Poets Bell, Justice to read here

Two nationally known and award winning poets, Donald Justice and Marvin Bell, will give a poetry reading tonight at 8 p.m. in CAB 102. Admission is free and all are welcome.

There will be a reception for the poets at 7 p.m. in the West Lounge prior to the reading. They will talk informally with interested students and others. Again, all are welcome. Free coffee will be served.

Donald Justice's first book *The Summer Antennaries* won the Lamont Poetry Prize in 1960. The award is presented to the most outstanding first book published in a given year. He has since published several other books, including *Local Storms, Night Light, and Sixteen Poems*. His work is widely anthologized, and has appeared in many magazines including *The New Yorker*.

Poetry during his career, Mr. Justice has been awarded Rockefeller and Ford Foundation Fellowships. Both he and Mr. Bell teach in the writer's Workshop at the University of Iowa.

Marvin Bell also won the Lamont Prize with his first book, *A Probable Volume of Dreams*, in 1969. He has two other books, *The Escape Into Yes*, recently published by Atheneum, and *Things We Dreamed We Died For*. He has edited several poetry magazines, and has published his own work in virtually every major poetry journal.

This is a rare opportunity for people at SSU and south-western Minnesota to meet and hear two of our nation's leading poets at the same time. They stop at SSU and will have taken them to ten campuses throughout Minnesota and Wisconsin.

Governor Perpich Visits SSU

Governor Rudy Perpich addressed a standing-room-only audience October 26th in the SSU Student Center. The governor was accompanied by Norm DeBleck, D.F.L. incumbent candidate for the Minnesota House of Representatives.

The meeting opened with Perpich reviewing the commitment of his administration to education. Perpich said members of his staff would return to SSU in the near future to answer questions about student loan programs.

The athletic facility was of great concern to students present. Though the need for the facility is clear, Perpich was not optimistic about the bonding bill needed to finance the complex. He also voiced disdain with the state legislature over its reluctance to pass the bill.

Students voiced need for the facility, citing overcrowding as a major contributing factor. Also, the issue of handicapped-access to athletic facilities was discussed.

Laquetta Smith: New Minorities Director

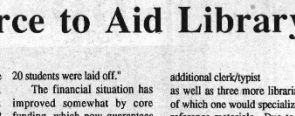

Laquetta Smith, the Minority Student Services Program Director for SSU, focuses on ensuring that the minority students at Southwest State are through graduation and receive the services that they're entitled to and can benefit from." Her other duties include recruiting new minorities, and advising members of the Black Student Union. Her main responsibility is to administer the southwest Minnesota Cultural Diversity Plan.

"This is the third kind of office that I've started," said Smith, who received her M.S.W. from the University of Connecticut. "I've spent 18 years in higher education. Students are my first interest."

One of the venues for recruiting minority students is at the Minnesota Minority Education Fair held for high school students that she attends with the recruiting personnel at SSU. "In speaking to the students, she emphasizes the uniqueness of SSU: 'the size, the individual attention from faculty, the support from the college administration, and the fact that she is there for their advantage and support."

When asked if the inclusion of minority students, such as American Indian, Black, Asian, His-



Task Force to Aid Library

Edmond Conway, Vice President for Academic Affairs, has proposed the formation of a task force to investigate budget and staff problems afflicting the SSU Library. The task force, comprised of faculty, staff, and students, would concentrate on alleviating the burden of cutbacks suffered by the library in recent years.

"You must understand," said Library Director John Bowden, "this library has suffered irreparable damage in the last six years." Much of this damage came in the form of decreasing allocations. In 1983, the library obtained \$116,000 for the acquisition of materials. This amount showed a steady decline, due to decreased enrollment, until reaching bottom at a mere \$37,000 in 1986.

While acquisition allocations dropped, Bowden pushed the costs of materials skyward. According to Bowden, the most disastrous result of this trend was experienced in 1986. "We had a declassification where \$10,000 worth of book orders were canceled and 20 students were laid off."

