He also currently teaches at Georgetown Law Center and has taught international trade at the Yale Law School. He served as Deputy Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Import Administration from June 1981 to June 1983, and was responsible for the U.S. investigations of anti-dumping and countervailing duty complaints and for the negotiations and implementation of the U.S.-E.C. trade arrangements on steel and administration of statutory import programs and foreign trade zones.

He is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and of the Trade Subcouncil of the Competitiveness Policy Council. He is one of five members of the World Trade Organization's permanent group of experts dealing with subsidies. He's also a member of the U.S. Court of International Trade's Advisory Committee on Rules.
