Dear Huntington:

I hope that you won't think too harshly of me for making public the two letters which I have reluctantly given cut today. The circumstances here have been so deeply annoying, as I perhaps hinted to you one night a month or six weeks ago, that life was really unendurable. I am sorry about the publicity, but in view of all sorts of unpleasant possibilities, it seemed to me that in justice to myself I must make some such statement as to the conditions here. I am going right up to Gloucester and shall take quite a little rest before turning to anything else. I have greatly enjoyed in Washington my friendship with you and your wife and I hope it may always continue.
