MEETING

of

AUGUST

THE AUGUST MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Friday, August 14, 1959, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Kenneth L. Davis, Harold R. Fischer, Melvin C. Lockard, Martin F. Oehmke, George T. Wilkins. Mrs. Collins and Mr. Sturgis were absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Assistant to the President Edward V. Miles, Jr., Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Mrs. Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on June 17, 1959, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, these minutes were approved as presented.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

ANNUAL INTERNAL BUDGET FOR 1959-1960

Copies of the Annual Internal Budget for 1959-1960 had been mailed to the members of the Board prior to this meeting. The Board was reminded that at their meeting on June 17, 1959, President Morris and

Budget Officer Clarence W. Stephens had explained the general procedures being followed in the preparation of the budget for the current year, and the major decisions required because of the stringency of the budget. The procedures had been approved by the Board, and a special committee had been appointed to consider the budget at a subsequent date.

This special committee, composed of Messrs. Wham, Sturgis, Davis, Lockard, and Fischer, had met on July 10, 1959. The budget, as mailed to the Board prior to the meeting, reflected their deliberations, decisions, and approval of recommended salaries for the University staff. The committee reported that in the course of their meeting President Morris had emphasized the fact that considerable attention had been given to the question of establishing new salary ranges and, in general, it had been the policy to attempt to bring up salaries in the middle ranges of the ranks, leaving for the second year of the biennium the bringing up of top level salaries.

A further point developed by President Morris, in answer to questions by members of the committee, was the fact that since the budget was extremely stringent in terms of anticipated enrollment, and since it was impossible to predict with complete accuracy the effect of enrollment pressures on staffing needs, money had been allocated in the budget in such a way that it could be shifted, if necessary, to handle unexpected pressures.

President Morris had indicated that while there were comparatively few new staff positions in terms of anticipated enrollments, there had been an unusual turnover due to the intense competition for teachers. He had indicated that many positions would need to be filled at higher salaries than had originally been anticipated.

In answer to questions regarding major projects, President Morris had indicated that certain physical plant and major repair projects of pressing importance would have to be handled out of the Major Repairs Contingency Fund until it becomes clear whether or not capital funds are to be made available for this purpose.

The committee reported that after considerable discussion of all aspects of the budget, they had approved the Annual Internal Budget and had agreed to submit it to the Board at this meeting for approval and ratification.

President Morris stated that Mr. Royal A. Stipes, President of the University Retirement System of Illinois, had written suggesting that approximately \$106,600.00 be transferred from contingency funds to the Retirement System, in anticipation of a predicted deficiency in the appropriation for contributions. It was agreed that such transfer would violate the spirit of Governor Stratton's intentions concerning Southern's

budget and, if a deficiency actually developed, additional funds should be sought through a deficiency appropriation.

After discussion, Kenneth L. Davis moved that the Board approve the Annual Internal Budget for 1959-1960, ratify the action of the special committee, and proceed with the item relating to University Retirement System contributions when it becomes necessary. The motion was seconded by George T. Wilkins and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis; Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTING OF CERTAIN TEMPORARY APPOINTMENTS RETROACTIVELY

At the December 10, 1958, meeting, it was requested that persons appointed in certain titles on a temporary basis be approved retroactively following the end of the fiscal year. We should like to add the title Graduate Assistant to this list, since a large turnover occurs in this group of temporary part-time staff members, as in the other groups named. Funds for Graduate Assistants are not, however, retained in one budgetary account as is true for each of the other titles. Each dean of a school or college, and in some instances a director of a division, has a blanket amount in his budget that is to be used for the appointment of graduate assistants. All recommendations made by the deans and directors for the appointment of graduate assistants will be made within the limits of these amounts or of the contingency funds for salaries.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board unanimously approved the reporting of Graduate Assistants retroactively, following the end of the fiscal year.

The death of Mr. Emil Zasowski, Associate Professor of Government, was reported. Mr. Zasowski was born October 26, 1898, and died June 18, 1959. He received the Master of Laws, Master of Arts, and Doctor of Laws degrees from the University of Paris. He served as Legal Advisor to the Polish Consulate and Embassy in Paris, to the Polish Legation in Lisbon, and to the Polish Consulate General in London. He was the author of several articles dealing with international legal problems. He served at the University of Miami prior to accepting appointment at Southern in 1955.

The death of Miss Emma L. Bowyer, Emerita Professor of English, was reported. Miss Bowyer was born August 28, 1882, and died August 8, 1959. She received the Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees from the University of Chicago. She was appointed to Southern's staff in 1912 and served as Head of the English Department from September, 1926, until her retirement in September, 1947. She is remembered with affection by her former students both for her forthright manner and her personal interest in them and their problems.

PROPOSED VANDEVEER CHAIR OF ECONOMICS

The following letter addressed to the Foundation Board of Trustees has been received from Mr. W. W. Vandever, distinguished alumnus of Southern Illinois University:

Annual Report of the Board of Trustees

GENTLEMEN:

On February 3, 1950, I made a gift to the Southern Illinois University Foundation of Voting Trust Certificates for 5,000 shares of the Ashland Oil & Refining Company with the provision that I should have the right, at any future time, to designate the purposes for which the income from such fund should be used and, pending such designation, providing that the annual income from such fund should be paid to the Treasurer of the Southern Illinois University Alumni Association.

This letter is written for the purpose of exercising such right of designation and supplementing the powers of the Foundation with respect to the investment and reinvestment of such fund.

On and after December 31, 1959, no further income from such fund shall be paid over to the Treasurer of the Southern Illinois University Alumni Fund.

On and after December 31, 1959, such gift, together with all investments or reinvestments thereof, shall be held by the Southern Illinois University Foundation, as a separate fund, for the use, benefit and endowment of the Vandevier Chair of Economics of Southern Illinois University. The Southern Illinois University Foundation shall have the right to sell, invest and reinvest such fund, together with any unexpended income, in such stocks, bonds, securities or other property of any kind or description as may be determined by the Trustees of such Foundation and to apply so much of the income thereof as they may deem necessary or advisable in support of such Chair and in the manner hereinafter provided. Income unexpended in any one year shall be added to the principal of such fund.

The income from such fund is to be used for the support of a professor in economics at Southern Illinois University, from time to time designated by the Trustees of Southern Illinois University, subject to the approval of the Trustees of the Southern Illinois University Foundation, as the holder or occupant of such Chair. The occupant of such Chair shall be known as the "Vandevier Professor of Economics". The first preference is for the support of a scholar whose primary field and interest is economics and particularly in the teaching and dissemination of knowledge with respect to the capitalist system.

The central object of such fund is to provide support for a scholar and teacher of the highest possible quality. With reference to the expenditure of income the order of preference shall be first, the salary and allowances of the holder of such Chair and second, reasonable expenses in support of his teaching and research.

At such times as the Chair may be vacant, the Trustees of such Foundation shall capitalize not less than four-fifths of the annual income and may use the remainder in support of the general program of Southern Illinois University with respect to instruction and research in economics but with the express understanding that a new Vandevener Professor of Economics shall be appointed as soon as may reasonably be possible either by promotion in the ranks of the faculty or by a new appointment from outside the University.

In the event, at any time in the future, the subject of economics should be dropped from the curriculum of Southern Illinois University or the teaching and dissemination of knowledge with respect to the capitalist system should be subordinated to the teaching of any other system, then the fund hereby established shall terminate and the principal of the fund shall be paid over to the unrestricted funds of the Southern Illinois University Foundation.

It is recommended that Mr. Vandevener's desires concerning the disposition of his gift be approved, and that a Vandevener Chair of Economics be established by Southern Illinois University.

INTER-DEPARTMENTAL CURRICULUM IN BIOLOGY

At the June 17, 1959, meeting of the Board of Trustees a number of inter-departmental teacher curricula, proposed by the College of Education, were approved. Among these was a curriculum in the biological sciences.

The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences has now requested the establishment of such a curriculum for its students who wish to concentrate in the biological sciences but not in a particular science such as Botany, Zoology, Physiology, or Microbiology. Such a curriculum would not entail the adding of new departments nor of additional courses, since the curriculum would be made up from the offerings of the existing specialized departments.

It is recommended that the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, in collaboration with the other colleges and schools of the University, be permitted to develop an inter-departmental curriculum in Biology.

George T. Wilkins moved that the Board approve the development of an inter-departmental curriculum in Biology; further, that steps be taken also for the training of students wishing to teach in junior high schools and junior colleges. The motion was seconded by Melvin C. Lockard and was carried by unanimous vote.

GAS LINE EASEMENT

On the 27th day of January, 1959, the Board of Trustees, sitting in its regular meeting, granted an easement for gas line construction and maintenance to the Illinois Electric and Gas Company. The purpose of the easement was to serve the Family Housing Project on property south of the Dowdell Tract and east of the Illinois Central Railroad tracks. After this easement was granted and the development of the area began to take place, the University Architect revised his plans to provide for a sidewalk which would have been over the area where the gas company had an easement for the laying of

a gas line. Consequently, it has been necessary to revise the easement, and approval of the following resolution is requested:

Resolution

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University has constructed a Family Housing Project on property adjacent to an extension of Wall Street south in the City of Carbondale; and

WHEREAS, the said Family Housing Project is to be heated by fuel gas furnished by the Illinois Electric and Gas Company; and

WHEREAS, an easement has heretofore been granted by the Board of Trustees to the said company for the purposes of construction, maintenance, and operation of a fuel gas line on property of the said Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that this easement be revised so that a different area may be contained within the easement of the company; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, sitting in regular session, that the private property right-of-way easement attached hereto be approved, that the Chairman of the said Board of Trustees be and is hereby authorized and directed to sign the said easement and the Secretary of the said Board of Trustees be and is authorized and directed to attest the said execution; and be it further

Resolved that the Board, as a condition of the granting of this easement, receive from the company a Deed of Release of Easement of the private property right-of-way easement previously granted on January 27, 1959.

Private Property Right of Way Easement

In consideration of the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00), and for other good and valuable considerations, in hand paid, receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, a municipal corporation, hereby grants unto Illinois Electric & Gas Company, its successors, lessees, and assigns, the right and privilege to place in, upon, along, and across the property of the undersigned on the location hereinafter described, a fuel gas distribution pipeline and the necessary appurtenances and appliances (all hereinafter referred to as property of said Company), the same to be used by said Company for the transmission and distribution of fuel gas and such other purposes as said pipeline is or may be used, for so long a period of time as said Company shall have the use for said premises, the same to be used and maintained by said Company for such purposes only.

Said property of the Company shall be located on said premises as nearly as possible as follows:

Beginning at Park Avenue and extending Southerly adjacent to South Wall Street to the located Family Housing Project to the West of South Wall Street a distance of approximately 4400 feet. Said pipeline to be located within an area 44 feet to 60 feet West of the center line of South Wall Street, said center-line of South Wall Street is the section line between Jackson County Sections 27 and 28, all as shown by Plat attached and hereby made a part hereof,

with the right to said Company to so construct, maintain, and operate its said property that normal and necessary appurtenances may extend the necessary distances on either side of above locations.

And permission is further granted unto said Illinois Electric & Gas Company to enter upon the premises of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, a municipal corporation, at all reasonable times for the purpose of maintaining, repairing, or replacing its said property, or for any other reasonable purpose connected with the use and operation thereof, provided, however, and the said Company, by its acceptance hereof, agrees to reimburse the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University for any and all damage which it may do to any of the property of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in entering upon said premises for such purpose of repairing, replacement, or maintenance.

Said Illinois Electric & Gas Company, by its acceptance hereof, and by the exercise of the rights and privileges hereby granted, agrees that gas line construction is not to damage or interfere with trees now located in Trailer Court area, and that it will keep its said property in proper state of repair, that if it constructs overhead or underground structures, it will replace all earth or grass that may be removed by it, either in construction or repair of same, in as good condition as the same was before being entered upon.

This agreement shall be binding upon the parties hereto, their successors and assigns.

This instrument executed by the corporate officers of the Grantor pursuant to resolution duly adopted by the Board of Trustees of Grantor Corporation.

Deed of Release of Easement

This Deed made this _____ day of _____, 1959, between the Illinois Electric & Gas Company, as Grantor, and the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, a municipal corporation, as Grantee,

WHEREAS, by deed of easement dated the 27th day of January, 1959, and recorded in Book 23, Page 376 of Miscellaneous Records in the Recorder of Deeds' Office of Jackson County, Illinois, between the said parties, Grantee did thereby grant to Grantor, its successors, lessees, and assigns, the right and privilege to place in, upon, along, and across the property of the Grantee of the said original grant of easement on the location described as follows:

Beginning at Park Avenue and extending Southerly adjacent to South Wall Street to the located Family Housing Project to the West South Wall Street a distance of approximately 4400 feet, said pipeline to be located on private property as nearly as possible 40' West of the center line of South Wall Street, but not less than 30' West of the centerline of South Wall Street, said centerline of South Wall Street is the section line between Jackson County Sections 27 and 28, all as shown by plat attached and hereby made a part hereof,

a fuel gas distribution pipeline and the necessary appurtenances and appliances, the same to be used by the original Grantee for the transmission and distribution of fuel gas and such other purposes as said pipeline might be used for so long a period of time as the Grantee shall have use for same; and

WHEREAS, Grantor has agreed to relinquish the said easement above given on the 27th day of January, 1959, to the Grantee in consideration of One Dollar (\$1.00);

Now This Deed Witnesseth, that in consideration of One Dollar (\$1.00) paid by Grantee to Grantor, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, Grantor releases and forever quit claims to Grantees, its successors, assigns, and lessees, all rights under the aforesaid lease granted on the 27th day of January, 1959, with the intent that the said lease may be forever extinguished, and the Grantee, its successors, assigns, and lessees shall hereafter have and enjoy the said premises so granted, free and absolutely discharged from such lease.

RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING PARIETAL RULES

At the time of closing on the University Center loan, the Housing and Home Finance Agency requested that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Trustees establishing parietal rules and regulations. The following suggested resolution conforms with this request. In brief, the resolution provides that the Board attempt in every way possible to assure maximum use of the facilities and service of the University Center, to the end that sufficient revenues may be available for meeting the bond payments as they become due. It is recommended for approval.

RESOLUTION establishing parietal rules and regulations in reference to Housing and Home Finance Agency Project No. Ill. 11-CH-76 (S)

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Illinois, adopted on January 27, 1959, a Resolution creating an issue of \$4,600,000 Student Center Bonds of 1958, for the purpose of paying the cost of the construction of a student union building to be located on the campus of said University at Carbondale, Illinois (such improvements and extensions hereinafter collectively designated the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, said Board of Trustees has the general power and authority to make rules and regulations for the good government and management of said University, including the use of a student center building whose revenues are pledged for payment of bonds issued to construct the same.

Now, Therefore, Be It And It Is Hereby Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Illinois, as follows:

SECTION 1. That this Board of Trustees hereby establishes and covenants to enforce, so long as any of the bonds authorized under said Resolution adopted January 27, 1959, are outstanding and unpaid, the following parietal rules and regulations to assure continuous maximum occupancy and use of the facilities and services afforded by the Project:

(a) In the event more or additional space or facilities become available or useable for a student center building than are provided by the Project, the officers of said University are hereby directed to give preference and priority to the use of said Project, resulting in the occupancy and use of all the space and facilities of said Project, to the fullest extent practicable, even if such preference and priority results in the non-use of all or a part of any other space or facilities available or useable for a student center building.

(b) In the event any surplus space or facilities should become available in the said Project, the officers of said University are hereby directed to provide for the occupancy and use thereof to the fullest extent practicable.

(c) The officers of said University are hereby directed to utilize, and to cause the utilization of, said Project in such manner to yield continuously the maximum revenues of which said Project is reasonably capable.

SECTION 2. That this Board reserves the right to amend these rules and regulations from time to time to meet changing conditions at said University to fulfill the covenants made by said Board in the pledge of revenues to be derived from said Project under said Resolution adopted January 27, 1959.

SECTION 3. That these parietal rules and regulations shall be subordinate to the parietal rules and regulations heretofore adopted in connection with the authorization of outstanding bonds issued for and on behalf of said University insofar as there may be any conflict therewith.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted the resolution establishing parietal rules and regulations for the University Center. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard.

REPORTS ON CURRENT PENDING MATTERS

Vice-President Harold W. See, at President Morris' request, reviewed the land acquisition program for the Southwestern Illinois Campus, indicating on a map the land actually owned, land under contract for deed, and land not yet purchased. He stated that land under cultivation would produce income estimated conservatively at \$25,000.00, and that an additional \$10,000.00 had been received in cash and new pledges during the past several months.

