M. JEAN ANDERSON is a senior partner at Weil, Gotshal & Manges where she specializes in international trade negotiations, trade proceedings, trade legislation, and international trade and regulatory strategies. She has been counsel to the Government of Canada on the NAFTA negotiations as well as on NAFTA and GATT implementation legislation. She has successfully represented U.S. and non-U.S. companies in complex anti-dumping and countervailing duty cases and has represented clients in Section 301 proceedings. Prior to joining Weil, Gotshal & Manges, Ms. Anderson was Chief Counsel for International Trade at the U.S. Department of Commerce. In that position, she was a principal negotiator of the U.S.-Canada Free Trade Agreement and a primary architect of the Chapter 19 dispute settlement system. She has also chaired the NAFTA Task Force, the International Trade Committee. and the Canada Committee of the American Bar Association's International Law Section. Ms. Anderson been an adjunct professor of international trade law at Georgetown University Law Center. She holds degrees from l'Institut d'Etudes Politiques of the University of Paris, Northwestern University, and Georgetown University Law Center.

He has published numerous articles and was selected by the United States Government to participate in the 1995 Congressional International Program on International Trade. He was chosen to design a program on international trade for the 1996 Commonwealth meeting of lawyers and judges in Vancouver. Mr. Condon holds a B.A. from the University of British Columbia, a law degree from McGill University, and an M.A. from the University of Calgary.

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WILLIAM C. GRAHAM is a Member of Parliament, where he currently Chairs the Standing Committee of the House of Commons on Foreign Affairs and International Trade. Currently, he leads Canada's intellectual property delegation working on the Free Trade Area of the Americas (FTAA). Throughout 1991 and 1992, he was on Canada's NAFTA negotiation delegation. Prior to his employment with Canada's Department of Foreign Affairs, Dr. Hertz was an associate professor in the Law Faculty at the City University of Hong Kong where he taught international, constitutional, and intellectual property law. He was also a Senior Research Associate in international law at the University of Toronto's Centre for International Studies. Dr. Hertz graduated from McGill University with first class honours and the Minister of Education's Gold Medal in History. As a Woodrow Wilson Fellow, he studied at Columbia University where he received an M.A. and a Ph.D., and the Certificate of the Institute on East Central Europe of the School of International Affairs. Dr. Hertz also holds an LL.B. in international law from Cambridge University and an LL.M. from the University of Toronto.

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GREG MASTEL is Vice-President for Policy Planning and Administration at the Economic Strategy Institute and is an adjunct professor at the University of Maryland Graduate School of Management and Technology. Previously, he worked in the U.S. Senate for eight years where he served as Chief International Trade Advisor to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee's International Trade Subcommittee. Mr. Mastel provides analysis for the Washington Post, The Los Angeles Times, The Washington Times, and The Wall Street Journal. He also writes a regular column on economics and trade for the Journal of Commerce. Mr. Mastel holds a Ph.D. in International Economics and an M.B.A.

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Council and chairs the interagency redimmittee conducting the annual "Special 301" review of the degree to which other countries provide adequate and effective protection of intellectual property. From 1992 to 1993, he was Deputy Assistant Trade Representative for Industry and served as chairman of the Multilateral Steel Agreement negotiating group in Geneva. In 1991 and into 1992, he served as Senior Agricultural Trade Policy Advisor at USTR where he participated in negotiation of the agricultural component of the NAFTA. Earlier in his career, Mr. Papovich was USTR's Director of Middle Eastern Affairs, Director of Steel Policy, and liaison with organized labor.