The financial situation has improved somewhat by core funding, which now guarantees the library at least \$125,000 in acquisitions funds, but Bowden stresses that this does little to make up for the loss of materials suffered in the past. "It's very difficult," commented a discouraged Bowden. "We're trying to rebuild our collection. It's going to take time. It's really going to take time."

Conway agrees that present core funding is inadequate, and would like to see the program limits be raised to at least \$250,000 to more effectively battle the problem.

Presently on staff at the library are a director, four librarians, two library technicians, and a clerk/typist. The librarians are sub-divided into a cataloger, an acquisitions librarian, and two reference librarians. "You can only stretch a staff so far," said Bowden, in reference to the library's 75 hour week. He believes that to effectively serve the university, the library would need an additional clerk/typist as well as three more librarians, of which one would specialize in reference materials. Due to the uncertainty of the administration regarding the amount of funds available for work study, the number of students hired to assist the librarians is still in question.

Conway has requested that Bowden attempt to control expenditures now so there are enough funds to carry through the academic year (to June 30).

The goal of the proposed task force will be to develop a program that will most effectively aid the library, and convey their findings to the State University Board. The next legislative session will begin in January of 1989.

"Use the library, and by demonstrating a need, force us to pay for it," Conway urges students. "The library seems to me... as not a central part of the academic program. I would hope the library (and not the Student Center) would be the center of the university."

Wanted: concerned individuals

Individuals with at least one hour a week available to work with adult and juvenile probationers or parolees while providing an adult model who will aid in overall rehabilitative efforts. Housewives, factory employees, businessmen, lawyers, retirees, college students, men and women are all encouraged to volunteer their time and services for a worthwhile program. Recently, a grant was awarded through the governor's Commission on Crime Prevention and Control for the establishment of a volunteer program which will cover several western counties. Michael D. Lloyd, of Willmar is the volunteer program coordinator and will be recruiting volunteers in this area. Similar programs have been established throughout the nation and are proving to be successful in the prevention and rehabilitation efforts of various corrections agencies.

This program is unique in that the volunteer will work on a one-to-one basis with an adult felon, youthful offender, or juvenile delinquent. Volunteers will be unpaid staff members of the local probation and/or parole department and will be trained for their position. A training program will provide background information on the volunteer concept, an orientation toward the duties and responsibilities of local law enforcement authorities, understanding the probationer or parolee through personality dynamics, and specific training on working as a volunteer.

Plans are for the training sessions to be held two hours an evening for three evenings over a three week period.

Other positions for volunteers will be open for those not involved in the program on a one-to-one basis. Volunteers can also be involved in prison visits, parolee investigations, answering telephones, and providing many other valuable services.

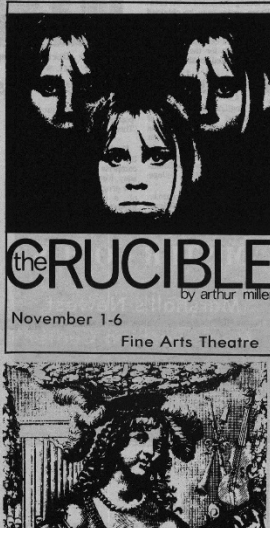
Each volunteer will work with the probation officer or corrections agent and will aid in learning increasing caseloads. Each volunteer will be required to maintain progress reports and to meet periodically with other volunteers and the probation officer or corrections agent to discuss any problems that may come up.

Michael Lloyd will be speaking to groups and states that he will be available to present a program for any service group or agency that might wish to learn more about the volunteer program. 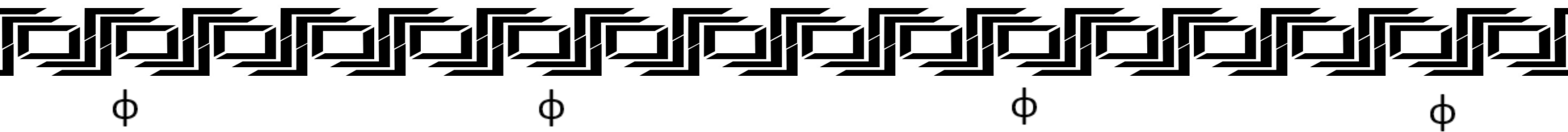