President Morris reported to the Board a meeting which he had attended which included representatives of the Chamber of Commerce, the City Council, and the Community Development Group. They had discussed mutual problems and had asked that studies be made of incorporating University property within the city limits. There was to be further study on this matter. Mr. Wham asked the status of the cooperative zoning and study plan which was being undertaken for the community, and President Morris reported that a firm had been selected and quotations were to be obtained for (1) a comprehensive study, and (2) a zoning program.

The Board concluded the meeting in executive session and adjourned at 5 P.M.

THE OCTOBER MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Friday, October 16, 1959, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Kenneth L. Davis, Harold R. Fischer, Melvin C. Lockard, Lindell W. Sturgis, George T. Wilkins. Mrs. Collins and Mr. Oehmke were absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President George H. Hand, Vice-President Harold W. See, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Mrs. Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held September 18, 1959, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, these minutes were approved as presented.

Matters presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

DEVELOPMENT OF TELEVISION AT SOUTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY

The problem of educational television, of the University's responsibility for assisting in its development, and of the possible effects of television on education in the future, have been and remain subjects of considerable concern. For the information of the Board of Trustees, we present a report on the development of television at Southern Illinois University from 1951 to the present.

The materials for this report have been largely provided by Mr. Buren Robbins, Assistant Professor of Radio-Television and Director of Broadcasting for the University.

In September of 1951, the University submitted a proposal to the Federal Communications Commission for the allocation of VHF (very high frequency) Channel 10 to Carbondale for educational purposes. This action was prompted by the fact that an allocation plan for television channels, released in March, 1951, by the Federal Communications Commission, had made no provision for a channel in the Southern Illinois area for educational purposes. Since it was already apparent that television could ultimately be of great assistance in achieving the University's objectives of instruction, research, and area service, we felt that failure to obtain a channel would seriously handicap not only Southern Illinois but also Southern Illinois University. The proposal to the Federal Communications Commission included an engineering analysis and plans prepared by a professional consulting engineer, demonstrating how under the terms of the Commission's requirements Channel 10 could be assigned to Carbondale. The Commission received a number of objections from commercial television interests; and therefore, in the late fall of 1951, the University filed a further statement confuting these objections. The result was that in March of 1952 the Federal Communications Commission assigned UHF (ultra high frequency) Channel 61 to Carbondale for educational purposes. The University decided, however, that it would not apply to the FCC for a permit to construct a station on this channel. First, the maximum coverage of an UHF operation would not provide adequate service to a large enough portion of Southern Illinois. Secondly, the maximum coverage and the audience available for UHF operation would not justify the cost of installation and operation. Thirdly, most of the receivers in the area were for VHF channels, and it would be difficult to motivate the area audience to obtain UHF receivers.

In March of 1957, VHF Channels 3 and 8 became available in Southern Illinois because certain other channels in the nation-wide plan had been moved from their original allocations. Southern Illinois University therefore filed another proposal with the Federal Communications Commission for allocation of a VHF channel to Southern Illinois for educational purposes. On March 21, 1958, the FCC adopted a report and order which assigned VHF Channel 8 to Carbondale. Under this allocation plan, the transmitter tower for an operation would have to be located at least 18 miles north or northeast of Carbondale. This required location is regarded as very advantageous to Southern Illinois University for educational television operation, since the transmitter can be placed near the center of the University's thirty-one county service area. With the approval of the Board of Trustees, the University therefore applied to the FCC for a permit to construct and operate a television station on Channel 8. During the next year a site approximately one and one-half miles southwest of Tamaroa, Illinois, was selected and was cleared with the Air Coordinating Committee of the Civil Aeronautics Authority.

Meanwhile, the University had been doing what it could to make ready for the operation of a television station. During 1954, 1955, and 1956, informational and cultural programs were presented by the University on WSIL-TV

(Channel 22) from Harrisburg, Illinois. In addition, various public service, news, and informational programs were prepared for presentation, either live or on film, from other area television stations. Equipment has been acquired, but because of lack of adequate space and personnel has not, to date, been fully used.

More recently, University staff members, students, and guests have been presented in interviews and performances on KFVS-TV, Cape Girardeau, Missouri, each Tuesday morning. From December, 1957, through September, 1958, our programs were presented every two weeks on WPSD-TV, Paducah, Kentucky. Various other half-hour presentations have been presented from KSD-TV and KTVI-TV, St. Louis, Missouri. Courses for credit have also been offered (beginning April 13, 1959) with twenty-six half-hour programs from WSIL-TV, Harrisburg. The first course (Typing) was prepared by the Adult Education Department of the University. Furthermore, Southern Illinois University has supported the Continental Classroom program, having already participated in the offering of a course in Physics for credit, and now participating in the offering of a course in Chemistry for credit.

As to the future, studies are continuing concerning the following possibilities: First, there is envisioned ultimately an open circuit on-the-air station. More immediately, there is envisioned a closed circuit station for campus distribution only, which would enable us to meet certain enrollment pressures by duplicating in various rooms on the campus lectures, concerts, and film presentations. The Broadcasting Service is working with representatives from many departments in developing program ideas. The Southern Illinois area is being studied to determine how an educational television station at Southern Illinois University could assist in meeting the needs of the area. Another study is proceeding to determine how closed circuit television might best be used to further the educational program of the University. In general, programs now being developed have one or more of the following objectives: (1) Course-for-credit, college level; (2) Course-for-certification, adult education; (3) Courses or programs to supplement public school offerings; (4) Enrichment programs; (5) Public service programs.

At the next meeting of the Board of Trustees, certain ideas will be presented concerning the possibility of developing an educational television network for the State of Illinois.

The Board agreed to consider at the next meeting a proposal for the development of a state-wide educational television network.

THE DECEMBER MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Saturday, December 12, 1959, beginning at 1:30 P.M.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on October 16, 1959, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, these minutes were approved as presented.

In compliance with Part II, Article V, Section 5 of the By-laws of the Board of Trustees, notice of the intention to request amendment to Part III, Article V, Sections 2 and 4, B, and the addition of Section 8, and amendment of Part III, Article VII, Section 1, B, 2, e, was mailed to each member of the Board on November 20, 1959. On motion of George T. Wilkins, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board unanimously adopted amendments and additions to the sections designated, as follows:

Part III, Article V, Section 2, amended by adding:
F. The Security Officer.

Part III, Article V, Section 4, B, amended by deleting in line 7 the words: *and police*

Part III, Article V, amended by adding Section 8:

Section 8. The Security Officer.

A. The Security Officer shall be responsible to the President, except as otherwise noted herein, through the Chief Executive Assistant, and shall hold his position at the pleasure of the President and the Board. In matters dealing with student welfare and conduct, he shall be responsible to the President through the Director of Student Affairs. In discharging his duties, he shall, in matters involving legal questions, be directed by the Legal Counsel; provided, that such direction shall be reported where time permits to either the Chief Executive Assistant or the Director of Student Affairs before proceeding.

B. The Security Officer shall be responsible for the security and protection of University equipment and properties. In fulfilling this responsibility, the Security Officer shall, in addition to primary responsibility for the security and protection of University equipment and properties, supplement and assist the discharge of the responsibility of the Director of the Physical Plant for maintenance, care, and repair of University equipment and property.

C. The Security Officer shall investigate and report to the appropriate administrative officer cases of misconduct by staff members or students when such misconduct is detrimental to the welfare of the University.

D. The Security Officer shall be responsible for police protection of the campuses.

Part III, Article VII, Section 1, B, 2, e, amended by adding the sentence:

He may utilize the services of the Security Officer in those instances where he deems it advisable.

MADAM AND GENTLEMEN:

Recently I advised you that the Faculty Welfare and Service Committee would soon make a recommendation for a revised group hospitalization, surgical

and medical benefits plan for the faculty and staff. The committee has now made its recommendation and is preparing its announcements.

The enclosed booklet describes the plan and is a "dummy" of the announcement material. The committee recommended this plan after a study of the needs and desires expressed to them by the faculty and staff and the proposals made by a number of underwriting companies. Invitations to bid were sent in August to 18 companies which had previously indicated an interest in the University group. The committee made its selection based upon coverage, premium rates, and the service which would be rendered the group by the underwriting company. We hope that before long the University may be able to subsidize a plan of this kind by paying a portion of the monthly premium rate.

For a number of years — since 1951 at least — the University has assisted such a group plan by acting as the collection agency for members of the group. Individual staff members pay premiums to the Bursar who then transmits a single check to the company. Although this practice has been followed for some years, we do not find that the practice has been reported to or approved by the Board. I recommend that the practice be approved. The University can help in this way with the costs of administration of a group plan, and thus make such a plan available to the faculty and staff at the lowest possible rates.

Because the present plan expires November 15, the committee wishes the new plan to become effective on that date. For this reason, I am seeking your approval by mail of the University assisting in the collection of premiums. If you approve, will you please indicate such approval on the enclosed copy of this letter and return?

Matters presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

PROPOSED EDUCATIONAL TELEVISION NETWORK

At the October 16, 1959, meeting of the Board of Trustees, a report of past and current activities in educational television was presented with a view to providing background for a larger problem, namely, the extent to which Southern Illinois University can and should participate in an educational television network for the State of Illinois. The suggestions that follow are largely the result of the thinking of Mr. Buren Robbins, Assistant Professor of Radio-Television and Director of Broadcasting at Southern Illinois University.

Mr. Robbins points out that in attempting to envision an educational television network for the State of Illinois, two approaches might be used. The first approach would be to establish a network which would interconnect only those educational television stations which are already in operation or which might soon be in operation. If this approach were to be taken, only Chicago, the

University of Illinois, Southern Illinois University, and Station KETC-St. Louis (assuming that this last station might be willing to cooperate) could be taken into consideration. The second approach would be to provide not only the interconnecting by microwave systems of available or planned stations, but also the installing of a sufficient number of additional television stations to provide educational television to the entire State of Illinois. This approach would entail the installation of originating stations at various institutions and points in the state where stations might not otherwise be installed. Thus there would be a comprehensive system of interconnected stations throughout the state which would eventually make educational television service available to practically every individual and every grade or high school in Illinois.

It is this second approach which has been adopted here for purposes of discussion. Two plans by which this second approach could be carried out are herewith presented, but even they are not intended to be completely definitive. They are, however, based on such factual information as present and possible future availabilities of television channels, performance expectations of equipment as gleaned from consultation with equipment manufacturers and television engineers, and cost estimates furnished by reputable manufacturers. Both plans presented here employ the microwave system of networking. The carriage of television signals from one point to another over any considerable distance is best achieved by this method. In both of these plans, studios could originate programs without owning their own transmitters. Thus it would be possible for Illinois State Normal and Eastern Illinois University to participate with studios but without transmitters. It is hoped that each of the institutions involved would install and operate its own studios and transmitter, thereby leaving for the State of Illinois only the installation of a studio at Springfield.

Each of these plans when fully developed would provide ten program origination points or studios. This would divide the labor of producing educational television programs among the various originating points so that materials and personnel from all parts of the state could be utilized. For example, any one of the ten originating points could broadcast seventy hours of programs each week but would have to produce not more than twelve or fifteen hours of that programming itself. Furthermore, production quality should be appreciably higher if the resources of all the stations could be utilized to provide programs for each of the stations.

Each plan indicates a studio at Springfield. Such an origination point at the state capital would permit state-wide distribution of many items of educational interest in the fields of government, history, law, and economics, to mention only a few.

It should be emphasized that these plans are tentative and that many changes and additions could readily be made in them. For example, the plans include a privately endowed institution which already has television studios in operation, James Millikin University at Decatur. Quincy College and other privately supported schools might well be invited to participate in the plan.

The developing Southwestern Illinois Campus of Southern Illinois University might well provide a point of origination near Edwardsville.

Furthermore, the Illinois State Educational Television Network could readily provide for interconnection with networks in adjoining states if and when these adjacent networks are established.

Mr. Robbins suggests several steps by which a comprehensive educational network for the State of Illinois might be achieved. The first step would be to induce a sufficient number of stations, correctly placed to cover a major portion of the state, to participate. These originating points would not in all cases be on-the-air stations. In several cases, the originating points would be studios only.

A second step would be the installation of one or two video-tape recorders at each of the originating points. Programs originated at various producing studios could be video-tape recorded. These video-taped programs could then be circulated to the other educational television stations in the state.

Such a procedure would soon demand a state headquarters for production quality control, production coordination (to avoid duplication of programs and effort), duplication of tapes, and trafficking. The initial installation of video-tape recorders would certainly make the initial cost of a comprehensive plan much less than would the initial installation of a microwave system. Furthermore, since the video-tape recorders would be useful in a microwave network, which would eventually become necessary, the cost of them would not need to be written off in the final stages of the development. The video-tape recorder would not permit instantaneous telecasting throughout the state of current events in history, politics, science, etc., but it would permit showings of outstanding teachers and important persons in other fields and several reruns of programs without studio appearances of personnel.

Mr. Robbins points out that the Federal Communications Commission is now actively considering the possibility of a new television spectrum plan. This plan may conceivably provide more VHF channels than are now presently available, but it cannot be established for two years or possibly more. Meanwhile, the State of Illinois should get in its bid for necessary additional television channel allocations to make possible a comprehensive educational television network. If a truly effective argument for these necessary additional channels is to be submitted to the Federal Communications Commission, a state-wide planning group or committee should be set up at the earliest possible moment.

As to Southern Illinois University's participation in such a program, it would appear that the following possibilities are not too unrealistic: (1) Southern Illinois University should provide at least one or two origination points in the state-wide network and should produce programs both for its own use and for the use of other participants; (2) Southern Illinois University, by virtue of its early start in the field, has unusual opportunities for training personnel for a state-wide network; (3) in cooperation with a central state agency such as the Office of Public Instruction, Southern Illinois University could assume leadership in this field and possibly serve as the educational and planning center for a state-wide system. Because of its recent experiences with the Federal Communications Commission, for example, it could take the initiative in petitioning for new channels necessary to make effective not only a national educational television network but also a state-wide educational television network.

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees give serious consideration to each of these possibilities and that it seek advice, particularly from the Superintendent of Public Instruction, as to the most effective participation by Southern Illinois University in a state-wide educational television network.

Plan I — A Possible Educational Television Network for the State of Illinois

Plan I is predicated on the assumptions that:

- (1) Educational television Station KETC, St. Louis, Missouri, and the six state-supported universities in Illinois would be willing to cooperate in the project
- (2) Southern Illinois University will soon install and operate a television station
- (3) The University of Illinois will move its television transmitter to Allerton Park and increase the transmitter power and height of antenna
- (4) Two necessary VHF television channel allocations would be secured for DeKalb (Northern Illinois University) and Macomb (Western Illinois University). The securing of these channels is not at the present time a high probability. However, if a State Commission on this project were set up and if this Commission were to approach the Federal Communications Commission with a definitely established plan, it is not inconceivable that these channels could be secured.

It will be noted that Plan I is set up in three stages of development. This procedure has been suggested for two reasons: (1) the comparatively high cost of this network could be distributed over several years; (2) the network could be started with existing stations and other facilities without waiting for the complete network to be activated.

Plan I would enable each state university to provide programming to suit the peculiar needs of its own area. At the same time each could broadcast programs of a general nature which might be originated by other educational institutions on the network.

The estimated cost of the microwave system for Stage 1 would be \$400,000, including property and buildings. The estimated cost of Stage 2 would be \$180,000. Stage 3 would involve no cost for the microwave system. The costs for studios and transmitters, while they are available, have not been included here. It is to be hoped that each institution would itself cover the costs of these facilities.

Plan II — A Possible Educational Television Network for the State of Illinois

Plan II is predicated on the assumptions that:

- (1) Educational television station KETC, St. Louis, Missouri, and the six state-supported universities in Illinois would be willing to cooperate in the project.
- (2) Southern Illinois University will soon install and operate a television station.
- (3) The University of Illinois will soon move its television transmitting facilities to Allerton Park and increase the transmitter power and antenna height.

(4) Permission could be secured from the Federal Communications Commission to install the necessary, low power, comparatively small coverage, satellite and base stations that would be necessary to cover effectively those areas not to be served by the St. Louis, Southern Illinois University, University of Illinois, and Chicago stations. Low powered VHF stations would seem to be most desirable because of the prevalence of VHF receivers. However, these restricted coverage stations might all be low channel UHF operations. Certainly, it would seem that a state educational television planning commission, with a definitely established plan, should be able to prevail upon the FCC to allocate channels to achieve this desired coverage.

Plan II has been proposed for three stages of development. This procedure has been suggested for the two reasons indicated in Plan I.

The first stage would connect by microwave relay system Southern Illinois University, St. Louis educational station KETC, the University of Illinois, and Chicago. This initial stage would also include the connection of studios at Decatur (James Millikin University, where some studio facilities are already available) and Springfield, where it is hoped that studios could be installed.

