# SESSION 3: BEYOND NAFTA. A NEW PARTNERSHIP FOR COMMON SECURITY AND PROSPERITY IN NORTH AMERICA.

#### INTRODUCTION

He is a native of Atlanta, Georgia; graduated from the University of Georgia, BA, or School of Environmental Design, and he has a J.D. from the University Georgia School of Law.
