girls, Inc., of Pinellas County, and \$67,110 to Gulf Coast Community Care of Clearwater.

PACE Center for Girls received the grant to establish a comprehensive health education and case-management project for its clients. Under the program, a licensed nurse will develop a personalized treatment plan to help girls develop better self-care practices and to monitor each girl's health. The program targets girls who are at risk of pregnancy, poverty and criminal activity.

Gulf Coast Community Care will use its grant to expand its drug and alcohol education program for seniors into Hillsborough and Manatee counties. The program, Elder Ed, helps seniors learn to avoid medication errors and harmful drug interaction, and alerts them to physical reactions, such as changes in alcohol tolerance and signs of substance abuse. Gulf Coast Community Care has offered Elder Ed in Pinellas and Pasco counties for two years.

"We're committed to building a healthy Florida," said Susan Towler, executive director of The Blue Foundation for a Healthy Florida. "We're especially excited about these two grants because they span the generations in Florida, building health for today and for generations to come."

In all, The Blue Foundation awarded \$925,000 to 16 non-profit organizations throughout Florida in its first grant offerings. The Blue Foundation, the philanthropic affiliate of Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Florida (BCBSF), provides grants to support programs that positively impact the health and well-being of uninsured and underserved Floridians.

"These inaugural grants represent the significant positive impact that The Blue Foundation is having on the many health care challenges we face in Florida," said Towler. 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"Almost 200 organizations applied for grant funding totaling \$24 million in requests," Towler said. 
"We were pleased that there was so much interest in our goal to improve the health and well-being of uninsured and underserved Floridians." Following an initial review of all proposals, a 
team of Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Florida employees made recommendations to The Blue 
Foundation for a Healthy Florida board of directors, which approved the final grant offerings.

Towler said The Blue Foundation for a Healthy Florida plans to distribute up to \$1 million in grants each year. Beginning in 2002, grants will be distributed twice a year in the spring and in the fall. The next request for proposals deadline is March 8, 2002. TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – Student nurses at Florida State University's School of Nursing will be better prepared to save children's lives thanks to a grant from The Blue Foundation for a Healthy Florida, Inc. 



### **ELDER ED**

Medicare estimates that 20% of all hospital admissions of the elderly are alcohol or drug-related. These admissions are costly to insurers, indicate preventable illness in the patients and are, to a large extent, unnecessary. Community wide prevention and education needs to focus on (1) decreasing medication errors by teaching the importance the medication management, along with concrete methods to reduce errors and (2) alerting senior citizens to recommended levels of alcohol intake and the changes that aging brings about in lowering tolerance. These efforts are expected to result in improved health and lower use of health care services due to alcohol or medication misuse among the elderly.

Gulf Coast Community Care's Elder Ed program was initiated in February, 2000. This program, funded by the Florida Department of Children and Families, has targeted Pasco and Pinellas Counties. Community educators have offered seminars to seniors who live in the community focusing on identification and prevention of medication mismanagement and potential alcohol abuse. In the nearly two years of program operation, more than 11,200 elders have received community education programs in more than 400 presentations.

Post presentation evaluations indicate that seniors find the programs to be helpful and indicate that staff is providing what is often viewed as new and important educational and preventive knowledge for seniors. Thanks to the generosity of the **Blue Foundation for a Healthy Florida**, this program will extend preventive education to the nearly 250,000 seniors residing in Hillsborough and Manatee counties.

In addition, the new grant will permit Gulf Coast Community Care to utilize media sources reaching larger numbers of elderly throughout the Tampa Bay area who may need this knowledge. Gulf Coast will thus promote the mission of the Blue Foundation for a Healthy Florida to positively impact the health and well-being of under-served senior Floridians.



her doctor wants her to take.


"I'm going to have to find something, because I need my blood pressure medicine,"

ducted in Spanish, with an English translation. An advisory board including Segarra, other health-care professionals and a representative from Florida Hospital's Diabetes Center will address participants.

The personal touch works best, Mercado said.

"In the Hispanic culture, even when it's something beneficial to them, it requires that kind of friendliness," she said. "We do all our work in the community, at a time and place that is convenient for them with volunteers who they know."

The agency has a good track record with its initiatives. A program designed to help Hispanic women with early breast-cancer detection surpassed the expectations of the Florida Department of Health.