The second stage would involve the installation of microwave systems between Chicago and DeKalb, Urbana and Charleston, Urbana and Normal, Springfield and Macomb, and the installation of a transmitter at Macomb. Studios would be installed at Charleston and Normal, as well as at DeKalb and Macomb.

The third stage would involve the installation of 12 low power, comparatively small coverage transmitters and of the necessary microwave systems to interconnect these points with the already established system. These low power stations would actually be satellites of these three universities: Northern Illinois, Western Illinois, Southern Illinois. Thus, each of these three university operations could broadcast over its own small network programs peculiarly suited to its area or could broadcast programs furnished by the network.

The estimated cost of Stage 1, which would involve the construction only of microwave network facilities, would be \$400,000, including property and buildings. Stage 2 would cost an estimated \$180,000. Stage 3 would cost an estimated \$600,000. Stage 3 would include the cost of the low power transmitters, towers, property and buildings.

In the presentation of this report, Professor Tenney spoke about the desirability of the University's cooperation in a state-wide network. President Morris explained in detail how such a network would operate and the possibility of using the St. Louis educational television station as a part of the network. Mr. Wilkins discussed with the Board a meeting which he had attended in Boston concerning the Ford Foundation's proposal for airborne television. He mentioned that this plan would be presented to the Illinois School Problems Commission on January 21, 1960. President Morris indicated that a representative of the University would be in attendance at that meeting.

Professor Tenney concluded by commenting that it would seem to be within the purview of the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction to finally arrange a cooperative state venture on educational television.

PROPOSED UNIVERSITY GALLERIES

The School of Fine Arts has recommended the official establishment of University galleries for the purpose of attracting gifts of works of art and for the housing of such gifts and purchases. These gifts would be received through the Southern Illinois University Foundation for exhibition by the University. The University galleries would be operated by the School of Fine Arts and the Art Department, but advice would be obtained both from the Southern Illinois University Foundation and from an advisory committee named by the President of the University.

The establishment of such galleries has aroused considerable interest and certain donors have already promised gifts for the decoration of certain galleries in the University's buildings. The organization of such galleries would encourage the presentation of objects of fine art to the University and would also make possible more effective planning concerning the handling and housing of the University's art collections.

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the establishment of University galleries for these purposes.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the establishment of University galleries, as recommended. The following specific proposal was then considered by the Board:

Recently a gift has been proposed to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University by Mr. and Mrs. John Russell Mitchell of Mt. Vernon, Illinois, for the establishment and maintenance of an art gallery. Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell have made available to the University two \$5,000 gifts. The first \$5,000 gift is to be effective upon its acceptance by the Board of Trustees at this meeting, and the second gift is to be dated January 5, 1960. In addition, Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell are assuming certain design and decorating fees for the establishment of the art gallery.

The following resolution, which reflects the understandings with Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell, is recommended for approval:

Resolution

WHEREAS, Mr. and Mrs. John Russell Mitchell have tendered two gifts of \$5,000 each for the establishment of an art gallery; and

WHEREAS, Mr. and Mrs. John Russell Mitchell have agreed to pay architectural designing and decorating fees to the firm of Virginia Conner Mosely for the design and decoration of such a gallery; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees is desirous of establishing a gallery for the purpose of exhibiting pictures and objects of art, which exhibitions shall be

available to the students and faculty of Southern Illinois University and to the general public.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, sitting in regular session, that the two \$5,000 gifts and the gift of the design and decorating fees be accepted, subject to the following conditions, to-wit:

1. Space presently designated as Classrooms 108 and 110 in the Home Economics Building and a corridor leading thereto from the Family Living Room be finished and decorated for the purpose of a gallery to be known and designated as the "Mr. and Mrs. John Russell Mitchell Gallery", and that such gallery be maintained and used until a space of equal area, with comparable decor, be provided in a comparable building.

2. That in the event the gallery is removed to another location under the conditions provided herein, the name of the gallery is to remain and be so designated as the "Mr. and Mrs. John Russell Mitchell Gallery".

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted the resolution presented, accepting the gifts of Mr. and Mrs. John Russell Mitchell and designating the space to be occupied by an art gallery. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

The following item, not submitted in advance of this meeting, was presented and accepted by the Board for consideration:

CHIEF EXECUTIVE ASSISTANT FOR THE CARBONDALE CAMPUS

Approval is requested for the creation of a position of Chief Executive Assistant for the Carbondale Campus, with the title Vice-President for the Carbondale Campus. Before the next meeting of the Board of Trustees it is planned to present to the Board the phrasing of an amendment to the Statutes covering the basic provisions for this position.

It is hoped that the creation of this position will make it possible to separate more effectively the staff function of planning and review in the President's Office from the executive and line functions of operating approved programs on the two campuses. The result should be more effective educational planning for the use of the resources of the University and more efficiency at the operational level.

Since this change will necessitate a re-examination of the entire program of the University, and the establishment of new working relationships on and between its various campuses, continuing studies will be made of the program and further changes may be proposed to the Board from time to time.

President Morris explained the proposal for an Executive Assistant with title of Vice-President for the Carbondale Campus. He indicated that the purpose of the proposal was to delineate between the responsibility for planning and review and the responsibility for operation. The Vice-President for the Carbondale Campus and the Vice-President for the Southwestern Illinois Campus will be operational officers reporting directly to the President. Others of the President's staff, including the Vice-President for Instruction, will be advisory and will assist the President in planning, scrutiny of programs, and review of proposals and programs. President Morris further indicated that the outline of this type of administration had been submitted to the Procedures Committee and that they had concurred. Further, the plan had been discussed with the academic deans, the directors of the divisions in the business affairs area of the University operation, the Director of Area Services, and the Director of Student Affairs.

President Morris indicated that it was not immediately possible to divide all the operational aspects of the University into either Carbondale Campus operation or Southwestern Illinois Campus operation because there were many areas which touch on both and in which there is dual responsibility to both areas. The possibility of establishing a third area of responsibility for the operation of these dual functioning agencies was discussed. Mr. Wilkins suggested that it might be necessary to have a Vice-President for general and related services.

After extensive discussion, Harold R. Fischer moved that the Board approve the creation of a position of Executive Assistant for the Carbon-

dale Campus, with the title of Vice-President for the Carbondale Campus, subject to an amendment to the Statutes to create the position. The motion was seconded by Melvin C. Lockard and was carried by unanimous vote.

PROPOSED ADMISSIONS POLICY

Because of the rapid increase in university enrollments, the University is currently faced with the difficulty of providing adequate housing for students, adequate laboratory space, and in many cases adequate classroom facilities. The pressure is particularly heavy during the fall quarter when our enrollment for the year is always at its peak. Typically, there is a decrease of from 300 to 400 students between the fall and winter quarters, and an additional decrease of about 200 students between the winter and spring quarters.

A system whereby a more uniform enrollment can be maintained throughout the school year, whereby more students with high entrance qualifications can be assured of places in the University, and whereby students with scholastic difficulties can receive more assistance, is therefore being sought. During this current fall quarter, 290 of our new freshman students were admitted on probation because they were in the lowest quarter of their high school graduating class; and, in addition, certain transfer students were admitted on scholastic probation. During the fall quarter, the University staff is least able to give them individual attention and special aid. During the other quarters of the year, more staff time is available to counsel them concerning study habits, vocational objectives, etc.

Approval is therefore requested for the following University-wide admissions policy, effective for the fall quarter of 1960:

1. Students who graduate from approved secondary schools, and who rank in the lowest quarter of their graduating class, will be permitted to enter (on

academic probation) for the summer, winter, or spring quarters only. Exceptions to this rule may be made for students desiring to enter in the fall who rank in the lowest quarter of their high school graduating classes, but who show high scores on the University's entrance examinations.

2. The same policy will apply to transfer students who are not in good scholastic standing under our scholarship rules. They can enter (on academic probation) the summer, winter, or spring quarters only, subject to the approval of the appropriate academic dean.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by George T. Wilkins, the Board approved the above admissions policy, effective the fall quarter of 1960.

THE JANUARY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Friday, January 22, 1960, beginning at 10 A.M.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President Harold W. See, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager and Treasurer Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisian*, and Mrs. Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on December 12, 1959, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board approved these minutes as presented.

By secret ballot, in accordance with Part II, Article II, Section 1, of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, the following members of the Board were elected to serve as officers until their successors are elected and qualified: John Page Wham, Chairman; Lindell W. Sturgis, Vice-Chairman; Melvin C. Lockard, Secretary.

In accordance with Part II, Article III, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, the following members of the Board were elected to serve as members of the Executive Committee: Harold R. Fischer and Martin F. Oehmke. As stated in the By-Laws, the third member of the Executive Committee shall be the Chairman of the Board.

In compliance with Part II, Article V, Section 5 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, notice was mailed on December 31, 1959, of the intention to request amendment to Part III (Statutes of the Board of Trustees Dealing with the Structure and Functions of the Internal Operating Organization of the University) and Part IV (Statutes of the Board of Trustees Dealing with Conditions of Faculty and Staff Service). On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by George T. Wilkins, the Board adopted amendments to read as follows:

Part III, Article I, Section 3

D. In case of difficulty or complaint, to use the channels provided for the settlement of grievances. In general, personnel problems should be solved within the organization at the level at which they arise, and in no case should individuals outside the University internal organization be asked to pass on such difficulties until established University channels have been exhausted. Academic staff members may appeal progressively to their department heads, deans or directors, their operational vice-president, and the President; the Civil Service employees to their supervisors, Director of the Personnel Office, their operational vice-president, and the President; student helpers to their supervisors, the student deans, and the President.

Article III, Section 2

A. Personnel.

The President's Office shall include the Chief Officer of Instruction, with the title Vice-President for Instruction; the Chief Executive Assistant, with the title Vice-President for Business Affairs; the Legal Counsel and Assistant to the President; the Chief Executive Assistant for the Southwestern Illinois Campus, with the title Vice-President for Southwestern Illinois Campus; the Chief Executive Assistant for the Carbondale campuses, with the title Vice-President for the Carbondale campuses; and such executive and clerical assistants as may be required and authorized.

B. Appointment.

The Chief Officer of Instruction, the Chief Executive Assistant, the Legal Counsel and Assistant to the President, the Chief Executive Assistant for the Southwestern Illinois Campus, and the Chief Executive Assistant for the Carbondale campuses shall be appointed by the Board upon recommendation of the President after consultation with the appropriate deans and other major administrative officers, and shall serve at the pleasure of the President and the Board.

C. The Chief Officer of Instruction.

1. The Chief Officer of Instruction shall exercise, under the President, the responsibility of critical scrutiny and review of the educational program of the University and such other duties as may be assigned to him from time to time by the President.

2. (Deleted).

3. (Deleted).

D. The Chief Executive Assistant.

The Chief Executive Assistant shall exercise, under the President, the responsibility of critical scrutiny and review of the business operation and physical development of the University and such other duties as may be assigned to him from time to time by the President.

F. The Chief Executive Assistant for the Southwestern Illinois Campus.

The Chief Executive Assistant for the Southwestern Illinois Campus shall exercise, under the President, general executive and operational responsibility for the Southwestern Illinois campuses in Madison and St. Clair Counties and such other duties as may be assigned to him from time to time by the President.

G. The Chief Executive Assistant for the Carbondale Campuses.

The Chief Executive Assistant for the Carbondale Campuses shall exercise, under the President, general executive and operational responsibility for the Carbondale campuses and such other duties as may be assigned to him from time to time by the President.

Article III, Section 3

D. (Deleted).

Article III, Section 4, C, 1, a,

(2) The Chief Officer of Instruction, the Chief Executive Assistants, one officer of the Student Affairs Office, the Director of Area Services, the Registrar and Director of Admissions, and the Director of the Health Service.

Article III, Section 4, D, 1, a,

(1) The President, the Chief Officer of Instruction, the Chief Executive Assistants, the Business Manager, the Director of the Physical Plant, the University Architect, the Director of Student Affairs, the Director of Area Services, and the Legal Counsel.

Article III, Section 4, E, 1

a. Personnel

The University Budgetary Council shall be composed of the President or his delegated representative as chairman, the Chief Officer of Instruction, the Chief Executive Assistants, the Business Manager, and two qualified members of the teaching faculty to represent the University at large, selected for terms of three years by the President from a list of seven persons nominated by the University Faculty.

Article III, Section 4, F, 1

a. The Council on Intercollegiate Athletics shall be composed of the President or his delegated representative, the Chief Executive Assistants, the Dean of the College of Education or his delegated representative, the Head of Intercollegiate Athletics, five faculty members appointed by the President for terms of five years, one retiring annually, two members who shall be members of the Alumni Association, and two students of the University appointed for one-year terms by the President upon nomination by the Student Council. The membership of the Council shall be reported each year to the Board of Trustees.

Article IV, Section 5

B. Membership.

The University Faculty shall consist of the President, the Chief Officer of Instruction, the Chief Executive Assistants, the Business Manager, the Registrar, the Director of Libraries, the academic Deans and Directors, the Director of the University Health Service, the Director of Student Affairs, the Dean of Men, the Dean of Women, the Director of Area Services; and all Professors, Associate Professors, Assistant Professors, and Instructors.

Article IV, Section 5, C, 2, b

(3) As a representative of the President, he shall be responsible for maintaining a schedule of all campus events and be the agent through whom the scheduling of University facilities must clear.

Article IV, Section 6, C

2. Each college or school Faculty shall have original jurisdiction in all educational and academic disciplinary matters within the scope of the purposes of the college or school, including the determination of its curricula and of admission thereto and graduation therefrom, except as authority is otherwise assigned by the Statutes and Regulations of the Board of Trustees or as its autonomy is limited by maintenance of general university educational policy, and correct academic and administrative relations with other units of the University. Questions of autonomy and jurisdiction as between such a Faculty and the University Faculty or between two such Faculties shall be adjudicated by the President or his delegated representative. The college or school Faculty through the President of the University shall recommend candidates for degrees in course to the Board of Trustees.

Article IV, Section 7

C. Powers and Duties.

The departmental faculty shall have jurisdiction in all disciplinary matters of academic character within the scope of the department except as authority is otherwise assigned by the Statutes of the Board. Questions of autonomy in jurisdiction, as between two departments in the same major academic unit, shall be adjudicated by the Dean or Director concerned, subject to appeal to the President or his delegated representative. If two major academic units are involved, the question of jurisdiction shall be adjudicated by the President of the University or his delegated representatives.

Article IV, Section 8, B, 3

a. The Dean of the Graduate School shall be assisted by a Graduate Council consisting of the Dean of the Graduate School as chairman, the President or his delegated representative, the deans and directors (or their delegated representatives) of colleges and schools providing courses for the graduate programs, and six representatives of the Faculty to be appointed by the President from a list of at least two nominations for each vacancy presented by the Dean of the Graduate School. These faculty representatives shall serve three-year terms, two retiring each year.

Article IV, Section 11, B, 1

b. The Dean of the Division shall be responsible to the President or his delegated representative for the administration of his unit and for the enforcement of such Statutes and Regulations of the Board of Trustees and such Rules of the University Faculty as relate to the work of the Division.

d. He shall nominate to the President or his delegated representative all personnel for the Division of Technical and Adult Education, except the heads of departments and those college faculty members who offer courses in the fields of instruction covered by the departments of the colleges or schools. Such heads of departments and faculty members shall be nominated jointly by the chairman of the department and the two deans concerned.

Article IV, Section 12, B

2. The Dean of the Division shall be responsible to the President or his delegated representative for the administration of his unit and for the enforcement of such Statutes and Regulations of the Board of Trustees and such Rules of the University Faculty as relate to the work of the Division.

4. He shall nominate to the President or his delegated representative all personnel for the Division of University Extension except the faculty members who teach college or graduate credit courses.

Article IV

Section 13. Educational Service Council.

The President or his delegated representative shall be assisted by an advisory body known as the Educational Service Council, consisting of six faculty members (named by vote of the deans and directors of the major educational divisions), the President or his delegated representative, the Director of Area Services, and the deans and directors or their delegated representatives. This council shall assist the President or his delegated representative and the deans and directors in the development of educational services for Southern Illinois. It shall advise the Division of Extension, and the Adult Education section of the Division of Technical and Adult Education with regard to the preparation of their budgets and programs, shall advise the Director of Area Services how the educational divisions of the University may contribute to the Area Services program, and shall advise the Faculty Council how curricular planning can best be adjusted to area needs.

Article IV, Section 14, A

1. The Office of the Registrar and Director of Admissions shall be administered by a Registrar and Director of Admissions appointed by the Board upon the recommendation of the President after consultation with the major academic officers and the chief student personnel officers.

