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

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CARL GRENIER is Director General of Trade Policy of the Québec Department of International Affairs, where he is closely involved in the defense of Québec's interests through the federal-provincial mechanisms which have allowed provincial participation in the Canada-U.S. free trade negotiations, the trilateral negotiations between Canada, the U.S. and Mexico, and the current Uruguay Round of GATT negotiations. Mr. Grenier was named Assistant Deputy Minister (Policy and Management) in 1990. He holds a degree from l'Université Laval, where he studied mathematics and geography.

ROBERT HAMILTON is the Director of the Business Income Tax Division in the Department of Finance of Canada. He first joined the Division in 1991 as Assistant Director after being associated with the Department of Finance since 1985. His responsibility as Director includes the development of income tax policies relating to businesses. Mr. Hamilton has published several articles on issues relating to tax policy and international trade including "Canada's R & D Tax Incentives: Recent Developments", Canadian Tax Foundation, 1992. He has also been heavily involved in the design and implementation of the Goods and Services Tax (GST) particularly in the area of policy development of financial services and housing. Mr. Hamilton received a Master's Degree in economics from the University of Western Ontario.

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HANS SMIT is the Stanley H. Fuld Professor of Law and Director, Parker School of Foreign and Comparative Law at Columbia University Law School. He has served since 1968 as the Director of the Project on European Legal Institutions, and has previously served as a member to the U.S. Delegation to the U.N. Conference on Prescription in International Sales, an advisor to the U.S. delegation to UNICITRAL, a consultant to the Judicial Conference of the State of New York, and Reporter, U.S. Commission on International Judicial Procedure. A Fulbright Scholar, Professor Smit holds degrees from the University of Amsterdam (LL.B. 1946, highest honors; J.D. 1949, highest honors), Columbia University (A.M. 1953; LL.B. 1958, first in class) and the University of Paris I (J.S.D., Honoris Causa, 1991). He has lectured and published extensively in the areas of foreign, comparative and international law.

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