Hispanic Health Initiatives was supposed to provide refer-

rals for 60 women and information to 600 between January and June of this year. It ended up referring more than 150 and reaching more than 3,000, Mercado said.

#### Blunt talk can help

Segarra, who volunteers with a church support group for diabetics, said he encounters people who are scared. Others are stubborn and refuse to change their diet. And still others, such as his 78-year-old mother, refuse to acknowledge they have the disease.

"I try to raise their self-esteem and let them know if you treat it now, you won't have any problems in the future," he said. "We need to educate Hispanics about their diet. Eating well can prevent a lot of other diseases, not just diabetes."


With his clients at the downtown Orlando pharmacy where he works, he's more blunt.

"I tell them if you let this go on for years, you will start getting a lot of pain in your legs, your nerves will die, you will get gangrene and they will start amputating some limbs," he said.

"If you survive that, you can go blind, your organs will fail, [and] then it's pretty much over."

SARASOTA — A new diabetes education outreach program is starting at the Senior Friendship Centers, funded by a \$47,100 grant.

The two-year grant from the Blue Foundation for a Healthy Florida, the charitable arm of Blue Cross and Blue Shield, will be used to add a nurse/counselor position to the Center for Healthy Aging at the downtown branch.

"When I heard we got this grant I almost burst into tears, I was so happy," said Jane Icely, director of Healthy Aging Services.

Even with an endocrinologist on staff, the center has only been able to offer three hours a week of diabetes educa-

"We're looking at reaching out to low-income seniors, especially ones without health insurance," she said.

The education program will focus primarily on Type II diabetes, the most common form of the disease. In Type II, either the body does not produce enough insulin or the cells ignore the insulin, which is necessary for the body to use processed sugar.

"Maintaining control of diabetes means changing your lifestyle, with diet and exercise. The education is important because it's things the patients should be doing at home," said Marcia Swinehart, health services manager at the Venice Senior Friendship Center.

The Venice center provides transportation to the Center for Healthy Aging in Sarasota.

The Blue Foundation received 257 grant proposals, requesting \$24 million. Eleven programs were selected to receive grants totaling \$497,480.

"Diabetes is such a chronic condition in the elderly and in other populations. The Senior Friendship proposal for hiring a nurse educator really fulfills a need in the community," said Susan Towler, executive director of the Blue Foundation.

Many diabetes patients go undiagnosed for several years, making the condition more difficult to treat and control.

"Some people don't realize they have it until they start presenting symptoms like blindness or circulation problems," Icely said. "The tragedy is that diabetes is one of the most treatable diseases."

# Low-cost health care gets a big Blue boost

The Neighborhood Health Clinic was one of 257 agencies vying for nearly \$500,000 in grants from Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Florida

The founders of the Neighborhood Health Clinic remained in their office Thursday on the second floor of their new clinic on Goodlette-Frank Road, oblivious to the gathering of 10 employees and clinic directors downstairs in the waiting room.

The crowd was there to catch the looks of surprise on the faces of Dr. William and Nancy Lascheid, the clinic's founders, when they were presented with a \$23,700 grant from The Blue Foundation, a philanthropic arm of Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Florida.

"Oh, thank you," Nancy Lascheid said to Susan Towler, who presented the donation for the foundation. "We will be very frugal."

Nancy Lascheid and the directors submitted a grant proposal to the foundation earlier this year, seeking help for purchasing equipment for ear, nose and throat specialists who volunteer at the clinic. The clinic serves low-income and uninsured residents of Collier County.

"We will set up a room for ear, nose and throat (patients) with surgical equipment," Lascheid said. "But the equipment is multi-purpose."

For instance, some clinic patients come in with lesions, ear infections, and abscesses which may require minor procedures, but the clinic didn't have the necessary equipment. That meant referring the patients elsewhere.

Since the clinic opened at its

new location last month at 120 Goodlette-Frank Road N., it is averaging 150 patients a week. There are three walk-in clinic sessions, Monday and Thursdays from 3:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m., and Saturdays from 8:30 a.m. to noon.

The clinic was one of 11 grant recipients from the foundation, which has a mission to help programs that serve needy Florida residents.

"We received 257 proposals so the competition was pretty stiff," Towler told the Lascheids. "But your proposal was really wonderful."

All told, the foundation is awarding \$497,480 to the 11 grant recipients around the