2. The Registrar and Director of Admissions, as an agent of the University Faculty and of the President, shall be responsible immediately to the President or his delegated representative for the following activities:

a. Conducting official correspondence with prospective students in such cooperation with other members of the University staff or committees thereof as may be prescribed by the President or his delegated representative.

d. Admission of students to the University in accordance with the legislation of the Board and with such Rules of the University Faculty and of the several colleges, schools, and departments of the University as are consistent therewith. In case of doubt on the part of the Registrar and Director of Admissions as to whether or not a given student is eligible for admission, he shall refer the matter to the administrative head of the college or school in which the student desires to be registered. A student may appeal to the appropriate dean or director from a decision by the Registrar and Director of Admissions. The President or his delegated representative shall have the final jurisdiction in regard to these matters.

n. Subject to the direction of the President or his delegated representative, compiling and editing the general catalog of the University, and checking the University catalog and other official announcements of the University to insure that no course is included in the text for which the approval of the appropriate University authority has not been given and that no rule or regulation is included which has not been authorized by Board legislation or by the Rules of the University Faculty. The Registrar or his delegated representative shall also have general supervision over all bulletins, leaflets, and brochures issued by the various agencies and departments of the University to inform prospective students and others concerning any aspects of its educational program.

Article IV, Section 14, B

1. The Library shall be organized as one administrative unit including all branch and departmental libraries, the Audio-Visual Aids Service, and the Book Rental System; and shall be headed by a Director of Libraries appointed by the Board upon recommendation of the President. The Director of Libraries shall report administratively to the President or his delegated representative.

3. The Director of Libraries shall be immediately responsible for the administration of the University Libraries. He shall recommend to the President or his delegated representative the appointment, promotion, or dismissal of library personnel of professional or clerical status. He shall make recommendations to the President or his delegated representative concerning the establishment and abolition of branch and departmental libraries, but no branch or departmental library shall be abolished without giving the members of the departments concerned a full opportunity to be heard by the President or his delegated representative.

4. The Audio-Visual Aids Service shall be an instrument of the University Libraries to encourage the use by the educational units of the University, and by the public schools and other public agencies in the area served by the University, of audio-visual educational materials. It shall operate a film rental service and shall supervise the production of any educational films or other audio-visual educational materials made by the University. It shall have its own director and staff, appointed by the Board upon recommendation of the President upon nomination by the Director of Libraries.

Article IV, Section 14, C

1. The University Museum shall be organized as an administrative unit, and shall be headed by a Director of the Museum appointed by the Board upon

recommendation of the President. The Director shall be immediately responsible for the administration of the University Museum and shall report administratively to the President or his delegated representative.

Article IV, Section 14, D

1. The Southern Illinois University Press shall be organized as an administrative unit and shall be headed by a Director appointed by the Board upon recommendation of the President. The Director shall be immediately responsible for the administration of the Southern Illinois University Press and shall report administratively to the President or his delegated representative, except that in all matters concerning copyrights and contracts he shall obtain the advice of the Legal Counsel.

2. The Southern Illinois University Press shall edit, design, and see through publication all scholarly books and monographs accepted by it for publication. In determining what scholarly items are to be published, it shall seek advice not only from professional readers but also from *ad hoc* groups of University faculty members nominated by the Director to the President or his delegated representative for the purpose of considering specific items. Only items recommended through this procedure shall be published, but the Director shall not be bound by such recommendations and shall attach his own opinion of the value of a proposed item to the University's program of scholarly publication.

Article IV, Section 14, E

1. The University Statistical Service shall be organized as an administrative unit, and shall be headed by a Director appointed by the Board upon recommendation of the President. The Director shall be immediately responsible for the administration of the University Statistical Service and shall report administratively to the President or his delegated representative.

Article IV, Section 14

F. The President or his delegated representative shall be assisted by an advisory body known as the University Instructional Aids Council, consisting of six faculty members (named by vote of the deans and directors of the major educational units for terms of two years); and the director of each agency auxiliary to instruction serving *ex officio* without vote. This Council shall assist the President or his delegated representative and the directors in the formulation of policies for the University Libraries, the University Museum, the Audio-Visual Aids Service, and the University Statistical Service. It shall advise these agencies with regard to the preparation of their budgets and the allocation of funds for the purchase of books and other instructional aids for the use of the academic units and the various institutions and groups served by the University.

Article IV, Section 15

(Delete).

Article V, Section 3

B. Appointment.

The Business Manager shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees upon recommendation by the President, shall be responsible to the President or his

delegated representative, and shall hold his position as Business Manager at the pleasure of the President and the Board.

C. Duties of the Business Manager.

The Business Manager shall nominate to the President or his delegated representative the necessary business staff members who shall be responsible to the Business Manager.

Article V, Section 4

A. The Physical Plant Office shall be headed by a Director, who shall be responsible to the President or his delegated representative and shall hold his position as Director at the pleasure of the President and the Board.

C. The Director shall, when directed by the President or his delegated representative, serve in the role of a contractor in the repair and rehabilitation of existing structures or the construction of new ones, or in the extension of grounds or other facilities, following approved plans and specifications as developed by the University Architect.

Article V, Section 5

A. The University Architect shall be responsible to the President or his delegated representative, and shall hold his position as University Architect at the pleasure of the President and the Board.

B. The University Architect shall be responsible for recommending plans for all phases of the growth and development of the physical plant of the University, including short term matters such as repair, rehabilitation, and alterations of buildings as well as overall campus and structural design of such nature and scope as may be determined necessary and desirable by the President and the Board. After consultation with the persons concerned, he shall be responsible for initiation, execution, or review of architectural plans, working drawings, and specifications for site and plant development of the University, including such minor rehabilitation and repair projects as may be assigned to him by the President or his delegated representative. He shall assist the President and the Board in the selection of Associate Architects-Engineers and in the receiving of bids and awarding of contracts. It is his responsibility to supervise the construction of each capital improvement project at the University in order to see that approved plans and specifications are faithfully followed, and, in the cases of work done under contract, that the terms of the contract for construction are at all times fulfilled. It is his responsibility to report in writing to the President or his delegated representative violations of plans and specifications and/or contractual relations.

Article V, Section 5

D. The University Architect shall have no authority to commit directly or indirectly the University to payments in excess of appropriations or to any amount above contract agreement except within limits approved by the President or his delegated representative within policies set by the President and the Board.

Article V, Section 6

A. The Personnel Office shall be headed by a Director, who shall be responsible to the President or his delegated representative, and shall hold his position as Director at the pleasure of the President and the Board.

Article V, Section 6, B

2. To recommend to the President or his delegated representative for transmission to the Board of Trustees rules for the government of the civil service employees of the University.

5. To advise the President or his delegated representative and the supervisors of civil service employees regarding the conditions of employment of civil service employees.

Article V, Section 7

A. The Director.

The Office of Auxiliary and Service Enterprises shall be headed by a Director who shall be responsible to the President or his delegated representative, and shall hold his position at the pleasure of the President and the Board.

Article V, Section 8

A. The Security Officer shall be responsible to the President or his delegated representative. In discharging his duties, he shall, in matters involving legal questions, be directed by the Legal Counsel.

Article VI, Section 2, B

2. The Director shall be responsible for recommending to the President or his delegated representative the budget for the maintenance of his office and for the maintenance of the several offices of the division.

3. The Director shall nominate to the President or his delegated representative for recommendation to the Board of Trustees for appointment the head of each of the offices in the division. Other personnel of the offices shall be appointed by the Board after nomination and recommendation through normal channels.

Article VII, Section 1, B, 2

b. The Director of Student Affairs, after consultation with the student deans, shall recommend to the President or his delegated representative the budget and the necessary personnel for the maintenance of the Student Affairs office and of its several units, including (subject to Part III, Article V, Section 7, B) University residence halls and student centers.

Article VII, Section 1, C

1. Supervise and assist in the development of the social and extra-curricular programs of all organized and unorganized student groups, excluding academically sponsored professional organizations as designated by the President or his delegated representative.

Part IV, Article I, Section 1

D. Before making recommendations to the Board for appointment to positions of the rank of instructor, assistant professor, associate professor, and professor, the President of the University shall have assurance that every reasonable effort has been made to obtain the best available person to fill the appointment and that the following channels of consultation and recommendation have been followed: The chairman or department head under whose jurisdiction the appointment falls, shall confer with members of his department and with the Dean of the Graduate School in cases involving the employment of Graduate Faculty personnel, and shall then make his recommendation to the appropriate Dean, who shall in turn make his recommendation to the President or his delegated representative. If for any reason the President does not wish to approve this recommendation, he shall so inform the Dean or Director and request reconsideration and further recommendations.

E. Wherever budgeted, appointments to temporary positions not exceeding nine months duration, or appointments to non-tenure ranks such as Assistant Instructors, Research Assistants, Lecturers, Coaches, etc., shall be made upon recommendation of the appropriate dean or director to the President or his delegated representative, but must be reported to and confirmed by the President and the Board of Trustees.

Article II, Section 2, D

3. Notice of resignation from employment by a faculty member on either probationary or continuing status shall ordinarily be submitted in writing at least three months prior to the expiration of the contract year. Except by mutual consent, a resignation involving a termination of service prior to the expiration of the contract year shall be regarded as breach of contract by the staff member concerned, and the fact shall be entered upon his personnel record in the office of the President or his delegated representative for such future use as facts justify.

Article V

Section 6. Assignments. Assignment of a faculty member to services within an instructional or research unit shall be appropriate to his training and experience and shall be made by the immediate administrative head of that unit with the approval of the appropriate dean or director. When it is proposed that a faculty member be assigned service responsibilities outside his department, division, or research unit, the President or his delegated representative shall have authority to determine the total load and its distribution in consultation with the appropriate administrative officers.

Article VI

Section 4. Sabbatical Leaves. In recognition of meritorious service, members of the academic faculty may, upon recommendation of the President and approval by the Board of Trustees, be granted not to exceed the equivalent of a year's leave of absence on half pay for the purpose of attending some institution of higher learning or of otherwise adding to their professional equipment

or usefulness in a manner approved by the President or his delegated representative, provided that they shall already have served continuously on the faculty for five preceding academic years. Such leave need not be taken in one continuous period. Ordinarily a person shall receive such a leave not oftener than once in seven years. The person granted such leave, however, shall agree to serve at least two more years on the faculty of Southern Illinois University, and shall give a note with proper security for the amount granted, said note to be cancelled at the end of the two years of service required or at the death of its maker or upon his becoming permanently incapacitated or disabled.

Mr. Wham requested that the members of the Board be kept informed, perhaps by means of a schedule outlining the President's delegation of powers and duties under the amendments adopted. President Morris indicated that such a schedule would be presented at the next regular meeting. He further indicated that a full-scale suggestion for revisions of the Statutes would be presented, following study and recommendations by the Procedures Committee.

Mr. Wham also requested an organizational chart or graph of the University administrative offices, and a similar chart showing administrative offices in the various schools and colleges. President Morris indicated that each member of the Board would be furnished such informational materials.

Matters presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

APPROVAL OF DOCTORAL PROGRAM IN GUIDANCE

The Department of Guidance in the College of Education some time ago stated its readiness to offer a program leading to the Doctor of Philosophy degree. Its application was reviewed by the Graduate Council and recommended to Dean Swartz, who states that he endorses the request of the Department. In order to obtain an objective evaluation of the department, Professor Walter F. John of the Department of Administrative and Educational Services at Michigan State University was asked to serve as consultant, in accordance with our usual review procedure for doctoral programs. He made a number of suggestions for improvement, which have now been acted upon. It is therefore recommended that the Department of Guidance be authorized to accept students for the doctoral degree, effective at the beginning of the 1960 summer session.

The graduate staff of the Guidance Department consists of Professor Wellington A. Thalman, holding a doctor's degree from Cornell University; Professor William Neal Phelps, holding a doctor's degree from the Colorado State College of Education; Associate Professor Eugene D. Fitzpatrick, holding a doctor's degree from Colorado State College of Education; Associate Professor Clinton R. Meek, holding a doctor's degree from George Peabody College for Teachers;

Associate Professor Ivan Lee Russell, holding a doctor's degree from the University of Michigan; Associate Professor Dennis L. Trueblood, holding a doctor's degree from Indiana University; Assistant Professor Kenneth D. Orton, holding a doctor's degree from the State University of Iowa.

The department has also enjoyed the services of a distinguished visiting professor, Charles E. Skinner of New York University, who is the author of some twenty-five standard textbooks in Educational Psychology, Mental Hygiene, and related subjects, and who served as chairman of over sixty doctoral committees at New York University.

The department has strong library holdings in the fields of curriculum, research methods, educational psychology, and educational philosophy and is rapidly building up its back files of educational and psychological periodicals. Adequate laboratory facilities for the department are provided through the Clinical Center, the University School, and the public and parochial schools of the area. Doctoral candidates will have the opportunity to gain sufficient experience to learn the various techniques needed for complete studies of clients. They will also have the opportunity to help the public schools of the area establish and organize guidance programs.

On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board authorized the Department of Guidance to accept students for the doctoral degree, effective at the beginning of the 1960 summer session. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

PROPOSAL FOR READING CENTER

Upon recommendation of the dean of the College of Education, we recommend the establishment of a Reading Center in the College of Education, effective July 1, 1960.

The chief function of the Reading Center will be to furnish consultant services to area schools and to serve as a clearing house for considering possible solutions to reading problems. It will also provide diagnostic evaluation and remedial treatment for students with reading disabilities through the Clinical Center.

A second function of the Reading Center will be to participate in the training of reading specialists and to assist the departments of Elementary Education and Secondary Education in developing curricula for that purpose. The training students will receive should enable them to assume a variety of responsibilities: working directly with students who have reading problems or who are not reading so well as they might, organizing and supervising all-school reading programs, serving as consultants to teachers and providing them with in-service training opportunities.

On motion of George T. Wilkins, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board approved the establishment of a Reading Center, effective July 1, 1960.

COMPULSORY MEDICAL EXAMINATION

The University shall designate the tests to be made and shall establish the rate for such service.

Arrangements have been made with a local clinic for such an annual medical check-up. In the event the individual desires to have the examination performed by some other qualified group, this will be arranged on an individual basis, provided the University not pay any more than it would under its agreement with the local clinic.

PROGRESS REPORT ON THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE SAFETY CENTER FOR SOUTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY

The development of a safety center at Southern Illinois University has been based upon the great need for coordinated safety effort. National organizations and conferences must continue to provide leadership, stimulation, and

information. Similarly, the institutions now providing education and training must continue to offer specialized technical training needed by the key people in various fields of applied safety education. Even the combined efforts of all the national agencies and educational institutions cannot fill the needs of the multitudes of agencies and people on the local level who require guidance and training. At this level there is great need for expansion of safety education and training, research, counseling, and information services. Here is the point of execution of programs and plans.

Such institutions as New York University, Michigan State University, Penn State University, and Iowa State University have recognized the need for immediate and definite action and have established safety centers. Interest is mounting in Wisconsin, Ohio, Maryland, Texas, Indiana, and other states at the present time. This was revealed at the National Safety Congress, October, 1959, in Chicago, when representatives from a number of state universities met to discuss this matter.

The State of Illinois is facing its need for improvement of the safety upon our highways, in our homes, at work and at play. (More than 2,000 persons are killed and more than 50,000 persons are seriously injured on Illinois highways annually.) In this state alone the economic loss due to traffic accidents is in excess of a quarter billion dollars annually, and each year the number of vehicles increases by eight per cent, the number of drivers increases by five per cent, and the miles traveled increase by seven per cent.

A Safety Center may be defined as an organized program of attack, by a University, to curb the death and injury rate that occurs each year in a state or locality, giving equal emphasis to the Three E's of safety education — Engineering, Education, and Enforcement. The development of the center at Southern Illinois University has been intended to offer a plan for action which would enable an approach to solutions for the problems of traffic safety, public safety, and other accident prevention needs. Moreover, it is evident that institutions of higher learning will have to have an organization such as a Safety Center in order to attract funds for research and for the administration of research programs. This fact has been clearly demonstrated in the past and there is every reason to assume that it will continue as a basic criterion in the allocation of such grants in the future.

For some five years Southern Illinois University gave serious study to existing Safety Centers in an attempt to formulate plans for such a center at Southern Illinois University. Late in February of 1958, Mr. Frank Bridges and Mr. James Aaron were asked to study the Highway Traffic Safety Center at Michigan State University. Upon their return, Mr. Bridges and Mr. Aaron prepared a prospectus for a Safety Center for Southern Illinois University. This prospectus has been widely distributed in the State of Illinois.

