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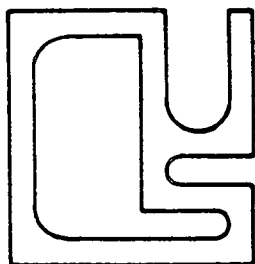

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DAVID CRANE is the economics editor for *The Toronto Star*, Canada's largest-circulated newspaper, where he writes on economic and political issues. He has served as Director of Corporate Affairs for the Canada Development Investment Corporation, the Crown agency responsible for Canadair, de Havilland Aircraft, Eldorado, Teleglobe, Fishery Products International and the government's controlling interest in Canada Development Corporation. A graduate of the University of Toronto, Mr. Crane has traveled extensively in his newspaper career, reporting on national and international issues, including trade policy, fiscal and tax policy, industrial policy, energy policy, Canadian-American relations and foreign investment policy. He has written three books, the latest of which, *The Next Canadian Century*, sets out the sweeping economic and social challenges facing Canada and proposes an agenda for growth and wealth creation in a knowledge-based, innovative economy.

E. DONALD ELLIOTT is the Julien and Virginia Cornell Professor of Environmental Law and Litigation at Yale Law School, and is also affiliated with the law firm of Fried, Frank, Harris, Shriver & Jacobson, in New York and Washington, D.C.. From July 1989 to August 1991, he served as Assistant Administrator and General Counsel of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, where he was primary legal advisor and a principal policy advisor to the EPA Administrator and the White House on all of EPA's programs. Before joining EPA, Professor Elliott served for five years as Special Litigation Counsel, Corporate Environmental Programs, General Electric Co., and he has recently been recognized by the *National Law Journal* as one of the nation's top twenty-five environmental and toxic tort attorneys. Professor Elliott has written and lectured extensively, both here and abroad, on regulatory policy and environmental liability. He received his B.A., Summa Cum Laude and Phi Beta Kappa, from Yale University (1970) and his J.D. from Yale Law School (1974).

CALVIN S. GOLDMAN is a partner in the law firm of Davies, Ward & Beck in Toronto. He has served as Assistant Special Prosecutor for the Attorney General of Canada in the Uranium Cartel proceedings and as Director of Investigation and Research under the Canadian Competition Act. As Director, Mr. Goldman was head of the Bureau of Competition Policy in the Government of Canada and, in that capacity, addressed various aspects of Canadian competition law and policy in a domestic and international context. He has served as Vice-Chairman of the OECD Committee on Competition Law and Policy, and is the new Chairman of the Canadian Committee on Competition Law and Policy for the Business and Advisory Committee to the OECD and for the International Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Goldman is a graduate of Osgoode Hall Law School of York University (1973 Gold Medal), and he completed his LL.M. at Harvard Law School in 1974. He has spoken extensively and has published a number of articles

CARL GRENIER is Director General of Trade Policy of the Québec Department of International Affairs, where he is closely involved in the defense of Québec's interests through the federal-provincial mechanisms which have allowed provincial participation in the Canada-U.S. free trade negotiations, the trilateral negotiations between Canada, the U.S. and Mexico, and the current Uruguay Round of GATT negotiations. Mr. Grenier was named Assistant Deputy Minister (Policy and Management) in 1990. He holds a degree from l'Université Laval, where he studied mathematics and geography.

ROBERT HAMILTON is the Director of the Business Income Tax Division in the Department of Finance of Canada. He first joined the Division in 1991 as Assistant Director after being associated with the Department of Finance since 1985. His responsibility as Director includes the development of income tax policies relating to businesses. Mr. Hamilton has published several articles on issues relating to tax policy and international trade including "Canada's R & D Tax Incentives: Recent Developments", Canadian Tax Foundation, 1992. He has also been heavily involved in the design and implementation of the Goods and Services Tax (GST) particularly in the area of policy development of financial services and housing. Mr. Hamilton received a Master's Degree in economics from the University of Western Ontario.

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SIMON V. POTTER is a partner in the Montreal law firm of Ogilvy Renault. He is the only person to have served on both a Chapter 18 FTA panel and a Chapter 19 FTA panel. Mr. Potter specializes in the area of international trade and competition law, as well as Canadian constitutional law. He is the immediate past President of the Québec Branch of the Canadian Bar Association. Mr. Potter is a graduate of Dartmouth College and of McGill University.

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