Subsequent trips have been taken to solicit cooperation for such a Center. In March of 1958, the State Department of Public Safety was visited to discuss the Center idea. On December 18, 1958, Mr. Aaron and Mr. Bridges discussed the Illinois Driver Education Programs and the Center concept with Superintendent-elect George Wilkins. The following February, the Southern Illinois University plan was presented to Secretary of State Charles Carpentier. In

March, Mr. Aaron and Mr. Bridges met with Governor Stratton to discuss research needs in traffic safety and presented a research proposal that was to be a part of the Safety Center responsibility. In each instance we were encouraged to pursue the organization of a Safety Center at Southern Illinois University. Accordingly, space was assigned to the Center by the University.

There were several reasons why the establishment of a Safety Center at Southern Illinois University was deemed desirable:

1. The State of Illinois has recently put into effect a farsighted legislative program for the prevention and control of traffic injuries and deaths.
2. Motor vehicles are standard equipment of Illinois' citizens and industries. Everyone in the State is constantly exposed to the hazards of the highway. Moreover, everyone in the State ultimately pays a share of the toll for our accidents and congestion. No contribution to the welfare of Illinois could be of more benefit than one which studies methods of cutting this cost in lives and money.
3. There is a strong demand for such services. The President's Highway Safety Conference called upon the colleges for specific assistance. State-wide conferences have done the same. Urgency is implied by the ugly facts. Destruction still outruns education, enforcement, and engineering.
4. The installation of the new electronic processing system in the Illinois Division of Driver Licensing in Springfield, the only one of its kind in the nation, will provide research opportunities into the cause and conditions of highway and traffic accidents never before available or interpretable. With the establishment of a Safety Center at Southern Illinois University, it is reasonable to assume that one of the Center's responsibilities to the State of Illinois will be the tabulation and analysis of the research data taken from the new electronic processing system. Accurate, factual, statistical information will be available and can be easily assembled from the IBM cards filed for our 4,750,000 licensed drivers.
5. Southern Illinois University has provided much of the leadership for the development of state programs of driver education and safety education. The present staff at Southern Illinois University offered the first safety education minor in the State. This minor will by law be mandatory for all driver education teachers in 1961.
6. The approach by the Center is inter-disciplinary in nature. Many of the University's departments are already cooperating in the offering of safety education. Conferences and in-service programs already number hundreds each year, and very little difficulty is encountered in the expansion of credit courses. Research, field and information services which are being established will not be radically new for the University.

There is a need for the establishment of such an operation in order to concentrate efforts on the curtailment of deaths, injuries, and property damage in industry, at school, on the farm, in the home, in recreation, and to fulfill public safety accident prevention needs in general.

The services which the Safety Center hopes to render to the State of Illinois are:

Undergraduate and Graduate Courses

The provision for undergraduate and graduate courses for those majoring or minoring in safety education, health education, industrial education, physical education, psychology, sociology, urban and city planning, government, pre-engineering, agriculture, economics, and others.

Field Services

Field services from a Safety Center can provide for administrative surveys, consultations, a speakers bureau, assistance to public schools in improving the organization and administration of their safety programs, field studies of traffic problems, demonstrations, and others.

Short Courses and Conferences

Short courses and conferences can be made available for driver education instructors, for school administrators and teachers, commercial vehicle and school bus drivers, mayors, city managers, county supervisors, enforcement personnel, traffic and safety organizations, judges and prosecutors, driver license examiners and driver improvement staffs, motor fleet owners and supervisors, highway and traffic engineers, newspaper, radio, and TV personnel, and Civil Defense directors and workers.

Research and Writing

The opportunities and the need for research and writing are great. Research grants are available from many industries to universities organized and staffed for such research. Such a research service will administer research projects, develop safety education program guides and manuals, develop administrative standards and procedures, develop traffic administration program guides, coordinate research and writing committees, conduct socio-psychological studies of public attitudes and their improvement, and evaluate materials, safety equipment, and methods.

Information and Materials

The Center can develop a library concerned with safety education and traffic safety administration, provide information concerning all aspects of community living, prepare pamphlets, public information, and educational materials for use by local officials and public information services, prepare training materials and visual materials, and conduct public information programs through the press, radio, and TV.

President Morris requested that the members of the Board endorse the present program and approve appropriate efforts with state officials for the expansion of the safety program to meet present needs. By common consent, the Board indicated interest in and approval of an expanded safety program. Mr. Wilkins commended the University administration for foresight in providing leadership through the development of a Safety Center at Southern Illinois University.

BOND ISSUE RESOLUTION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the following resolution, which is similar to the resolution approved by the Board at its Octo-

ber 31, 1958, meeting regarding the Bond Issue submitted to the electorate on November 4, 1958:

WHEREAS, the enrollment of students in institutions of higher education continues to increase; and

WHEREAS, all professional estimates made with regard to enrollments in the future indicate that even a greater number of students will seek admittance into institutions of higher education; and

WHEREAS, the state-supported institutions of higher education have a responsibility to provide educational opportunity for capable, qualified, and deserving young people; and

WHEREAS, Southern Illinois University has already been severely handicapped by the lack and inadequacy of physical facilities; and

WHEREAS, this lack of inadequacy will be felt even more acutely in the future; and

WHEREAS, the people of the State of Illinois will, in the General Election to be held in November, 1960, be asked to vote on a proposed Bond Issue to erect adequate educational facilities at the various state universities; and

WHEREAS, such facilities are urgently and critically needed.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT *Resolved* by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in regular meeting assembled that this Board does endorse the proposed Bond Issue authorized by the General Assembly of the State of Illinois, which will be submitted for referendum at the General Election on November 8, 1960, and does urge the voters of the State of Illinois to support its passage.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board unanimously adopted the above resolution.

REPORT ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

The program of planning for the Edwardsville Campus was discussed by President Morris. He indicated that the steps necessary would be: (1) an aerial survey, including topographic maps; (b) an analysis of the area by some person proficient in the field of city planning, with the hope of obtaining desirable zoning; (c) employment of an engineering firm for analysis of the area from the standpoint of soil structure and utilities connections; (d) employment of an architectural firm for the preparation of a master plan of the area.

The consensus of the Board was that there was no necessity for them to participate in a conference concerning the selection of professional persons, and that the administration was authorized to proceed with such selections and make recommendations at a subsequent meeting of the Board.

President Morris reported that he had been appointed a member of the Wabash Valley Commission and asked if the Board would have any objec-

tions to his serving as an officer. The members of the Board indicated that they had no objections.

President Morris reported to the Board concerning a series of negotiations for the possible purchase of the Beulah Residence in East St. Louis. The members of the Board indicated agreement with proceeding to negotiate for such purchase and so authorized the administration.

The meeting adjourned at 4 P.M.

THE MARCH MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Friday, March 4, 1960, beginning at 1 P.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Mrs. Stella Collins, Kenneth L. Davis, Melvin C. Lockard, George T. Wilkins. Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, and Mr. Sturgis were absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President J. E. Grinnell, Vice-President Harold W. See, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Mrs. Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held January 22, 1960, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by George T. Wilkins, the Board approved these minutes as presented.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

RECOMMENDATION FOR HONORARY DEGREES

We recommend that at the June, 1960, commencement, or some commencement thereafter, the honorary Doctor of Science degree be awarded to Dr. Wernher Von Braun, German engineer and expert in the development of rockets and guided missiles.

Wernher Von Braun was born at Wirsitz, Eastern Germany, March 23, 1912. He received the Bachelor of Science degree from the Inst. Tech., Berlin, in 1932 and the Doctor of Philosophy degree from the University of Berlin in 1934. From 1930 to 1945, he served as assistant to Professor Oberth in Madiasch, Roumania, experimenting with small liquid fuel rocket motors and as technical director and research professor at the German Rocket Research Center, Peenemuende, Baltic Sea; and he was responsible for the development of the V-2 Long Range Rocket and A. A. Guided Missile Wasserfall. Dr. Von Braun came to the United States in 1945, and in 1955 he became a naturalized citizen. He served as technical advisor at White Sands Proving Grounds and as project director at Fort Bliss, Texas, working with the United States Department of Defense, Ordnance Department; as Chief of the Guided Missile Development Division, Redstone Arsenal, Alabama; and as Director of the Development Operations Division, Army Ballistic Missile Agency. He was the recipient of Distinguished Civilian Service Award, Department of Defense, in 1957, and he is the author or co-author of six books concerning space exploration.

We also recommend that the honorary Doctor of Fine Arts degree be awarded to Helen Hayes (Mrs. Charles MacArthur), actress.

Helen Hayes was born in Washington, D. C., October 10, 1900. She was graduated from Sacred Heart Academy, Washington, in 1917, and has been the recipient of honorary degrees from Hamilton College, 1939; Smith College, 1940; Elmira College; Columbia University, 1949; University of Denver, 1952; Princeton University; and St. Mary's College. She first appeared on the stage at the age of six; was a member of Columbia Players, Washington, D. C., for four seasons; and later toured with Lew Fields and John Drew. She has appeared on the American and European stage in more than twenty plays and has made motion pictures both here and abroad. In 1932 she was awarded the gold statuette by the Motion Picture Academy of Arts and Sciences, and the television Emmy Award in 1954. She is at present honorary president of the American Theatre Wing; President of the American National Theatre and Academy; and chairman of the Women's Activities National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Her home is in Nyack, New York.

These recommendations have been initiated by our Faculty Committee on Honorary Degrees and have the endorsement of the administration.

On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, seconded by George T. Wilkins, the Board approved unanimously the recommendation made concerning the award of honorary degrees.

INTERIM UNIVERSITY ORGANIZATION

At the January 22, 1960, meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Statutes of the Board of Trustees were amended to permit temporary redelegation of administrative responsibilities. Under the new organization being worked out, new definitions are needed for channels of communication, for lines of responsibility for working procedures, and for methods of cooperation and coordination so that the University's resources can most effectively be used to support

the University's total program. To settle all these questions will require intensive consideration and discussion in the weeks ahead.

Meanwhile, the members of the Board of Trustees have received in the mail a copy of a bulletin to the staff, under date of February 8, 1960, which constitutes a first statement concerning temporary delegation, allocation of budgetary responsibilities, etc. In order to keep the situation both fluid and workable, further announcements may be made from time to time. It is hoped to free the time of the President's Office for careful examination of the organization and for the preparation of definitive amendments to the Statutes. Meanwhile, for the records of the Board, we report the following interim operating organization on the major points covered by the amendments to the Statutes approved at the January 22, 1960, meeting of the Board of Trustees.

Part III, Article IV, Section 11, B, 1, b

The Division of Technical and Adult Education shall be responsible to the Vice-President for the Carbondale Campuses or his representative, but shall be responsible for both campuses.

Part III, Article IV, Section 12, B, 2

The Division of Extension shall be responsible to the Vice-President for the Carbondale Campuses, but shall be responsible for the total extension program of the University.

Part III, Article IV, Section 14, A

The Office of the Registrar and Director of Admissions of the Carbondale Campus shall be responsible to the Vice-President for the Carbondale Campuses or his representative.

Part III, Article IV, Section 14, B, 3

The General Library shall be responsible to the Vice-President for the Carbondale Campuses or his representative, but shall have responsibility for both campuses, with these responsibilities to be defined in subsequent deliberations.

Part III, Article IV, Section 14, C, 1

The University Museum shall be responsible to the Vice-President for the Carbondale Campuses or his representative, but shall have responsibility for both campuses.

Part III, Article IV, Section 14, D, 1

The University Press shall be responsible to the Vice-President for the Carbondale Campuses but shall serve both campuses.

Part III, Article IV, Section 14, E, 1

The Statistical Service shall be responsible to the Vice-President for the Carbondale Campuses or his representative.

Part III, Article V, Section 3, B

The Carbondale Business Manager, and offices operating under his supervision,

shall be responsible to the Vice-President for the Carbondale Campuses or his representative.

Part III, Article V, Section 4, A

The Director of the Physical Plant and the various departments and agencies operating under his supervision shall be responsible to the Vice-President for the Carbondale Campuses or his representative.

Part III, Article V, Section 5, A

The University Architect shall be immediately responsible to the Vice-President for the Carbondale Campuses or his representative, but shall have a responsibility to both campuses.

Part III, Article V, Section 6, A

The Carbondale Personnel Office shall be responsible to the Vice-President for the Carbondale Campuses or his representative, but his services shall be available when requested to the Southwestern Illinois Campus.

Part III, Article V, Section 7

Auxiliary Enterprises which operate on the Carbondale Campus shall be responsible to the Vice-President for the Carbondale Campuses or his delegated representative.

Part III, Article VI, Section 2, B

During a period of further study the Area Services Division shall be responsible to the President.

Part III, Article VII, Section 1, B, 2

The Carbondale Director of Student Affairs, his office, and those agencies under his supervision shall be responsible to the Vice-President for the Carbondale Campuses.

This report, which required no action, was accepted by the Board for the record.

PROPOSED EDUCATIONAL ORGANIZATION OF THE SOUTHWESTERN ILLINOIS CAMPUS

According to the By-Laws and Statutes of the Board of Trustees, the establishment, allocation, and abolition of colleges, schools, departments, bureaus, and other educational units and curricula and degrees is a function of the Board of Trustees (Part III, Article IV, Section 3). Hitherto, the Board's approval of the academic program of the Southwestern Illinois Campus has been general, and no schools, colleges, departments, or other units have been established there. There have been two directors, one at Alton and one at East St. Louis, in charge of the respective instructional programs for the Southwestern Illinois campuses, under the direction of the Dean of Instruction. No curricula have been developed on the Southwestern Illinois campuses, which have hitherto simply offered the courses and followed certain of the curricula already approved at Carbondale.

It now appears that a first step should be taken toward reorganizing the educational program of the University in Southwestern Illinois and toward encouraging the development of curricula appropriate to that area. Until the program can be largely transferred to the new campus near Edwardsville, it would appear to be premature to develop anything other than a provisional organization. As a result of discussions with faculty groups and with the administrators involved, it is now recommended that the directorships of the two campuses at Alton and East St. Louis be abolished at the earliest practicable time, and that six temporary divisions, each with its own temporary head, be established as follows: Humanities, Science, Social Studies, Fine Arts, Education, Business.

The procedure for filling the positions of temporary heads of the divisions shall be that set forth in Part IV, Article I, Section 1, B of the By-Laws and Statutes of the Board of Trustees.

This temporary organization should have the following advantages:

1. It should tend to unite instead of to separate the Alton and East St. Louis campuses, since the divisional arrangement will cover both.
2. It should tend to relieve Vice-President Harold See and Dean William Going of a considerable burden of detailed work, since they will be able to delegate many details to the heads of the new divisions.

3. It should provide a training ground for educational administrators so that when the time comes for a more permanent type of organization, certain members of the staff will have had an opportunity to display their abilities and to acquire administrative experience.

4. It should provide more opportunity for experimental approaches in curricular matters than would a more rigid or conventional organization. Particularly, it should encourage the development of interdisciplinary courses. Because of the rapid growth of the program, such fluidity is extremely desirable at this stage.

5. It should make possible a period of study, consultation, and planning looking toward a definitive organization.

As new courses and course sequences are developed, they will of course be subject to a central critical review (including review by outside consultants named by the President's Office), and any curricula proposed will be recommended to the Board of Trustees, in accordance with practices long in use on the Carbondale campus.

On motion of George T. Wilkins, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved unanimously the recommendations proposed.

INDEPENDENT AUDIT FOR 1959-1960

We recommend approval of the following joint agreement between Mr. Frank Whitney, Auditor General; Southern Illinois University; and C. J. Schlosser and Company, Alton, for the audit of the accounts and financial operations of Southern Illinois University for the year ending June 30, 1960. The letter has been discussed with the Auditor General and he concurs in both the contents and the financial arrangement for the payment of the auditors.

GENTLEMEN:

We are requesting that you undertake the audit of the accounts and financial operations of Southern Illinois University for the year ending June 30, 1960.

The audit is to be conducted as far as practicable in accordance with practices commonly followed in professional audits of commercial enterprises and universities, with standards of disclosure and reporting recognized by professional bodies of Certified Public Accountants. It is the intention that the statements of Southern Illinois University are to be examined and an opinion concerning those statements expressed by you. No limitations on the scope of the examination are imposed, and it is anticipated that no qualification of your opinion will be acceptable other than a qualification concerning the fixed assets balance at July 1, 1955.

The report will include a balance sheet for each fund or fund group, including all funds administered by the agency; a related summary operating state-

ment comparing the original appropriation and the appropriation breakdown with actual operating results; a statement confirming the reconciliation of appropriation balances with the records of the State Auditor; and, if feasible, a summary functional breakdown of operations in sufficient detail to be helpful in judging fiscal performance.

It is anticipated that the preliminary work in connection with this examination will start during the month of May, 1960. You will, of course, include a survey of the internal control and you will submit a copy of this survey with your resultant audit program to the Auditor General and Southern Illinois University on or before June 30, 1960.

It is agreed that Southern Illinois University will have their statements in work paper form on or before August 31, 1960, and that these statements, or copies thereof, will be available for your use. It is contemplated that your opinion, or your denial of opinion with reasons pertaining to these statements, will be received by both Southern Illinois University and the Auditor General by September 30, 1960.

Typing of the report will be undertaken by employees of Southern Illinois University and will be completed by October 15, 1960. Your approval of the typed exhibits and schedules will be given within five working days of the time the typed exhibits and schedules are submitted to you. The right to review final printing proofs with a representative of Southern Illinois University is extended to you.

It is anticipated that footnotes and pertinent explanatory comments and your opinion will be included in this report.

It is further agreed that a separate report of recommendations will be submitted by you to Southern Illinois University and the Auditor General by September 30, 1960.

It is further agreed that both the Business Manager's report and the fiscal management letter will be reviewed in rough draft form by all contracting parties.

The final Business Manager's report will be the printed report of Southern Illinois University and will include your opinion addressed to the Trustees of Southern Illinois University and to the Auditor General of the State of Illinois.

If, during the course of the examination, serious deficiencies in internal control are discovered, or unusual transactions make necessary major modification of the original audit program sufficient to affect the maximum fee, you will contact the Auditor General in Springfield and the President of Southern Illinois University.

It is agreed that the fee billed, including expenses, for this audit will not be in excess of \$8,250.00.

Billings are to be made on State invoice-voucher forms and will show man hours and rates by class of accountant, the actual travel costs and out-of-pocket expenses. Two-thirds of the charges will be billed to Southern Illinois University and one-third to the Department of Audits of the State of Illinois.

If these arrangements are agreeable, will you so indicate by signing each of the attached carbon copies of this letter and returning two to Southern Illinois University and two to the Auditor General in Springfield.

ACQUISITION OF BEULAH HOME

As a result of negotiations with the Illinois Health Foundation, Inc., in regard to the Beulah Home in East St. Louis; a study of potential uses of the Beulah Home in the educational program of the University; a study of anticipated costs and potential income in relation to the operation of the Home; and a tour of the premises by University personnel and three members of the Board of Trustees (Mr. Wham, Chairman of the Board, Mr. Davis, and Mr. Oehmke), the following resolution is recommended for adoption:

1. A statement of intent to purchase be directed to the Illinois Health Foundation, Inc., and its officers.

2. There be evidence of a merchantable title in the Illinois Health Foundation, Inc., and that it be determined that the said Illinois Health Foundation, Inc., has the power and authority to sell the said premises.

3. The administration of the University proceed to obtain the funds for the purchase of the property and equipment by the issuance of revenue bonds, as authorized by Illinois law.

HEADQUARTERS OF THE SOIL CONSERVATION SOCIETY OF AMERICA

The Soil Conservation Society of America has been operating for a number of years from a headquarters office in the city of Des Moines, Iowa. The staff of the National Society would number possibly a dozen people including the Executive Secretary, the Editor of the Society's Journal, several assistants and clerical help. The Society plans to move its headquarters, however, and is now looking for another site. Discussions have been held concerning the possibility of Southern Illinois University's furnishing the site to the Society through sale, lease, or other arrangements.

Three main benefits would accrue from the location of the Society's main office on the Carbondale campus. First, Southern Illinois University would become known all over the country to persons subscribing to the Journal and communicating with the Society. The contacts so established would be useful. Secondly, prominent scientists in the field would visit Society headquarters and might not only become acquainted with the University's program, but also serve as visiting lecturers. Thirdly, the members of the Society staff would probably become active members of the University community and would benefit from their proximity to the University.

Approval is requested for inviting the Soil Conservation Society of America to locate its National office on the Carbondale campus of Southern Illinois University, subject to the working out of mutually satisfactory arrangements for leasing a University site to the Society.

THE MAY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Friday, May 7, 1960, beginning at 1:30 P.M.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President Harold W. See, Dean of Academic Affairs T. W. Abbott, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Professor W. D. Klimstra, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisian*, and Mrs. Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on March 4, 1960, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, seconded by George T. Wilkins, these minutes were approved as presented.

Consideration was given to naming a representative of the Board of Trustees to serve as a member of the Board of Directors of Southern Illinois University Foundation, replacing Mr. Martin F. Oehmke, whose term would expire in June, 1960, and who declined re-election. On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, seconded by George T. Wilkins, the Board elected Lindell W. Sturgis to fill the vacancy.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

REPORT ON COOPERATIVE WILDLIFE RESEARCH

From time to time we have provided the Board of Trustees with special reports on certain activities. One of the most interesting recent developments in the University's program is cooperative research undertaken by University staff members, in cooperation with various agencies, both public and private, and with a sharing of staff, equipment, and other facilities. Such cooperative projects constitute an extension of the abilities of all participating individuals and groups, since the pooling of resources can often result in the solution of problems which an individual staff member, or even a single agency, would be powerless to attack.

At this time we wish to report on a cooperative research enterprise which began in a very modest way some ten years ago and which has met with a great deal of success.

The Cooperative Wildlife Research program was set up in October, 1950, in cooperation with the Illinois Natural History Survey, with the objective of a detailed investigation of the bobwhite quail. In August, 1951, a second project was established, in cooperation with the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service: a study of squirrel populations on the Crab Orchard National Wildlife Refuge. These projects were followed by other cooperative investigations, including reclamation of strip-mined areas for fish and wildlife (1954); intensive bobwhite quail management (1954); wide-row corn fields as wildlife habitat (1955); economics of the Canada goose (1957); the occurrence of rabies in wild populations (1958); and public utilization of strip-mined areas (1959). As a result, the Cooperative Wildlife Research Laboratory has received technical assistance, personnel, monies, equipment, and materials for various investigations from fifteen agencies outside the University during the past ten years.

In addition, many individuals throughout the thirty-four counties of Southern Illinois have contributed in a number of ways to the research program. Included are over 350 sportsmen who provided wings from quail and information about their hunting experiences; 95 sportsmen who provided reproductive tracts from squirrels; 75 farmers who permitted use of their lands to carry on census of wildlife populations, collect specimens, and study wildlife habitat; over 3,000 hunters who provided data on waterfowl harvest and expenditures involved in hunting Canada geese; and operators and managers of businesses in Alexander and Union counties who gave statements regarding income from goose hunters. Several specialists on the staffs of Southern Illinois University and the University of Illinois assisted in many ways.

The physical facilities used by the Laboratory and owned by Southern Illinois University include two houses, six garages, one room in the animal house, and 920 acres of strip-mined land. An additional thirty-five acres of farm land are leased by the Illinois Natural History Survey for our use. The following private lands have also been made available for long-term studies: (1) The Carbondale Quail Research Area, comprised of 1,800 acres lying six miles northeast of Carbondale (1950); (2) 4,000 acres of strip-mined, idle, and agricultural land one mile west of DuQuoin (1954); (3) 2,000 acres of strip-mined land six miles south of Pinckneyville (1953); and (4) 2,000 acres of farm land

lying two miles southeast of Villa Ridge (1956). Virtually unlimited access is permitted to all state and federal holdings in Southern Illinois.

Support provided by the University and by various agencies and individuals cooperating in the various investigations have resulted in reasonably well-equipped facilities. Besides the usual laboratory and office furnishings, major equipment for field work includes two completely equipped small tractors; a station wagon, pick-up truck, and two machinery trailers; a tree planter, a boat, canoe, and boat trailer; five English setters; kennels; and five units for holding quail.

Contributions of cash, equipment, personnel, and commodities from various cooperators are valued at approximately \$167,000, about \$30,000 of which was contributed during the past year. This total does not include time, travel, or personal services of active collaborators and liaison personnel representing the various agencies.

As aids to research, the Laboratory has been developing since 1950 collections of representative mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians, snails, and plant seeds native to Southern Illinois. For the vertebrates, this includes not only complete skins and skeletons, but also microscope slides of hairs, feathers, and scales. The collection includes approximately 1,500 separate entries. For the purpose of research on various species of animals, extensive series of skins and skeletons of individual species have also been accumulated. These include over 1,500 skeletons, 500 skins, 600 reproductive tracts, and 900 digestive tracts.

A research library has been accumulated gradually, and now contains approximately 20,000 research publications dealing with the ecology, life history, and taxonomy of vertebrates indexed and filed according to author and subject. These card indexes are increased by about 400 entries each year. In addition, the Laboratory collection of research reprints and bulletins now exceeds 5,000 separates, to which about 200 are added each year. Since 1950, over 10,000 reprints of research publications by the staff have been distributed as the result of requests from researchers and laymen throughout the world. During the past year over 750 were mailed; in exchange, the Laboratory received about 300 publications. The research library and the system of exchange represent one of the most valuable assets of the research program.

The current activities of the Cooperative Wildlife Research Laboratory include nineteen major projects, several of which (such as the work on bobwhite quail, strip-mined land, and foxes) are subdivided into a number of individual studies. Some of the projects undertaken are now near completion and subsequently will be terminated, but the bulk of them are long-term and will be continued indefinitely. It is largely through continuous, concentrated effort that researchers obtain the detailed information necessary for a fundamental understanding of the ecology of wildlife. Individual studies include the following: Bobwhite Quail Life History and Population Studies; Bobwhite Quail Food Habits in Southern Illinois; Bobwhite Quail Food Preferences; Quail Hunter Data from Southern Illinois; Ecology of Bobwhite Quail Roosting Sites; Bobwhite Quail Management in Southern Illinois; Bobwhite Quail Plumage; Bobwhite Quail Osteology; Chemical and Physical Analysis of Some Bones from

Bobwhite Quail; Parasites of the Bobwhite Quail; Mourning Dove Studies in Illinois; Amphibian Studies; Habitat Plantings for Wildlife; Cottontail Rabbit in Southern Illinois; Waterfowl Studies in Southern Illinois; Stripmine Investigations; Wildlife Surveys of Southern Illinois; Opossum Studies; Reptile Reproduction; Reptile Food Habits; Small Mammal Studies; Red and Gray Fox Studies; Fox and Gray Squirrel Studies; Conservation Education; Songbird Studies; Reference Collection; Wide-row Corn Fields as Wildlife Habitat; Sylvan Rabies; Body-Organ Weight and Volume Relationships for Terrestrial Vertebrates.

Since the establishment of the wildlife research program, the Cooperative Wildlife Research staff has produced a total of sixty-one publications. An additional seventeen papers are now in various stages of completion. As evidenced by the published articles, a wide range of subjects has been included representing popular, semi-popular, and technical treatments.

To date, approximately forty graduate and sixty undergraduate students have received training through employment by the Research Laboratory. All graduate students are required to prepare quarterly reports of their activities as a part of their training.

Since the establishment of the Cooperative Wildlife Research Laboratory, there has been a steady increase in requests for services. During 1959, over seventy letters of inquiry for information about wildlife were answered; twelve properties were examined and wildlife management plans prepared; twenty-eight requests for consultation on wildlife problems were acknowledged; and thirty-two animals were examined and reports prepared. Reports are provided each year at the request of the Illinois Natural History Survey, the Illinois Department of Conservation, and the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, providing data on fall and spring populations of common game animals of Southern Illinois. Through the Southern Illinois University Information Service, many articles have been provided for publication in newspapers throughout Illinois; and fifteen topics have been taped for use of Southern Illinois radio stations. In addition to these services, members of the Laboratory staff are in constant demand as speakers at sportsmen and service clubs, seminars, and scientific meetings.

President Morris introduced Professor W. D. Klimstra, coordinator of the research being carried on in the Cooperative Wildlife Research Laboratory. Professor Klimstra spoke briefly to the members of the Board concerning the principal current projects on which research is being done; the state, federal, and private agencies cooperating in these projects; and the interest evinced in reclamation of strip-mined areas for recreational and educational purposes.

Packets of materials containing Professor Klimstra's full ten-year report, together with reprints of some twenty publications, were presented. Mr. Wham commended Professor Klimstra and his staff for the excellent work already done by the Laboratory and expressed the appreciation of the Board for the report presented. Professor Klimstra was then excused from the meeting.

FORESTRY CONSULTANT WORKSHOP

For the information of the Board of Trustees, we wish to report that on April 28, 29, and 30 a closed workshop for consultants on Forestry Education was held at Southern Illinois University. We are reporting this to the Board not only to apprise the members of our continuing review of the University's program in Forestry, but also to indicate that we hope we have hit upon a method which will be most fruitful in the study of the numerous organizational and educational problems that lie ahead of us in our planning and review.

An essential feature of our new organization is the analysis and review of the present program and the planning of alterations, enlargements, and additions for the future by the central staff of the University. Obviously, however, such planning cannot take place in a vacuum and must rely heavily upon the knowledge both of our own specialists in the various fields of concern and also of outside consultants who have had an opportunity to observe comparable developments elsewhere. In a consultant workshop of the kind we are discussing various local experts, including members of our own staff, affiliated local agencies, and related state and federal agencies come in to provide the kind of comprehensive factual background against which problems need to be reviewed. They present their facts not only to the central staff of the University, but also to a group of outside consultants especially competent to interpret the facts and to assist in sound projections into the future. After they have presented their facts, the consultants are asked to exchange views, to react to the various possibilities implied by the discussion, and to recommend courses of action for the future.

We believe such a consultant workshop to be an innovation in educational planning, but an innovation which assures everyone concerned (most particularly the members of the Board of Trustees) that planning is proceeding on a sound basis. Furthermore, this method of procedure appears to be especially well adapted to our present situation in which the rapid development of a second major campus makes it imperative that the University's total resources be brought to bear in the most effective way possible upon needs of Illinois.

This report, which required no action, was accepted by the Board for the record.

OPTION FOR PURCHASE OF BEULAH HOME

Pursuant to a resolution adopted at the March 4, 1960, meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Illinois Health Foundation was notified of our desire and intent to purchase the Beulah Home in East St. Louis. Further negotiations have resulted in the execution by the Illinois Health Foundation of an Option Agreement, whereby in consideration of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) the Board will be given an option to purchase the property and fixtures for a total price of Two Hundred Ten Thousand Four Hundred Sixty-Four Dollars (\$210,464.00), provided that notice of election to exercise the option is received on or before August 1, 1960, and provided that payment is made on or before September 1, 1960. The notice of election to exercise the option must contain a statement that the Board has obtained a commitment for the sale of Revenue Bonds in an amount sufficient to pay the total purchase price.

We recommend that the Board approve the terms of the following Option Agreement, authorize the Chairman to indicate such approval by signature and affixation of the Seal upon the Option Agreement in the space provided, and authorize the expenditure of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for procurement of said option. This Option will become effective if executed by Southern Illinois Uni-

versity and delivered, with certified resolution, to the Illinois Health Foundation by May 13, 1960.

Option for the Sale of Real Estate

1. The Illinois Health Foundation, Inc., a not-for-profit corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Illinois, with its principal office at Chicago, Illinois, hereinafter called the Seller, in consideration of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) paid to it by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, a public corporation of the State of Illinois, hereinafter called the Purchaser, agrees to grant to the Purchaser the option to purchase, under the terms and conditions and for the considerations hereinafter set out, and only in combination and not separately:

(a) the following described real estate with all improvements thereon:

The Northeast Fifty (50) Feet of Lot Ten (10) and all of Lots Eleven (11) and Twelve (12) of Block Sixty-Two (62) of the platted town of East St. Louis, St. Clair County, Illinois,

said property being hereinafter sometimes called "premises" and being commonly known as the Beulah Residence, for the sum of One Hundred Ninety Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars (\$190,800.00), and

(b) certain furniture and equipment, including both chattels and fixtures, but possibly less certain smaller items subject to loss or consumption described in one certain inventory and appraisal entitled "Fair Market Value Report, Beulah Club Equipment, 460 North Ninth Street, East St. Louis, Illinois, for Southern Illinois University, East St. Louis, Illinois" by the Lloyd Thomas Company of Chicago, Illinois, for the sum of Nineteen Thousand Six Hundred Sixty-Four Dollars (\$19,664.00).

2. In order to exercise said option, Purchaser shall perform both of the two following conditions:

(a) give written notice of election to purchase to Seller either by delivering said notice personally to Seller on or before August 1, 1960, at the address hereinafter stated or by mailing said notice by certified or registered mail to Seller at said address so that said notice is mailed and postmarked on or before July 27, 1960; provided that if said notice is not so delivered personally on or before August 1, 1960, or is not so mailed and postmarked on or before July 27, 1960, this option shall terminate and become null and void. Said notice shall contain a statement that the Purchaser has obtained a commitment for the sale of its revenue bonds in an amount sufficient to pay the total purchase price; and

(2) tender to Seller the purchase price in the sum of \$210,464.00 on Thursday, September 1, 1960, at the hour of 10:00 A.M. o'clock, Central Daylight Savings Time at the address of Seller's attorneys as stated in paragraph 3(d) hereof, provided that if said tender of the purchase price is not so made, this option shall terminate and become null and void.

3. If said option is exercised in accordance with the conditions and provisions of paragraph 2;

(a) Seller agrees on September 1, 1960 (hereinafter called "date of transfer"):

(1) To convey the premises to Purchaser on the date of transfer by stamped warranty deed in the statutory form and to assign and transfer said furniture and equipment to Purchaser on said date by Bill of Sale.

(2) To deliver possession of the premises to Purchaser at the date of transfer, but if by agreement between the parties hereto Purchaser sooner takes possession the Seller agrees that this shall not be deemed acceptance of Seller's title or waiver of the right to object to defects therein.

(3) To convey a fee simple title, free of all encumbrances and liens except those specifically here excepted: *Matters of record*.

4. To pay all utility charges for periods preceding the date of transfer.

(5) To assist in evicting all tenants in the premises after the date of transfer provided that Seller shall have until September 9th to deliver complete possession and to have any of its existing tenants move out. If any tenants are in possession beyond the date of transfer, all rents allocable to the period after said date shall be assigned and be payable to Purchaser. Seller represents that there are and on the date of transfer will be no written leases of all or any part of the premises and that the only tenants in said premises are and will be on a week to week tenancy basis.

(6) To maintain until the date of transfer fire insurance with extended coverage on the buildings and contents thereof located on the premises in the amounts of the respective agreed purchase prices, and in case of loss thereunder to apply the proceeds of the policies only to the repair or rebuilding or replacement of the property damaged, or to reduce the agreed price hereunder. Seller further agrees that if the premises become vacant or unoccupied before the date of transfer, any vacancy or unoccupancy permits or watchmen required by the insurer in order to prevent lapse of coverage will be procured at Seller's expense.

(b) Purchaser agrees on September 1, 1960, to pay the purchase price in the sum of \$210,464.00 by cashiers or certified check(s).

(c) Purchaser will receive at the date of transfer the abstract of title to the said premises extended through the acquisition of said premises by Seller. Purchaser shall have until July 1, 1960, to extend and examine said abstract at its own expense and on or before said date to communicate in writing to Seller any exceptions to title other than those referred to in paragraph 3. (a) (3) which cause it to be unmerchantable. Seller agrees that any exceptions other than those referred to in paragraph 3. (a) (3) rendering the title merchantable shall be cleared at the expense of the Seller before the date of transfer set out above or any agreed extension thereof, and failure to so perform this covenant shall render this agreement null and void and all obligations created hereby shall terminate.

(d) The closing of the sale and delivery of documents and purchase price on the date of transfer shall be at:

INCREASED RETIREMENT ANNUITIES FOR STAFF MEMBERS WHO RETIRED PRIOR TO SEPTEMBER 1, 1959

Approval is requested for the following resolution, which would have the effect of endorsing requests made by our emeritus staff members and the Carbondale chapter of the American Association of University Professors to provide more equitable retirement annuities for members of the staff who retired prior to September 1, 1959. Studies have shown that, while recent amendments to the Act creating the University Retirement System of Illinois have liberalized annuities and other benefits, the situation of the Emeriti of 1958 and former years has not been improved and, indeed, as a result of smaller salaries prevalent at the time of their retirement and the loss of value in the retirement dollar many of them are now in financial straits.

At its April 20 meeting, the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois adopted a resolution similar in details and wording:

Resolution

WHEREAS, committees of the Emeriti representing members of the Southern Illinois University staff who retired prior to September 1, 1959, will request

the Board of Trustees of the University Retirement System of Illinois to consider a plan to provide increased retirement benefits for those who retired prior to establishment of the University Retirement System of Illinois in 1941, and for those who retired after September 1, 1941, but prior to September 1, 1959; and

WHEREAS, the amendments of the Act creating the University Retirement System of Illinois adopted in 1959, which provide more equitable annuities and other benefits available to employees of State institutions of higher education, did not provide for any adjustments in the retirement allowances of the Emeriti of 1958 and former years; and

WHEREAS, anyone who retired prior to September 1, 1941, and whose annuity is paid by the University as deferred compensation for service rendered prior to retirement, is receiving an annuity far below the annuities available under the University Retirement System of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, the annuities of those retired after September 1, 1941, but prior to September 1, 1959, are not proportional to the contributions required of participants, do not take into account the unrecorded equity toward retirement allowances earned by service prior to 1941, and do not provide adequate benefits for a surviving wife or dependent children; and

WHEREAS, many of these Emeriti, after spending virtually their entire careers in the service of the State universities of Illinois, are dependent largely upon their retirement annuities and are in serious financial need; and

WHEREAS, the local chapter of the American Association of University Professors has endorsed a proposal for increasing the retirement annuities for staff members who retired prior to September 1, 1959; and

WHEREAS, the Teachers College Board and the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois are also being requested to endorse a program of improved retirement annuities for staff members who retired prior to September 1, 1959; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that it endorses, in principle, consideration by the Board of Trustees of the University Retirement System of Illinois and support by that body in the 1961 session of the General Assembly of the State of Illinois of the necessary legislation to provide much-needed improvements in retirement benefits for those who retired from the service of the State universities prior to September 1, 1959.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted the above resolution by unanimous vote.

RECOMMENDATION FOR HONORARY DEGREE

We recommend that at the August, 1960, commencement, or some commencement thereafter, the honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree be awarded to Dr. George Emmanuel Mylonas, distinguished scholar, classical archaeologist, and art historian.

George Emmanuel Mylonas was born at Smyrna, Asia Minor, Turkey, December 9, 1898. He received Doctor of Philosophy degrees from the University of Athens in 1927, and from Johns Hopkins University in 1929; he has also studied in various American, European, and Oriental museums. Dr. Mylonas

came to the United States in 1928 and was naturalized in 1937. He has since served as Instructor at the University of Chicago; as Associate of Classics, Professor of Classics, and Professor of Classical Art and Archaeology at the University of Illinois; and as Assistant Professor and Associate Professor, History of Art, at Washington University, where he has served as Professor and Head of the Department of Art and Archaeology since 1940. Dr. Mylonas has served also as Assistant Director, Field Director, and Director of excavations at Olynthus, Haghios Kosmas, Eleusis, Akropotamos, and Mycenae in Greece; and as Fulbright senior research scholar and Fulbright Professor of Archaeology at the University of Athens. He is the author of more than eight books on archaeological subjects and has contributed many articles of a scholarly nature to American and Greek publications. His home is in St. Louis, Missouri.

This recommendation has been initiated by our Faculty Committee on Honorary Degrees and has the endorsement of the administration.

On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, seconded by George T. Wilkins, the Board approved unanimously the recommendation set forth above.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:30 P.M., following executive session.

THE JUNE MEETING of the Board of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Wednesday, June 15, 1960, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Mrs. Stella Collins, Kenneth L. Davis, Harold R. Fischer, Melvin C. Lockard, Lindell W. Sturgis, George T. Wilkins. Mr. Oehmke was absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President J. E. Grinnell, Vice-President Harold W. See, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, Reporter, *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Mrs. Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on May 7, 1960, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, these minutes were approved as presented.

Mr. Adrian Mitten, Regional Director of the American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees, was introduced to the members of the Board. Mr. Mitten appeared before the Board in place of Mr. C. "Tiny" Groeteke, representative and organizer for AFSCME - AFL-CIO, who was unable to attend. He spoke to the members of the Board relative to the organization's desire that the University recognize members of the University Police Force as members of Local No. 878. After the presentation, Mr. Wham requested that the attorneys for AFSCME submit a brief setting forth the union's specific position. Mr. Mitten was then excused from the meeting.

The next item considered concerned contracts for architectural planning, city planning, and engineering work for the campus at Edwardsville, Illinois, requisitions for which had been signed by the Executive Committee of the Board. The following information was presented:

At the last meeting of the Board of Trustees a general discussion was held regarding the Campus Master Plan for the Southwestern Illinois Campus of Southern Illinois University. Following the general approval of the Board for the administration to proceed, firms were selected for architectural, city planning, and engineering work. A requisition covering these services was submitted to the Executive Committee and was approved. It was thought, however, that in view of the long-range aspects of the planning, it would be well to call the pertinent provisions of these agreements to the attention of the entire Board.

The architectural planning firm selected was Hellmuth, Obata, and Kassabaum of St. Louis, Missouri. Their work is to furnish professional architectural planning services to prepare a Master Plan incorporating an educational program for this area. They shall assist the University Architect in coordinating the program and maintaining design and standards control for the buildings within the \$25,000,000 which will be available from the Bond Issue submitted to referendum for election. The architects are to be paid on a time basis with specific hourly rates set out in the agreement, plus two and one-half times the actual payroll and actual out-of-pocket expenses incurred for travel, lodging, food, and printing, but in no case shall the total payment exceed \$100,000, and no more than \$25,000 shall be paid from monies presently appropriated to the Board but which are not released.

The firm of Hare and Hare, Kansas City, Missouri, has been selected as the city planning and landscape architects. They shall furnish the professional city planning and landscape services, including traffic transportation studies, regional analysis, economic and sociological analysis, zoning, and landscaping for the proposed campus. They are to be paid on a standard payroll basis for time spent, which will include their overhead plus 25 per cent for profit, and expenses for travel, lodging, food, and printing. Their fee shall not exceed \$50,000 and no more than \$12,500 shall be paid from monies presently appropriated to the Board, but which have not been released.

The firm of Warren and Van Praag of Decatur, Illinois, has been selected to furnish the professional engineering services. Their services will include a review of existing utilities, soil investigations, water supply treatment and distribution, sanitary sewers and sewage treatment, storm sewers and drainage, electric lights and power and electrical distribution, heating plant and distribution system, gas distribution, flood control, and garbage and refuse disposal. They will be paid on a standard payroll basis, plus an equal additional amount to cover overhead and profit and out-of-pocket expenses for travel, lodging, food, and printing. Payment shall not exceed \$80,000 and no more than \$20,000 shall be paid from monies appropriated to the Board, but which have not been released.

After discussion, George T. Wilkins moved that the Board adopt the following resolution authorizing the Chairman of the Board of Trustees

of Southern Illinois University to execute Contract #4777 in the amount of \$100,000; Contract #4778 in the amount of \$50,000; and Contract #4779 in the amount of \$80,000:

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University has been given the responsibility for the establishment of a University Campus in Southwestern Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Certain lands have been and are being secured from residents of this area for the purpose of establishment of this campus; and

WHEREAS, Each step in the process of establishing this campus has been done with expert advice and counsel; and

WHEREAS, It is now necessary and desirable that architects-planners, engineers, regional and city planners, and landscape architects be employed to develop a campus Master Plan; and

WHEREAS, The Board, through the administration, has been in the process of interviewing qualified firms for these purposes; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, sitting in regular session, that they retain, in accordance with contracts on file in the Office of the Secretary of the Board, the firm of Hellmuth, Obata, and Kassabaum as architects-planners, the firm of Hare and Hare as city planners and landscape architects, and the firm of Warren and Van Praag as engineers, in accordance with certain contracts, and that the Chairman of the Board be authorized and is directed to execute said agreements.

The motion was seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

The Board next considered the Annual Internal Budget for 1960-1961. Lists of salaries for faculty-administrative and civil service personnel were forwarded to the members of the Board on May 27, 1960, with revisions forwarded June 6. Permission was requested to add the name of one faculty member at the Southwestern Illinois Campus which had been omitted through clerical error.

A motion was made by Melvin C. Lockard that the Board increase the salary of President Morris to \$33,000 per year. The motion was seconded by George T. Wilkins, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

President Morris requested approval to withdraw \$100,000 from listed accounts to finance a program of continuing automation of University records. George T. Wilkins moved approval of the recommendation, Melvin C. Lockard seconded the motion, and the vote was recorded as follows: Yea, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

Lindell W. Sturgis then moved that the Board approve the Annual Internal Budget for 1960-1961, as amended. The motion was seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, and the vote was recorded as follows: Yea, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

After discussion, Kenneth L. Davis moved that faculty-administrative and non-academic salaries, as approved above, become effective as of June 1, 1960. The motion was seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, and the vote was recorded as follows: Yea, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

REPORT ON WOMEN'S EDUCATION AT SOUTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY

This report on women's education at Southern Illinois University is another in the series of reports to the Board of Trustees on progress being made toward strengthening the educational functions of the University.

It should probably be pointed out first that there is no essential difference between education for women and education for men. The University is, and has been for many years, completely co-educational in character; women and men attend the same classes, use the same laboratory and library facilities, and participate very largely in the same University events. The only marked exception to such participation is the separation between physical education and athletic activities for men and for women.

Women are admitted on the same basis as men to the various curricula of the University and are subject to exactly the same degree requirements. It may, therefore, be useful to define the sense in which women's education can be said to exist as a special function of Southern Illinois University.

First of all, as Southern Illinois University has developed its various professional curricula, schools, and colleges, some differences between those professional curricula primarily designed for men seeking professional careers, and those primarily designed for women seeking professional careers, have emerged. The School of Home Economics, in effect, serves the purposes of women's education although men can and do enroll in its courses. Among the curricula it now offers are apparel design, clothing and textiles merchandizing, interior decoration, dietetics, institutional management, home and family, and home economics education. Similarly, the Department of Nursing is very largely directed toward the training of women, but it can and does train male nurses. As indicated above, the women's Physical Education Department concentrates on women students and provides special training for them. Because of the nature of the professional training in these educational units, they are largely staffed with women and are designed to give our women students opportunities for special careers.

In addition to these women's curricula, there are a number of other offerings that have a special interest for women; for example, the Sociology Department offers a number of courses in the problems of marriage, parenthood, and the family. The secretarial courses in the School of Business are designed primarily for women students. Elementary education also attracts more women than men and hence is largely planned for them. The School of Applied Science offers courses for prospective elementary school teachers so that they can better understand the media, tools, and processes which are employed in the classroom.

There is, however, a more subtle and difficult definition of women's education which grows out of certain historical factors. Traditionally, more men than women seek professional careers; traditionally, too, many women who train for professional careers tend to drop out of them, or at least to put them in the background, when they marry. One of the difficulties in providing the nation and the state with an adequate number of nurses, dieticians, elementary school teachers, secretaries and other business women, and so on, is the comparatively short professional life of career women. It seems wise in designing an educational program for women to take this factor into account.

Because of the large amount of turnover in such professions, it is undoubtedly educationally justifiable to attempt to attract women into them. The Division of Technical and Adult Education makes special attempts to attract women into its practical nursing, cosmetology, secretarial, and textile merchandizing courses. The School of Home Economics holds an annual High School Day, provides materials concerning opportunities in the field to homemaking teachers and vocational guidance counselors throughout Southern Illinois, participates by invitation in many high school and county career days, and through its alumni, attempts to locate promising students in Home Economics. The members of the Nursing Education staff also attempt to interest high school graduates in nursing as a profession. In the College of Education, both the Future Teachers Association and the Girls' Athletic Association attempt to interest girls in elementary school teaching and physical education for women as possible careers.

Furthermore, by means of certain special groups such as professional sororities, the various schools and colleges attempt to promote the intellectual and professional interests of the women enrolled. In the School of Home Economics there is a chapter of Kappa Omicron Phi, a national home economics honorary organization, and also a Home Economics Club. The School of Business encourages membership in the National Secretaries Association. For women interested in journalism there is a national professional sorority, Beta Omicron; and for women interested in speech there is an activity group, Zeta Phi Eta. There is also a music sorority for women, Mu Phi Epsilon. The College of Education sponsors a kindergarten-primary club and, through Kappa Delta Pi and the Student Education Association, encourages the intellectual and professional interests of women students.

The awarding of scholarships, fellowships, and assistantships at Southern Illinois University is based largely upon the scholastic averages of the applicants; and our deans inform us that there is no distinction as between men and

women applicants. It is, of course, true that many more women apply for financial assistance in certain fields than in others, and the same is true of men.

The University has developed a number of special curricula which, in effect, combine training for a professional career and for homemaking. The most notable example of this is a curriculum in Home and Family, worked out jointly by the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the School of Home Economics. This curriculum attempts to provide the students who enter it with a broad cultural background, but at the same time with certain of the skills and attitudes needed by homemakers.

It should be noted that at Southern Illinois University all students, both women and men, take a common core of general degree requirements. The assumption behind this common core is that whatever the student's vocational objective may be, he or she should become a well-informed, broad-minded, responsible, and cultured citizen. Oftentimes, professional curricula, in particular those which are especially designed for men, tend to become highly technical and overspecialized. A peculiar result of this is that many men, preoccupied with breadwinning, tend to leave to the women social, cultural, and other community activities. Thus, incompatibility of interests between men and women tends to develop. It has seemed to us at Southern Illinois University that a sounder basis for education is the assumption that in both men and women there should be developed not only competence for a career, but also competence for assuming family, community, and general cultural responsibilities, and that the partners in a marriage should have not only special abilities but also common intellectual interests. Hence, general degree requirements, which are now under intensive study, are designed to insure that whatever a student may do after graduation to make a living, she or he has the background of a thoroughly civilized person.

One difference between men and women is that, on the average, women live longer; and, because they tend to marry younger, often survive their husbands by several years. This is not, of course, an immediate problem for persons of college age; but it does point to the desirability of some kind of business training for women, since in many instances the entire responsibility for the management of property and other assets may fall upon them. Among the business courses available generally to women are typing and accounting, but possibly the University should make a special study of what would be most valuable to women students in this regard.

Other matters which possibly ought to be studied are the attitudes of both men and women students toward careers for women; work experiences for women students; the placement of women in positions other than in nursing and in teaching; and adult education for women. In *The Educational Record* for April, 1955, Dean Althea K. Hottel points out that education for women should continue beyond their college years. She states that there are two types of significantly dangerous women in American life: the apathetic and the discontented.

Some have lost their sense of importance and feel they are wasting their capacities either in household routines or in meaningless leisure. Others consider they are participating only partially or indirectly in those activities for

which are reserved the most highly prized symbols of prestige and the most sought-after rewards in American life, those activities which are concerned with the business and the professional world. Except in the role of mother, which lasts a comparatively short period of time in modern families, typically feminine pursuits do not seem to offer the comparable satisfactions to women that the pursuits in business and industry offer to men.

Her statement of the difficult position of women seems to imply the need for advanced education, adult education, and re-education of women.

This information report, which was one of a series concerning educational aspects of the University, was accepted by the Board for the record. No action was required.

Professor Tenney stated that the academic deans, as a group, are strongly of the opinion that so far as educational essentials are concerned there should be no distinction as between men and women; they feel there are no major differences so far as intelligence, learning ability, and ability to enter various fields of study are concerned. He pointed out that the differences which have caused the administration to consider a separation are minor ones: the difficulty of recruiting women into nursing and other careers, because of the high rate of turnover; the fact that women tend to marry younger and live longer than men; and certain traditional prejudices against women in supervisory positions.

As a result of the ensuing discussion, it was brought out that the administration should probably attempt to resolve the questions of rapport between women serving in supervisory capacities; prejudice of women against working for other women; personnel difficulties; and attitudes toward career women. It was the consensus that there are many vocational and career opportunities for women, and that possibly provision should be made for more general courses for women interested in business careers.

ESTABLISHMENT OF TRANSPORTATION INSTITUTE

During the past two years Professor Alexander MacMillan has been investigating the place of Southern Illinois University in transportation education. As a result of these investigations, we request approval of the establishment of a Transportation Institute, effective July 1, 1960.

Southern Illinois University possesses certain natural advantages in this field. It is near the heart of the transportation network of the United States, being in close proximity to the chief inland waterways, the rail and trucking centers, and the air centers of the country. Professor MacMillan has learned from representatives of industry that there is a feeling that it is the most neglected of the major industries so far as the training of personnel and the provision of educational services by universities is concerned. He has assurances of industry support and cooperation for the program of an institute which would draw upon various colleges, schools, and departments for instructional, research, and educational services. As we have previously indicated, institutes typically operate under a director, but draw their staffs largely from existing departments.

Following is a description of the general purposes and the proposed organization of this Institute:

1. Purposes. (a) To stimulate the training of college students and other individuals interested in careers in the various fields of transportation; (b) to make possible effective contacts between leaders of transportation industry and the professional staff of Southern Illinois University; and (c) to seek and disseminate information of use to persons interested in the field of transportation.

a. Instruction

(1) Through the cooperation of the various colleges, schools, and departments of the University, to provide courses of instruction leading to certificates and college degrees for students intending to enter the transportation field.

(2) With the aid of the Advisory Council on Transportation, to arrange student work opportunities in the transportation industry as part of the educational training of the students, and also arrange for loans and scholarships for promising students.

(3) Through the Division of Technical and Adult Education, to provide appropriate special courses for persons already occupied in the field of transportation.

b. Research

(1) To initiate, encourage, coordinate, and conduct research in the field of transportation.

(2) To make studies of needs and opportunities within the transportation field, and provide objective reports to persons concerned.

c. Educational Service

(1) To carry out from time to time special surveys which may be of use to the transportation industry, and maintain an up-to-date list of experts and special consultants available.

(2) To arrange for advice from the University's experts in geography, economics, accountancy, management, personnel relations, labor, etc., to any transportation concerns which seek such counsel, or to draw together groups of experts for the discussion of basic problems.

(3) In cooperation with the Area Services Office, to disseminate information about local opportunities in the transportation field, and to place students in promising situations.

2. Organization

a. Director

The Transportation Institute shall be headed by a Director nominated by the Vice-President for Operations of the Carbondale Campus after consultation with the appropriate deans and directors and approval by the Board of Trustees upon recommendation of the President. The Director shall recommend to the Vice-President for Operations of the Carbondale Campus for clearance through the ordinary channels the personnel, budget, curricula, and basic programs of the Institute.

b. Staff

(1) Those members of the geography, economics, accounting, and management departments, the Vocational-Technical Institute, and other educational

units of the University who may be able to contribute to the instructional, research, or educational service programs of the Institute.

(2) Adjunct professors or research associates drawn from among qualified experts in the various technical phases of the transportation industry who are not regular full-time members of the University staff.

(3) Such general and office helpers as may be required.

c. The Advisory Council on Transportation

The Director shall be advised by a council on transportation consisting of the President, or his delegated representative, as chairman, and of representatives of the transportation industry and of related fields. This council should consider ways and means of encouraging students to consider careers in transportation and of enabling the transportation industry to take advantage of the educational services of the University.

Professor Tenney pointed out that several major industries have indicated their interest in the training of supervisory personnel for positions between top management and labor, and that they are interested in college graduates for such positions. He also indicated that the Defense Department is very much interested in graduates for positions in the various fields of transportation.

It was explained that arrangements had been worked out whereby the University could produce a pilot film depicting the different transportation industries, their needs, and their potential for persons wishing to make a career in the field of transportation. Professor Tenney indicated that leaders within the transportation industry have agreed to raise funds for the production of such a film, which would be for general distribution and not a part of the proposed educational program, but would serve as a means of recruitment of students for such a program.

Kenneth L. Davis moved that the Board approve the plan presented, subject to administrative modification. The motion was seconded by Harold R. Fischer and the vote was recorded as follows: Yea, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

APPROVAL OF RECOMMENDATION OF THE MERIT BOARD OF THE UNIVERSITY CIVIL SERVICE SYSTEM OF ILLINOIS

The following letter was received June 13, 1960, from Donald E. Dickason, Director of the University Civil Service System of Illinois, concerning a recommendation made by the Merit Board, for which approval is requested:

UNIVERSITY CIVIL SERVICE SYSTEM OF ILLINOIS

DEAR DR. MORRIS:

Among the powers and duties assigned to the Merit Board under the Statute is the following:

"Sec. 36d. Powers and Duties of the Merit Board.

(4) To recommend to the institutions and agencies specified in Section 36e standards for hours of work, holidays, sick leave, overtime compensation and vacation for the purpose of improving conditions of employment covered therein and for the purpose of insuring conformity with the prevailing rate principle."

In its meeting on May 9, 1960, the Merit Board approved a recommendation to each institution and agency under the above statement of its powers and duties, this proposal being as follows:

"An employee who has completed at least five years of service, and who has exhausted all accrued disability and vacation benefits to which he is entitled, may be granted an advance against disability benefits to be accrued for future service on the basis of one-half pay for a period sufficient to enable him to reach, but not to exceed the date on which disability benefits under the University Retirement System will be available to him. An employee granted such an advance, but who because of illness or retirement is not able to return to work, shall have the obligation to repay this advance cancelled."

The proposal thus approved by the Board was first suggested by the Civil Service Employees Advisory Committee and was modified somewhat by the Faculty Administrative Advisory Committee. The action of the Board was based on this modification and hence was done with the full approval of the Faculty Administrative Committee and with the acceptance of the Civil Service Committee. It is intended to provide protection for the occasional hardship case of which we all see an example once in a while.

I should like, therefore, to ask that this matter be referred to your Board at its first appropriate meeting with the recommendation that it be approved. Mrs. Collins was in the meeting of the Board which took this action and would be in a position to fill in any details which may be wished at the time the Board discussed the matter.

A copy of the prospectus was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Lindell W. A BILL

For an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of Southern Illinois University.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

The following named sums, or so much thereof as may be necessary, respectively, for the purposes named, are appropriated from the Southern Illinois University Income Fund to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University to meet the ordinary and contingent expenses of Southern Illinois University:

INTRODUCTION

There are several types of on-campus degree students, not all of them producing cash income. Each non-veteran produces \$42.00 per twelve-weeks term. Students on

state scholarships and faculty members taking university courses produce no cash income for educational operations. Veterans of the Korean War do not take the place of World War II veterans as a source of income, since under Public Law 550 they at most pay the same tuition as non-veterans.

PERSONAL SERVICES -- FACULTY, ADMINISTRATIVE, NON-ACADEMIC

1. It has been possible to recommend substantial increases in salary for members of the faculty and administrative staffs. These increases have been made on a merit basis through careful evaluation of individuals. An attempt has also been made to increase the spread of faculty salaries to bring them closer into line with the spread now prevailing at other universities.

a. In contrast to past practices, the biennial budget included \$3,000,000 for salary increases to academic, non-academic, and student employees. The sum of \$1,000,000 was included in the 1959-60 budget for salary increases, leaving \$2,000,000 for 1960-61. The \$2,000,000 has been allocated for salary increases in the recommended 1960-61 budget.

It should be noted that the market for qualified teaching and research personnel has continued to become more competitive as the demand has increased much more than the supply. A factor which has become quite important during the past few years is the increasing demand by industries and governmental agencies for personnel having the kind of training which university faculty members have. The result is that universities must now compete not only among themselves, but with these other agencies, for staff members. At the same time rapidly increasing college and university enrollments are requiring large increases in the teaching staffs of collegiate institutions.

The salary increases recommended in this budget will probably improve the ability of Southern Illinois University to obtain and hold good faculty members. It should be pointed out, however, that other institutions, in general, are increasing their salary levels as fast as Southern.

2. It has been possible in this budget to make general increases for low-salaried office workers and other civil service employees whose scale has been low and who have been falling behind those civil service workers who receive prevailing rates or whose salaries are determined by negotiation. The new salaries are consonant with the ranges established by the University Civil Service System.

3. A considerable amount of the additional personal service money has gone into extending on a two-year basis positions added in 1959-60 to meet emergency conditions brought about by the large enrollment increases and to replacing on a permanent basis temporary people employed on an emergency basis. Little or nothing could be done to develop additional services; however, provisions have been made to upgrade the quality of our programs to some degree.

4. Salary rates for persons on leave without pay are shown in parentheses since they do not affect actual expenditures.

5. The contract for every twelve-months faculty-administrative staff member having academic rank on a continuing or permanent basis will indicate that the twelve-months appointment will be dependent on his assignment.

PERSONAL SERVICES -- STUDENT

1. A total of \$1,112,815 has been provided for student help from State Appropriations as compared to about \$1,068,115 during the 1959-1960 fiscal year. It is planned in the future to use more, rather than less, student help in the various offices, in laboratories, and in the physical plant. Excellent students with financial need, providing they have the necessary skills or abilities as shown from testing programs, are given the first opportunity in finding campus jobs.

2. The pay scale for student employees on the Carbondale Campuses has been changed, ranging from \$0.80 to \$1.25 per hour rather than the \$0.80 to \$1.15 which was true for the 1959-60 fiscal year. The range on the Southwestern Illinois Campus remains the same as for 1959-60, from \$0.80 to \$1.25 per hour. Beginning with the new fiscal year of 1960-61, all new student employees will be given an automatic increase of five cents after one term of successful work. Merit and automatic increases will then be allowed on the same basis as was true for the 1959-60 fiscal year.

3. Pre-service training programs have been developed for office workers, food service workers, photographic workers, and workers in parts of the library. In-service training programs are provided for many of the different kinds of workers in the physical plant.

4. Great care is being exercised in coordinating the class and work programs of students. Whenever possible, a student is placed in work related to his major or minor study areas.

TRAVEL

1. In order to provide equitable distribution and more effective control of travel funds, the allotments for travel are made in four categories as follows:

- a. Institutional travel, which involves travel on University business not identified with a specific department or office.
- b. Convention travel, which involves travel to conferences, conventions, and professional meetings. This has been allocated on a pro-rata basis to the major functions of the University, and will be distributed from the offices of the vice presidents and the deans of major educational units.
- c. Departmental travel, which involves travel that departments and offices must do in order to perform their regular functions.
- d. Air travel, which involves travel where additional convenience and speed serve the best interests of the University.

2. Travel allotments to the various accounts will be used in part for travel in University-owned passenger automobiles. Since the operating cost of these automobiles is chargeable against state appropriations other than travel and such costs are passed on to departments and offices using such service, the allotments for travel exceed the state appropriations for travel.

EQUIPMENT

1. With the purchase of an increasing number of books, the proportionate amount of equipment money necessary to purchase small equipment, under \$75 per item, has increased. Including the amount assigned to the Library for the purchase of books, about 45 per cent of the equipment money has been distributed to the departments and offices for the purchase of small equipment.

2. Approximately 55 per cent of the equipment money will be placed in general accounts to be allotted periodically as studies of needs determine. These studies should show whether or not there are any items of equipment needed for University use that have not been purchased by the departments and whether or not certain departments have special needs which have not been met by the appropriations hitherto made to them.

OTHER CURRENT EXPENSES

1. Since travel and equipment have been allotted separately in this budget. Other Current Expenses include contractual services, commodities, stationery-printing-office supplies, employer contributions to the University Retirement System, refunds, and awards and grants for scholarships.

2. The film rental service of the Audio-Visual Education department will charge other departments for the use of instructional films. On the basis of experience, allocations have therefore been made to the departments to be used for this specific purpose.

3. The problem of providing for the on-campus expenses of interviewees, consultants, and other official visitors to the campus has been met by allotting limited funds for this purpose to the offices that handle convention travel.

GENERAL COMMENTS

1. In line with the recent reorganization of the University's administrative pattern, a different grouping of accounts has been used in the 1960-61 internal budget. The General University accounts have been placed first in the budget. These are followed in order by those accounts for which the Vice-President for Operations of the Carbondale Campuses has responsibility and those accounts for which the Vice-President for the Southwestern Illinois Campus has responsibility.

2. In general, the various programs have been allocated operational funds which are comparable to those allocated for the 1959-60 fiscal year. The allocations obviously do not provide for growth caused by the increasing number of students or for the expenditures necessary as the functions of departments are increased.

3. Graduate assistantships, with one exception, have been budgeted to the schools and colleges at the same level as for 1959-60. The one exception is in the General Instruction budget of the Dean of Academic Affairs for the Carbondale Campuses. An amount of \$50,000 is set aside in this budget for the employment of new graduate assistants who have completed their master's degrees at other institutions and are working toward their advanced degree in a department which has been authorized to grant doctoral degrees.

4. The University's internal operating budget includes recommended budget allocations for restricted funds, that is, funds not appropriated to the University from General Revenue or the University Income Fund. Income for restricted funds is provided from instructional, research, and student aid grants made by outside agencies, from University student activity fees, and from other sources. Also included for information are the estimated operations of the University's Service and Revolving Funds. The titles of all such accounts, as well as those of auxiliary enterprises, are enclosed in parentheses.

5. The budget has been produced by the punched card process and has been run off on IBM machines. In order to adapt the budget to mechanization, it has been "streamlined" in certain respects, but explanatory notes and an index have been added to make it as easy to use as possible.

6. For purposes of classifying and controlling positions, each member of the staff has been assigned a position number, which appears in front of his name.

Certain of the symbols used in these position numbers carry special meanings as follows:

- N_____ Number assigned to non-academic employee by University Civil Service.
- R_____ Faculty administrative staff member paid from restricted account.
- _____C Staff member on continuing appointment.
- _____P Professor, associate professor, assistant professor, or instructor with permanent tenure.
- _____T Staff member on temporary or term appointment.
- _____E Emeritus or emerita staff member.
- _____D Staff member on disability leave.
